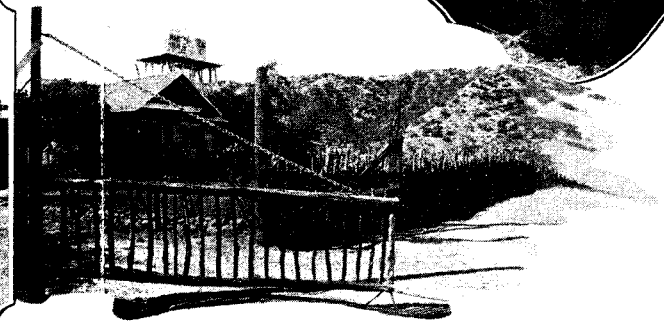
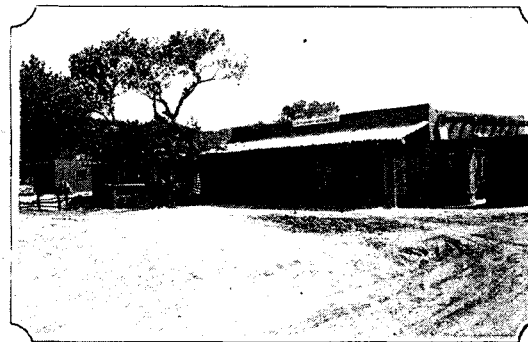


NOWHERE in California is there a spot of more real interest than the Harry Carey Ranch and Trading Post situated in the beautiful San Francisquito Canyon. It's a ranch in all respects, consisting of over 1,200 acres. Here, Navajo Indians live in their native way and large herds of Navajo and Karakul sheep graze on the slopes of the mountains.

Navajo Indians, so well known for their dexterity in rug weaving and silver work may be seen at the Trading Post. From their looms they weave rugs of your own choice in color and pattern, making them of wool from an unusual breed of sheep owned exclusively by the Navajo Tribe and Harry Carey. Silver trinkets and jewelry hand hammered and hand carved are also procurable at the Harry Carey Trading Post.

This side trip from Los Angeles is, without a doubt, the most interesting of all, because, not only has the sightseer the pleasant anticipation of visiting the Trading Post, but each mile of the journey is filled with interesting sights, both beautiful and instructive.

The illustrations in this folder show views of the Navajo Indians at the Harry Carey Trading Post; also scenes on his 1,200 acre ranch.



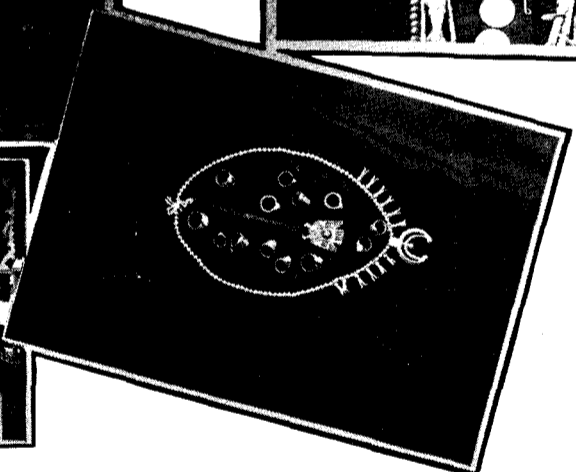
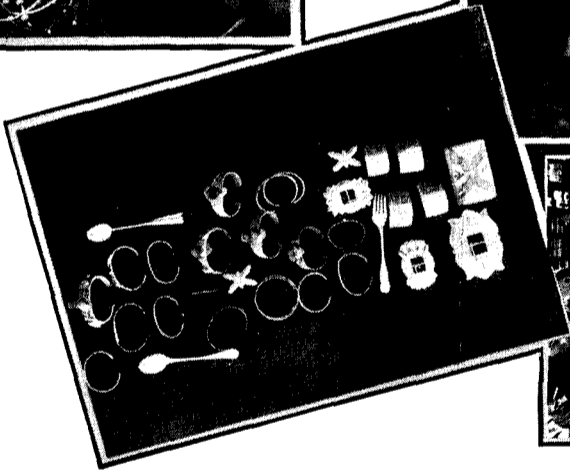
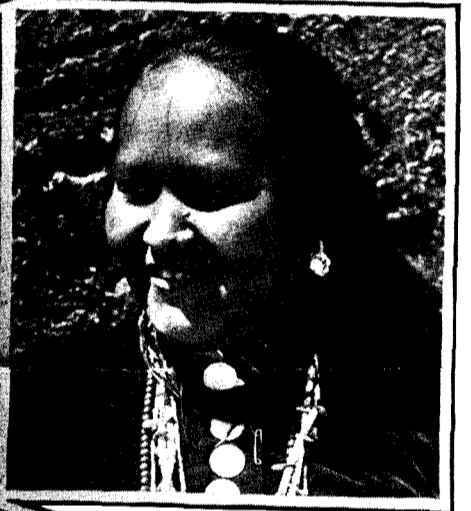
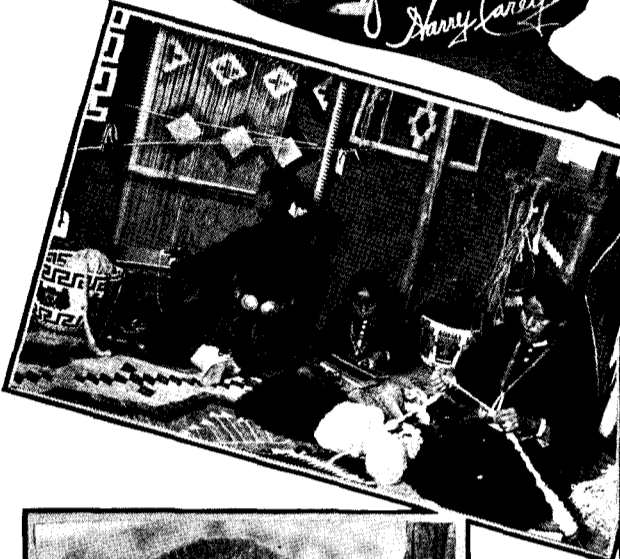
HISTORICAL, PICTURESQUE, INSTRUCTIVE

If you have never made the trip to San Fernando, Newhall and Saugus, you have missed one of the most delightful one-day trips to be taken out of Los Angeles. Every mile of the journey is full of interest.

Starting from Los Angeles you journey westward along fashionable Wilshire Boulevard, passing many beautiful homes and apartments, and the famous Ambassador Hotel.

Turning north, you head towards the most talked-of city in the world—Hollywood—and the journey takes you past many of the motion picture studios. Crossing Hollywood Boulevard you make the start of the trip over the Cahuenga Pass and into San Fernando Valley. As the traveler reaches the top of the easy mountain grade he gets his first view of the magnificent valley while directly before him lies Universal City—a motion picture city in itself. Here the traveler may lunch at one of the Spanish Inns and “rub elbows” with the motion picture folks, who, between “shots,” are enjoying a sip of coffee in stage costume and makeup.

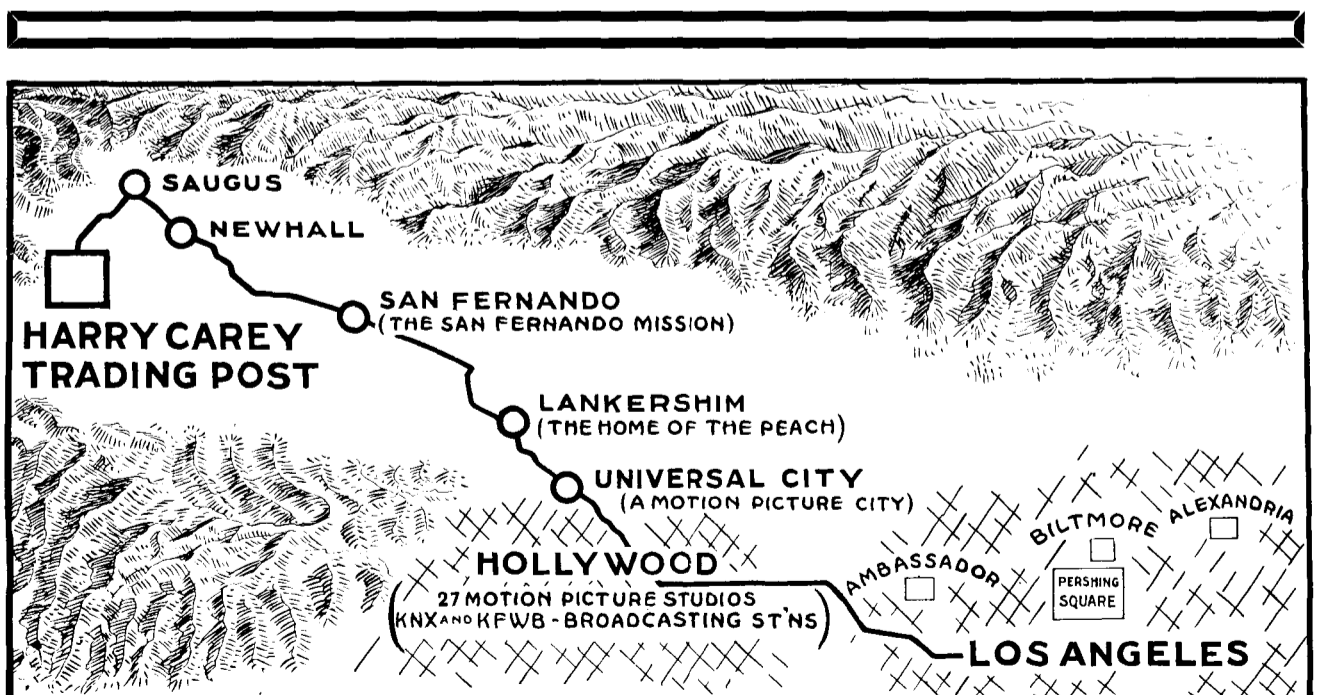
In another mile or two you pass through Lankershim, the home of the peach and apricot, and, in a few miles beyond, arrive at San Fernando, a busy, bustling town, typical of the valley. Here you may visit the world-wide famous San Fernando Mission.



FROM San Fernando the journey now takes you into the Santa Susanna Mountains, where the scenic beauty is truly inspiring. Here can be seen the spillway of the Los Angeles Aqueduct; also, Fremont Pass, the original stage coach trail of General Fremont and his troops. After passing through the Newhall Tunnel will be seen the site of the first oil field in California.

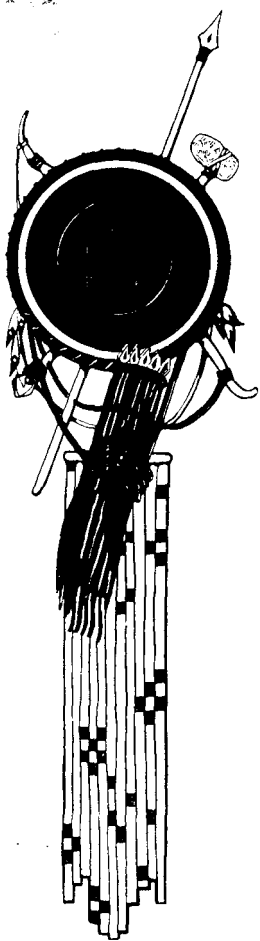
In the foothills of the range lie the quaint towns of Saugus and Newhall, while close by and only thirty miles from your starting point, in the same beautiful hills, is the Harry Carey Ranch, situated in San Francisquito Canyon, so named because gold was discovered here at the same time as in San Francisco. This canyon was also the route of the original stage coach road between Los Angeles and San Francisco.

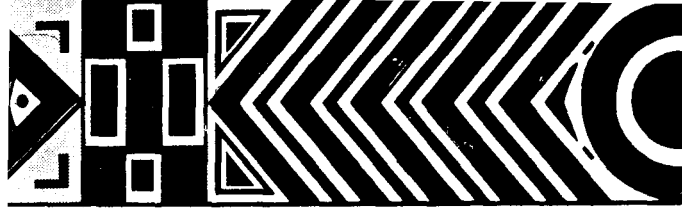
Take the trip and you will say the same as others who have made it: “Truly, there is not a more beautiful trip, nor one crowded with interest, as this one.”



From Los Angeles drive out Wilshire Boulevard to Western Avenue, turn north to Hollywood Boulevard, then west, driving through Hollywood to Cahuenga Avenue, then north and over Cahuenga Pass to Lankershim Boulevard, then straight away to San Fernando Boulevard, from which point the remainder of the trip is marked with Harry Carey Trading Post Signs.
