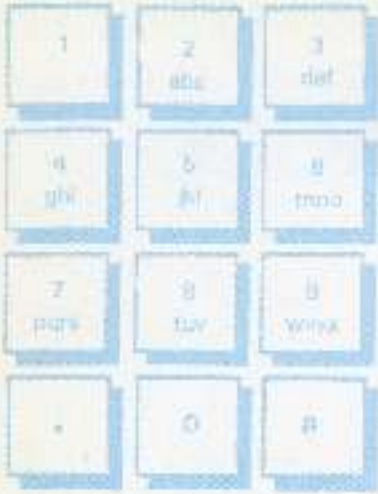

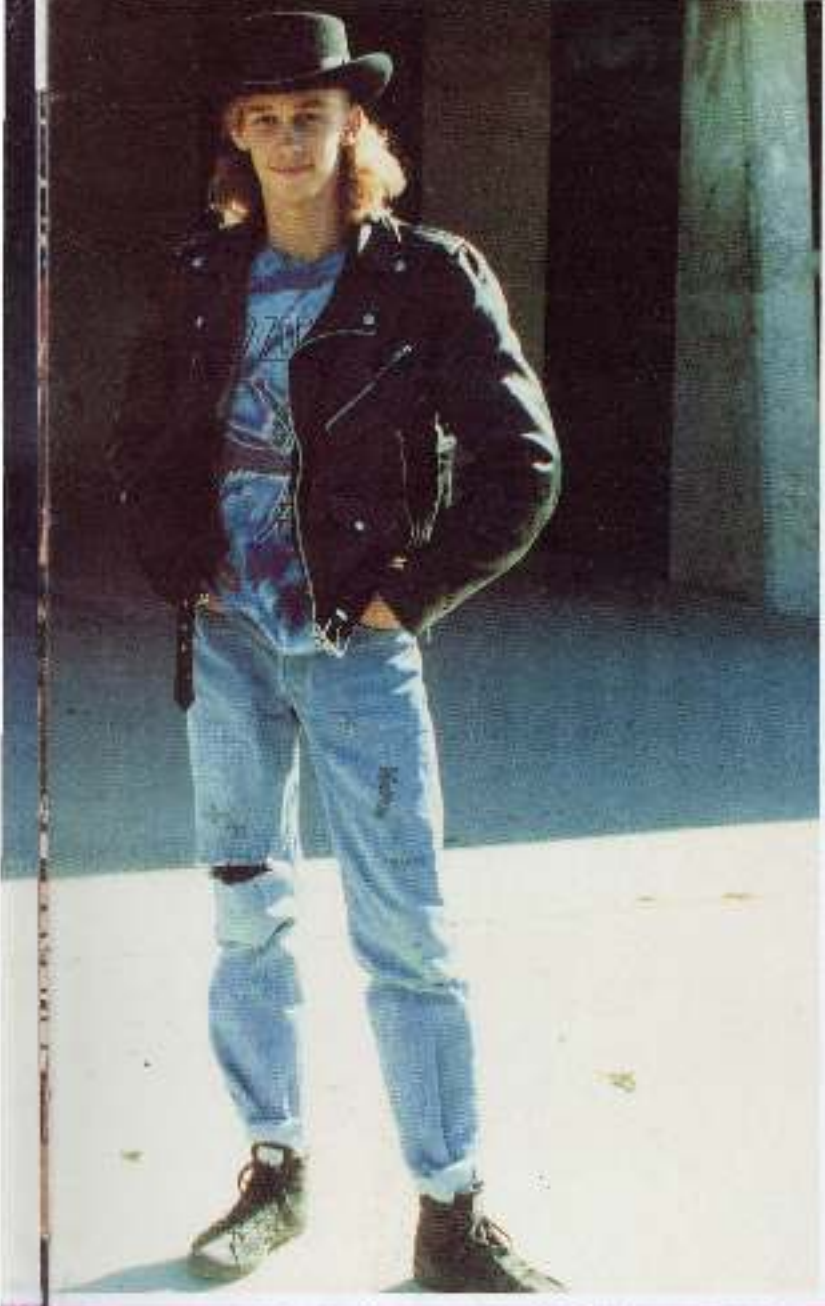

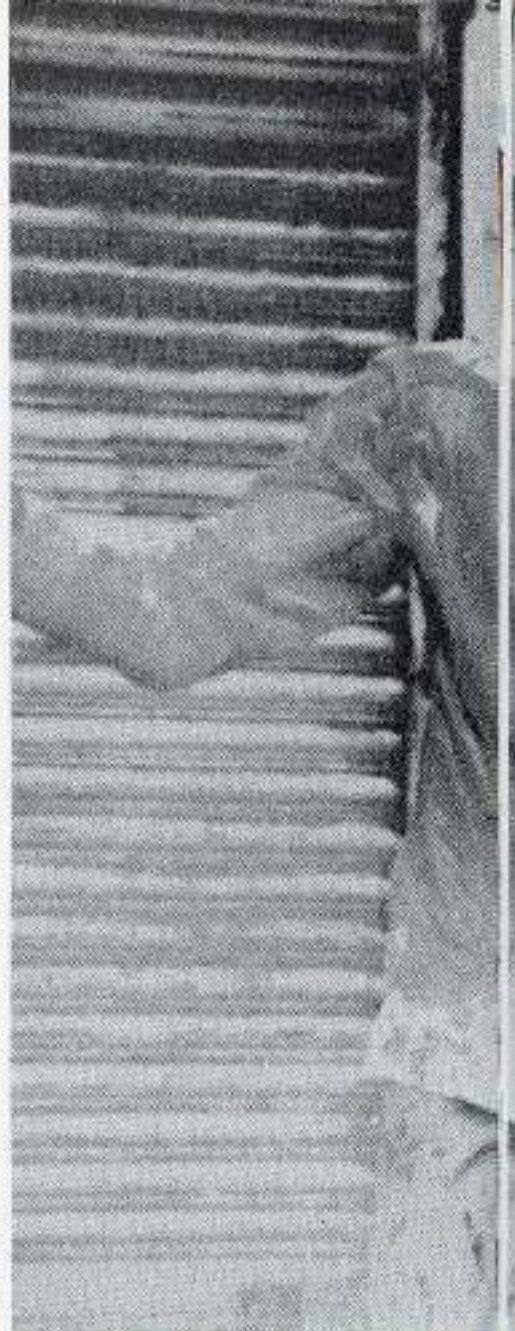
dollars in damage.

The public witnessed the debut of celebrities like Arsenio Hall and Paula Abdul.

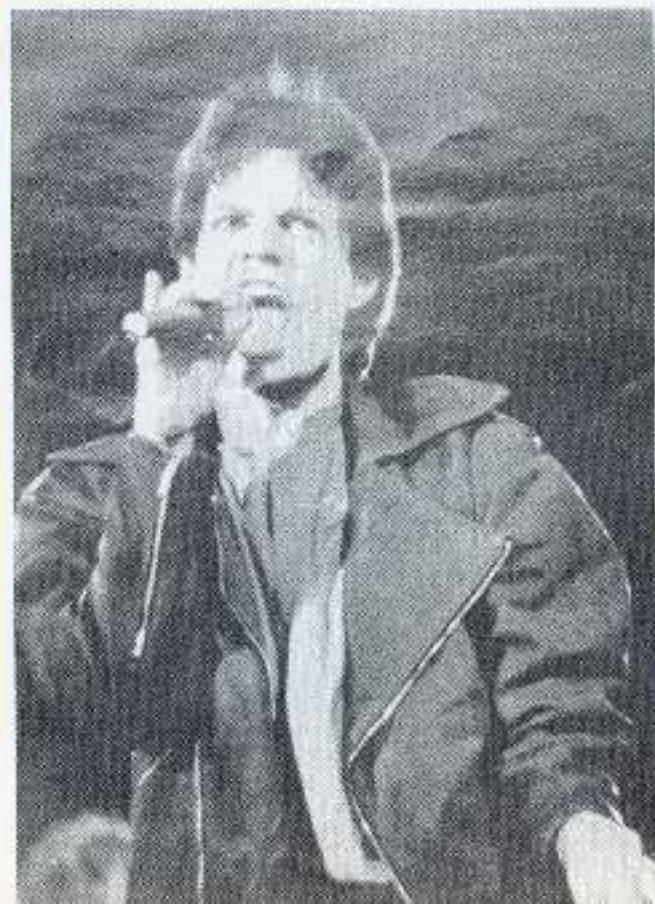
1989 was a spectacular year. The events around the world and at home were images burned forever in ones mind. The year was a wonderful ending for a fantastic decade.

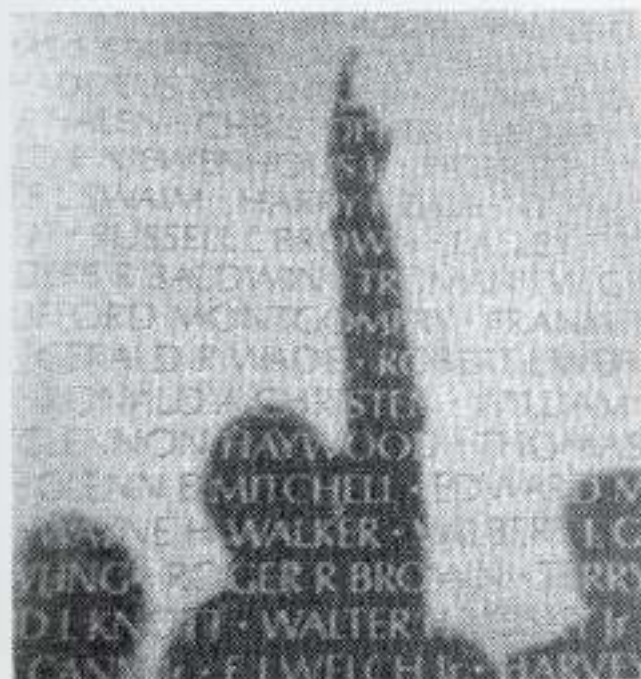

ble transferred to LMU. There, Gathers led the nation in both scoring and rebounding.

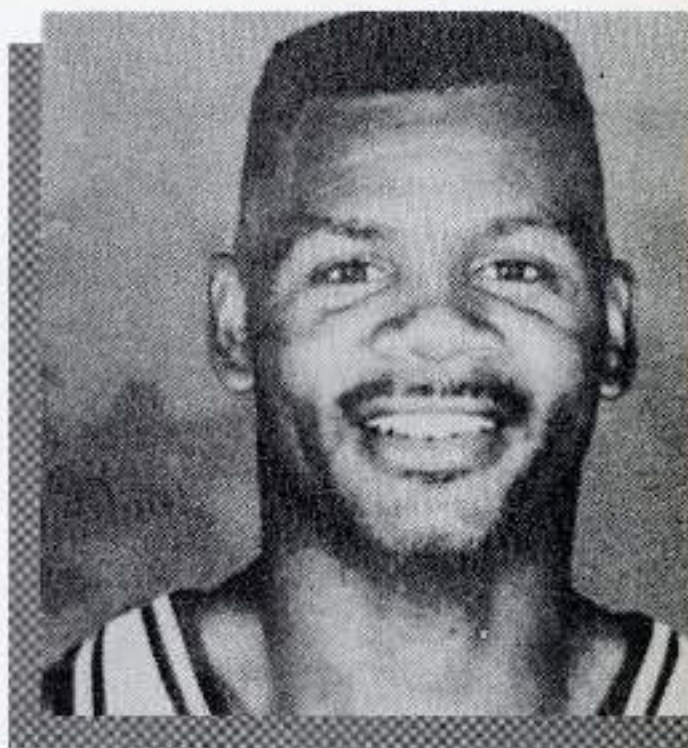
Hank's plans were filled with many ambitions, but unfortunately, they will not come true. He had plans of helping his mom out financially after making the NBA and having her move to the West Coast.

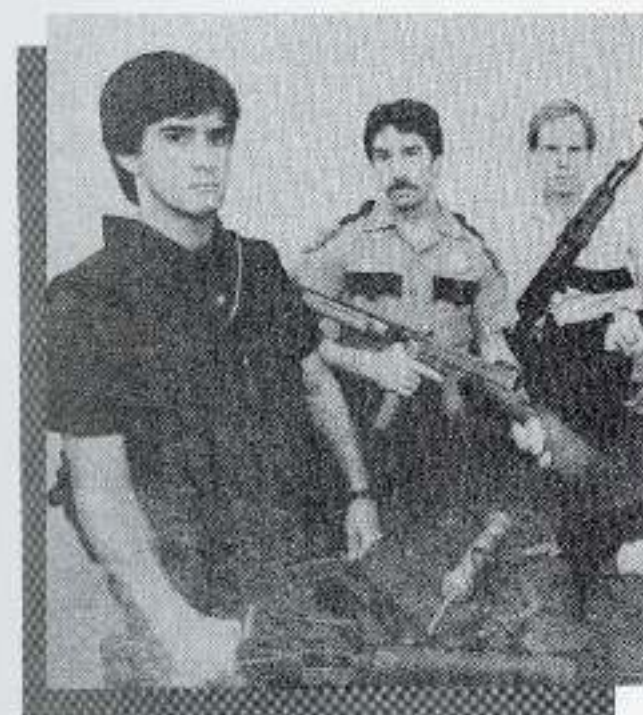
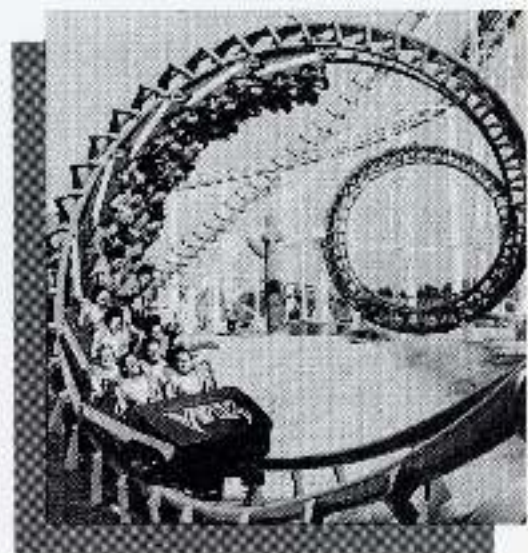

Life or Death?

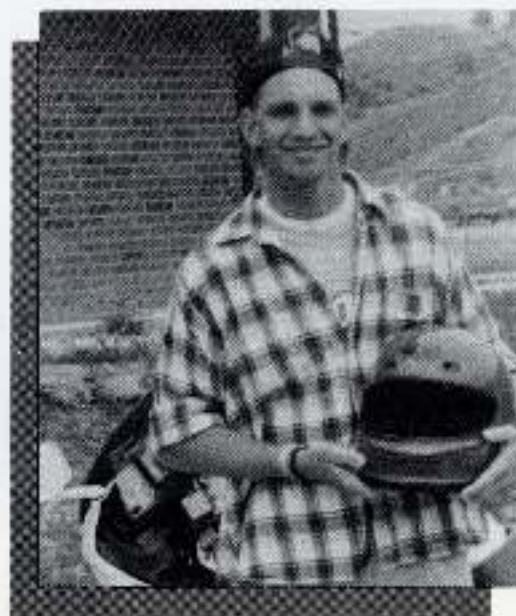

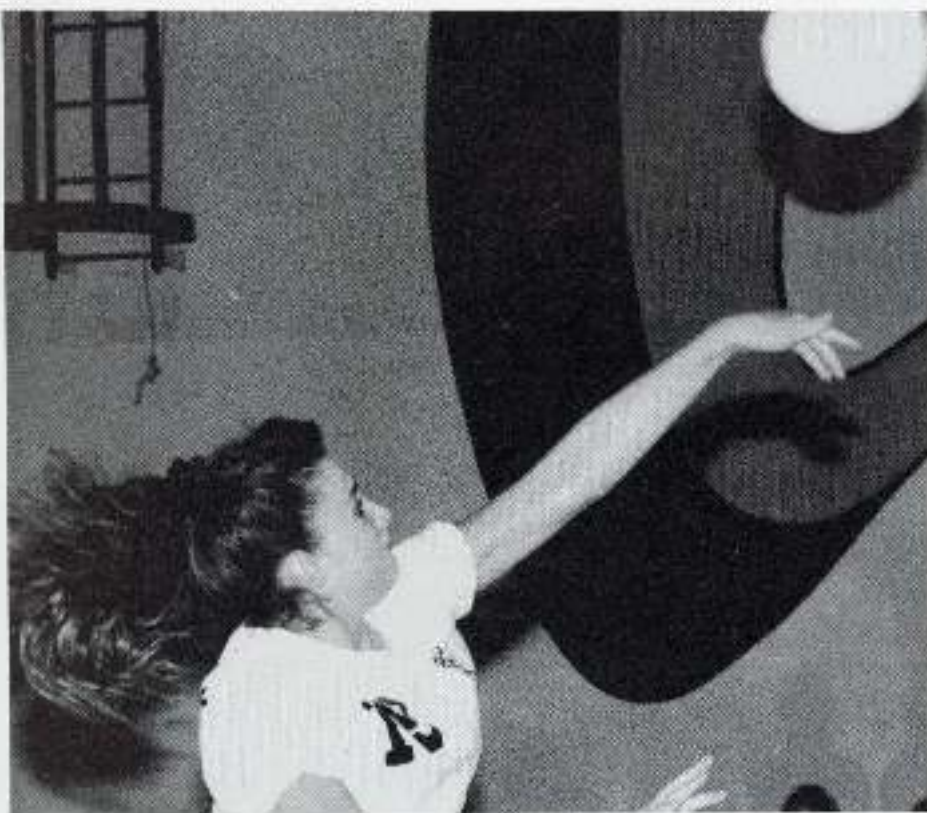

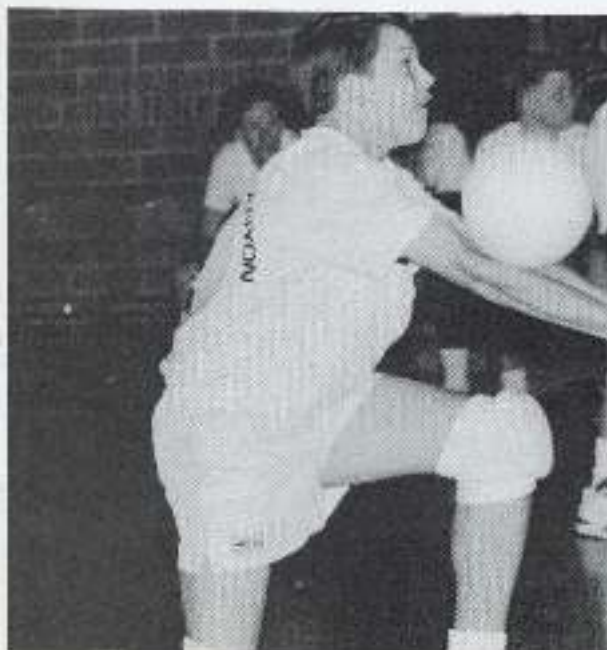

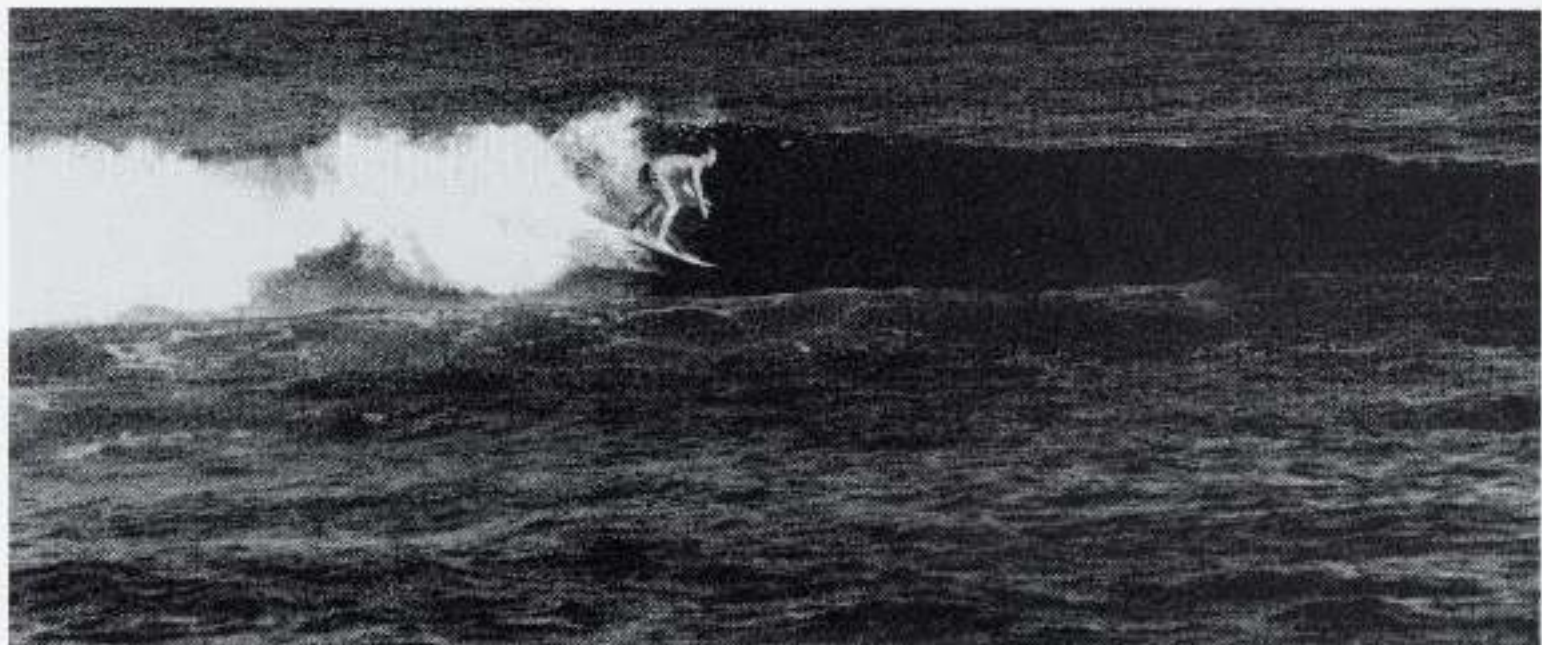


Fun In The Sun

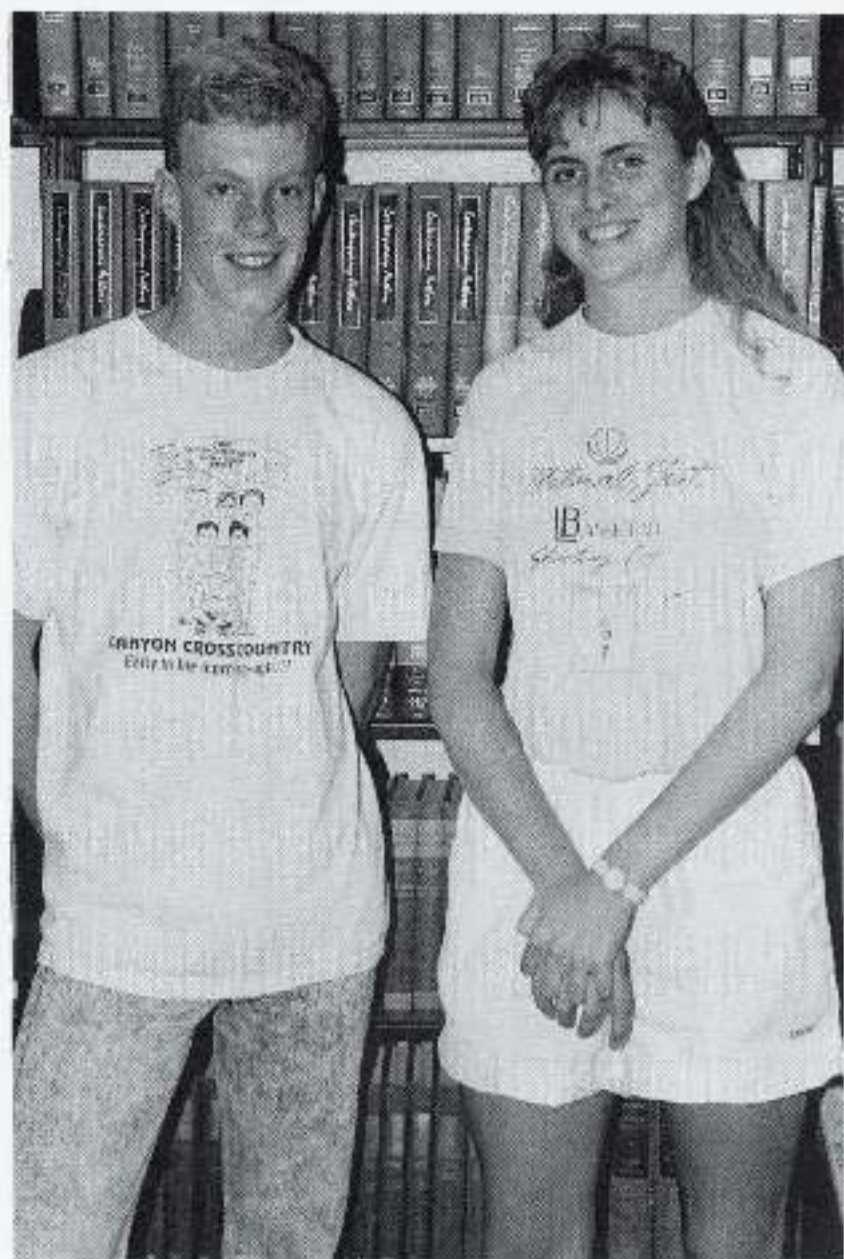

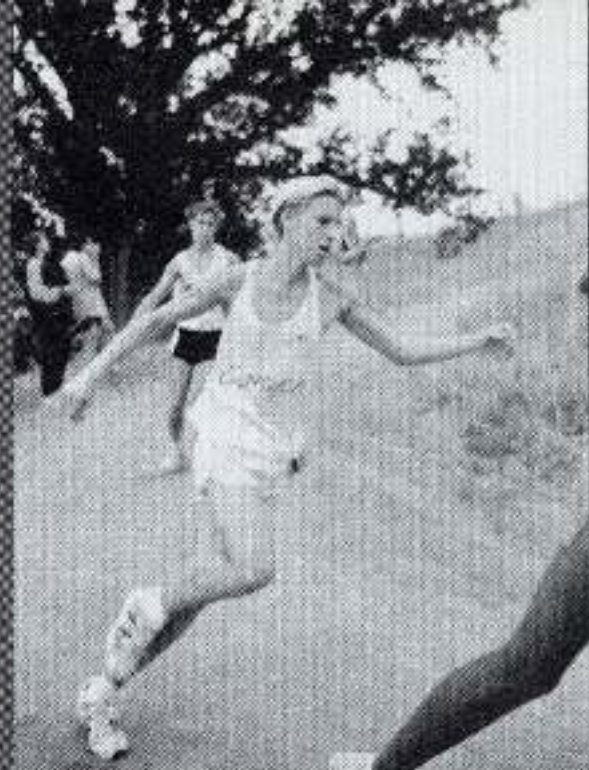

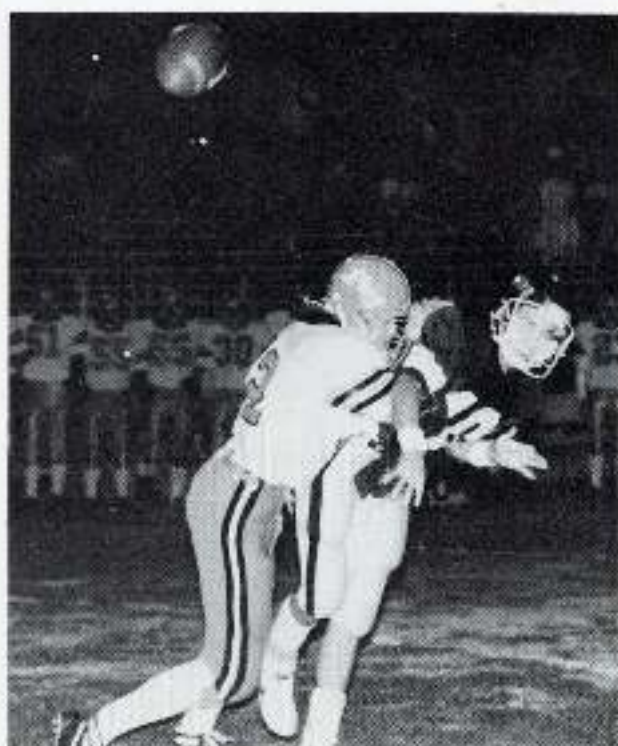
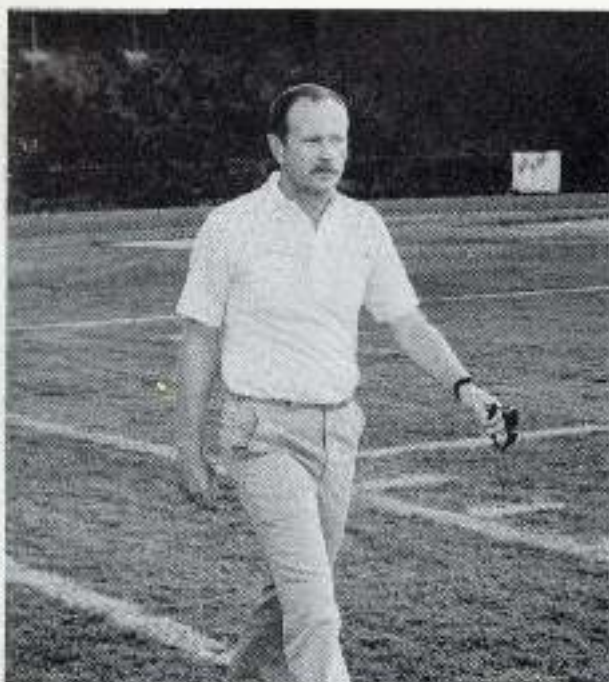

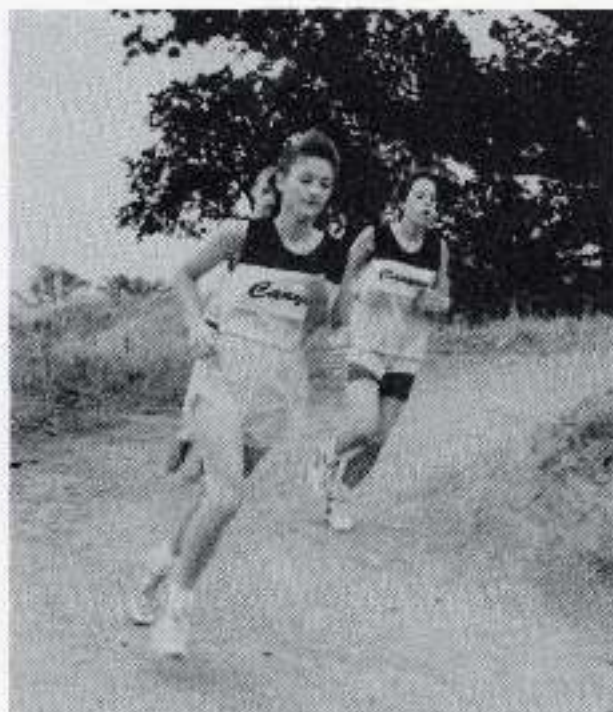

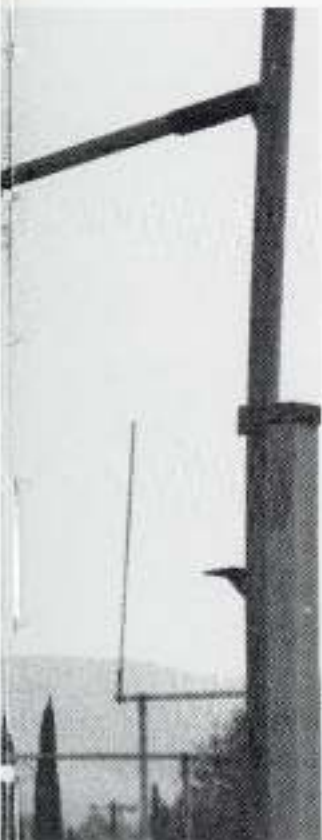

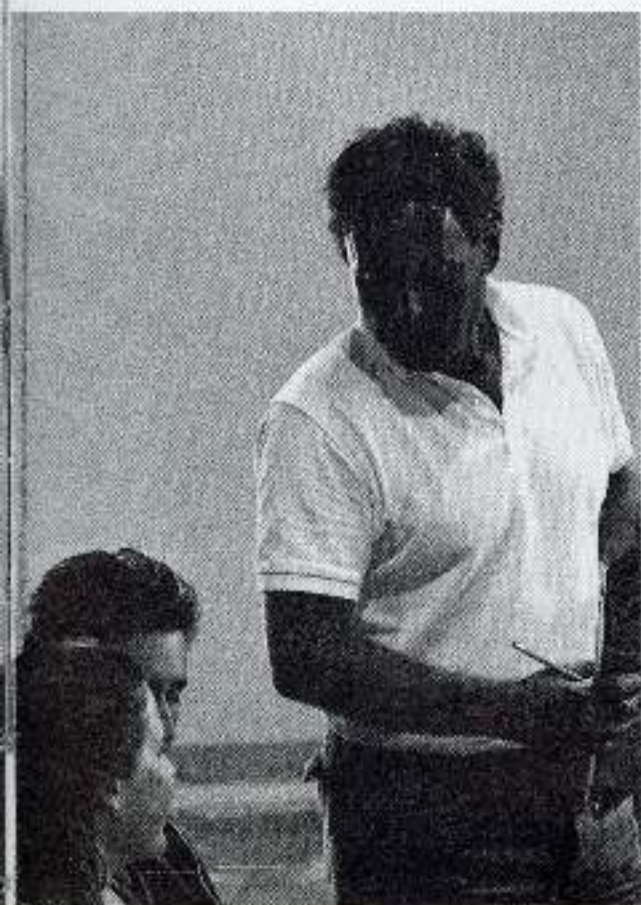

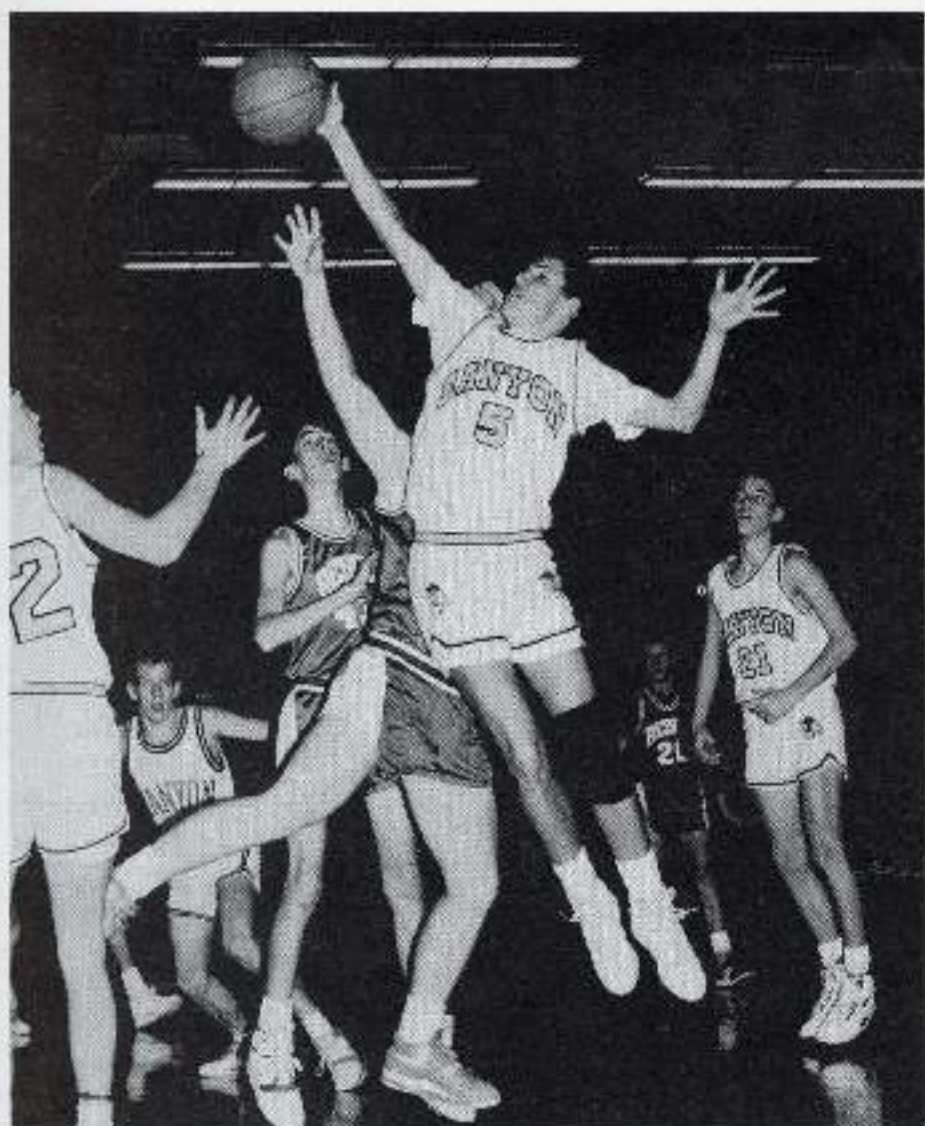

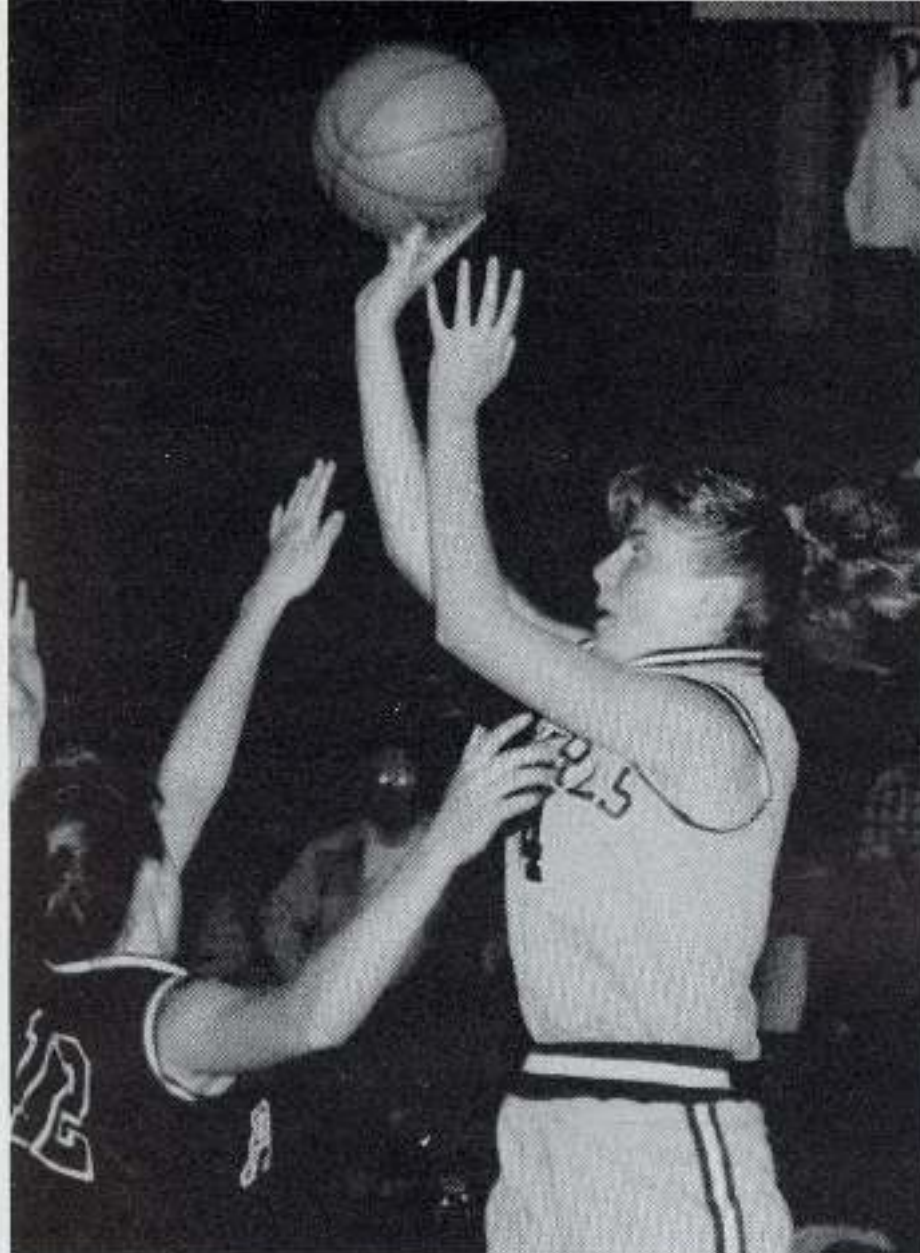

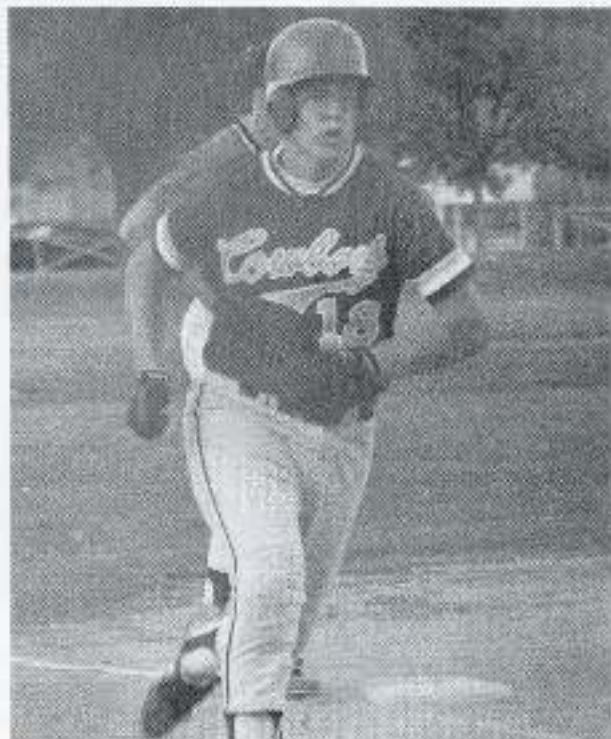
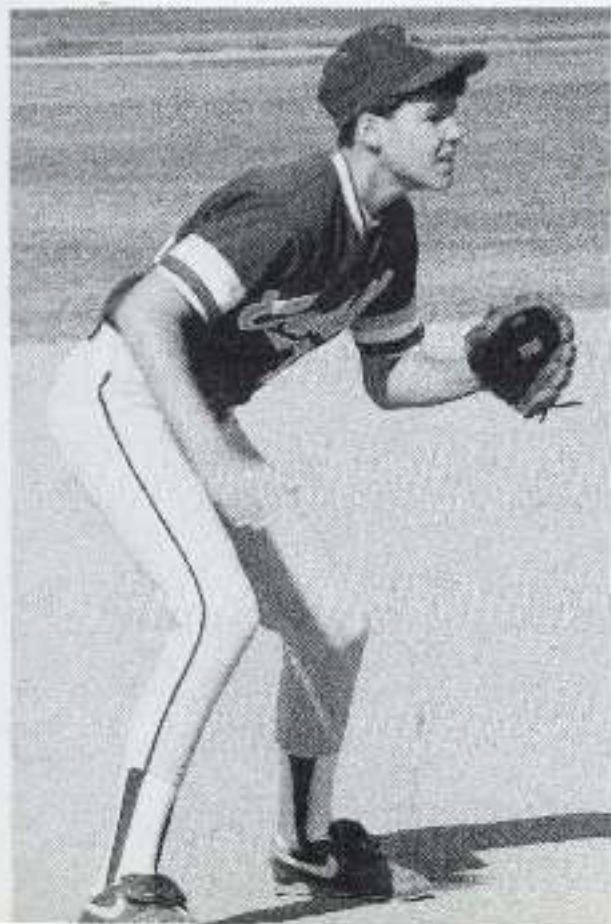
On First . . .

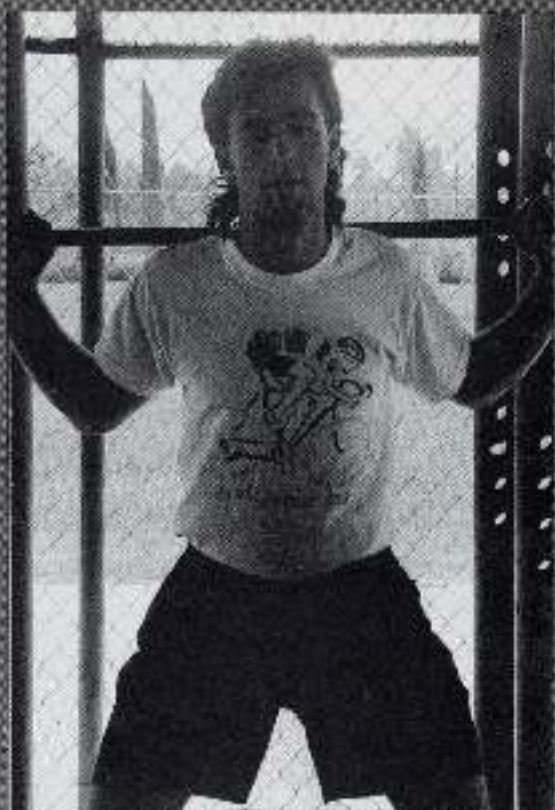

"Ever since I was in sixth grade I have dreamt of being able to fly," said James Brimidge.



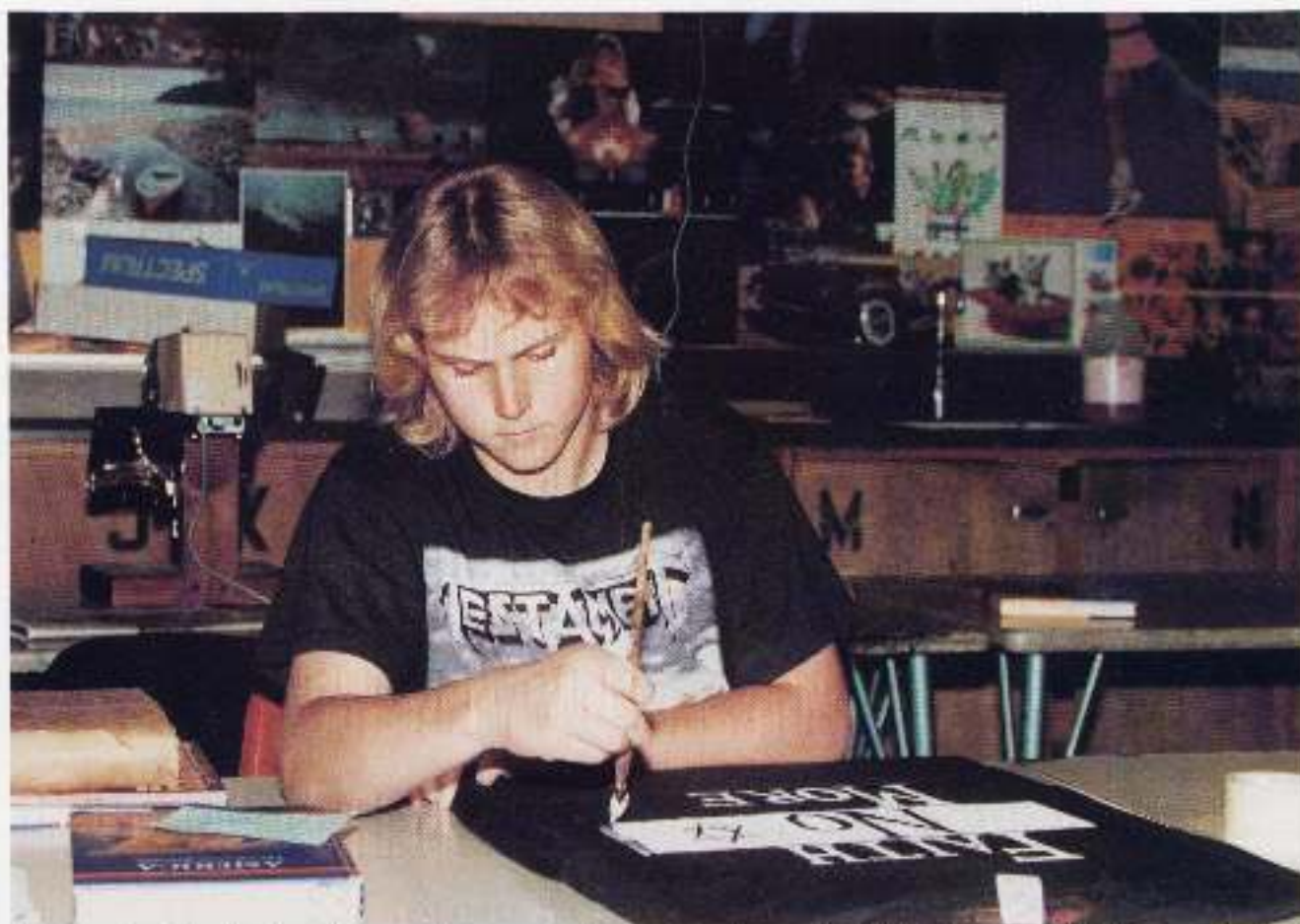

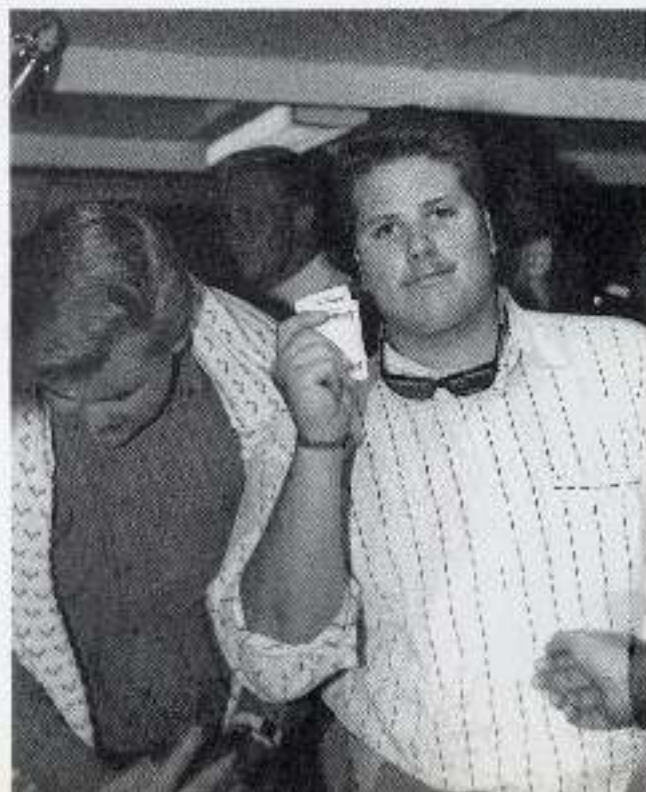
Seniors Only!!!

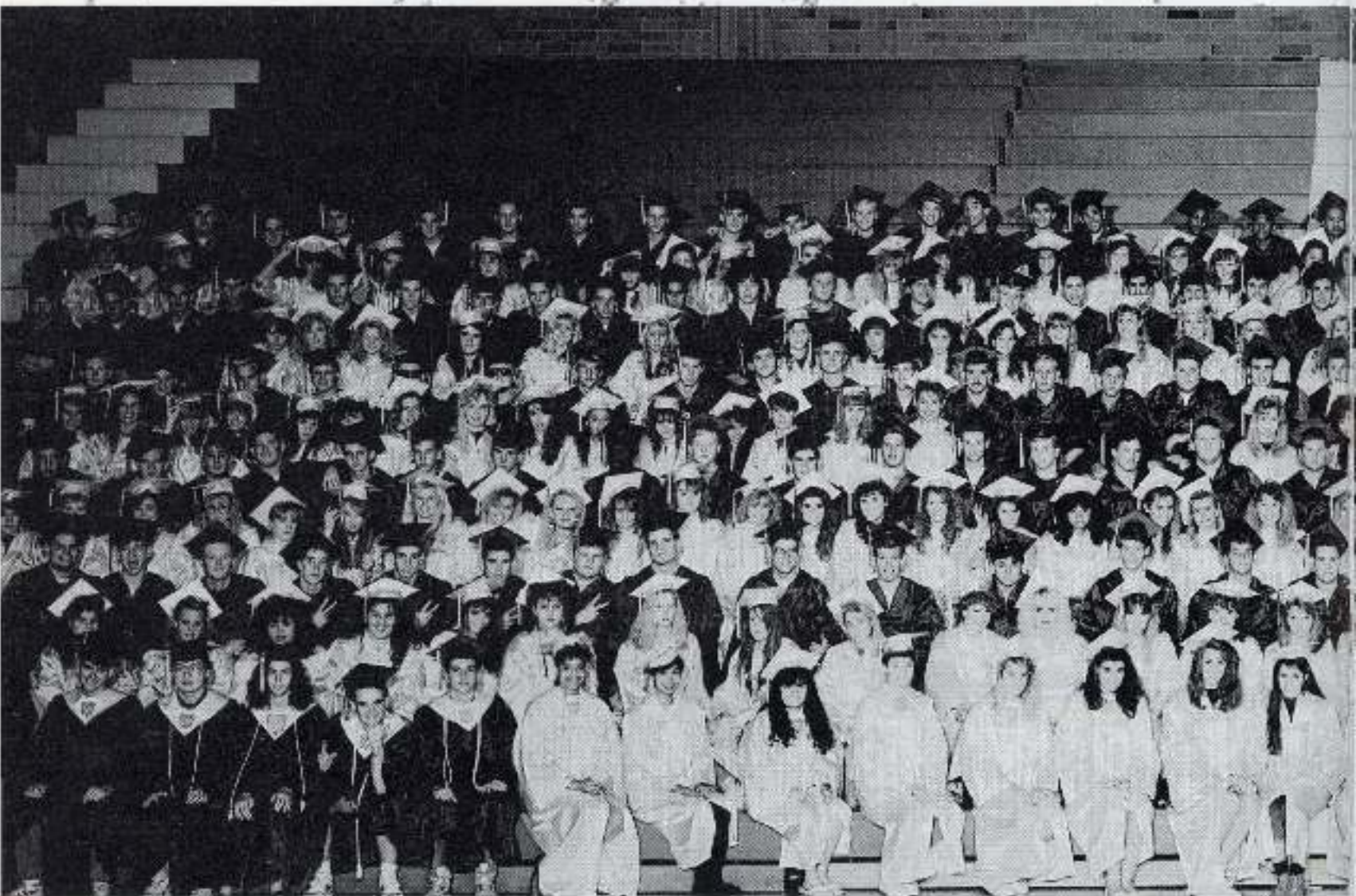

Dinner was provided for the seniors. Here Misty Dradi and Nadine Adair try to decide just how good it was.

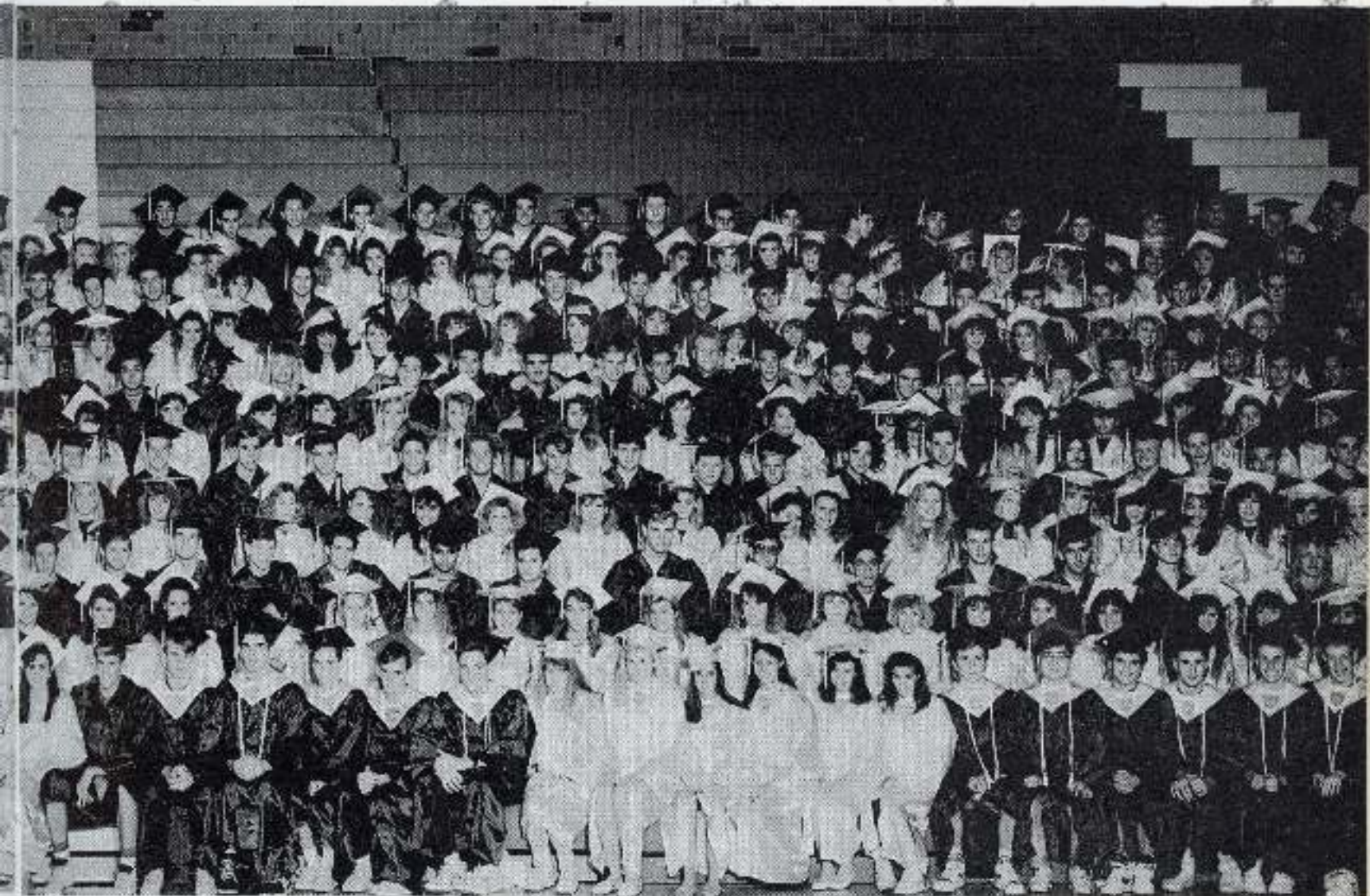

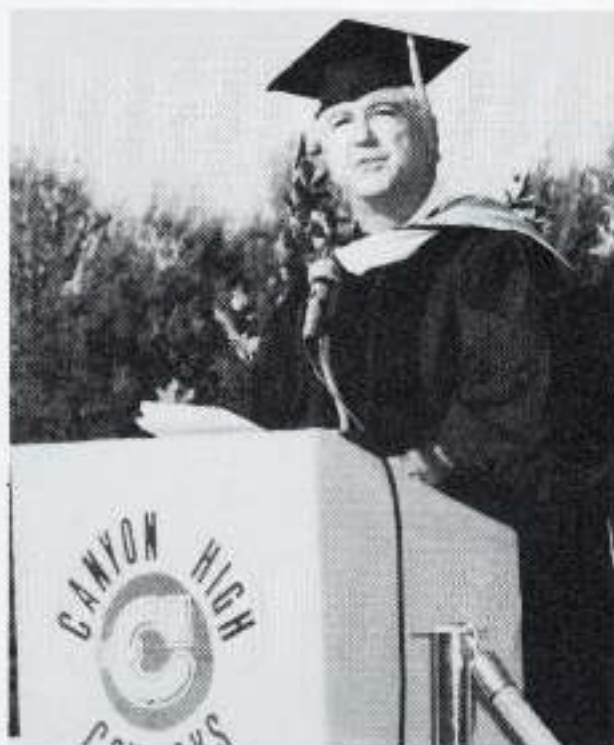

The day people walk around like zombies.

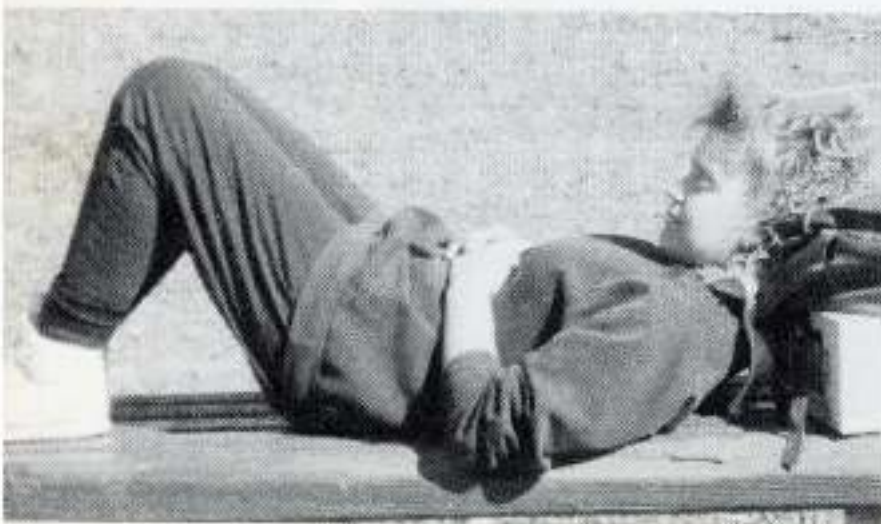
Monday mornings could either be called good or bad, but for the most part they were considered bad. Most of us felt that Monday morning was one of the worst things in life.

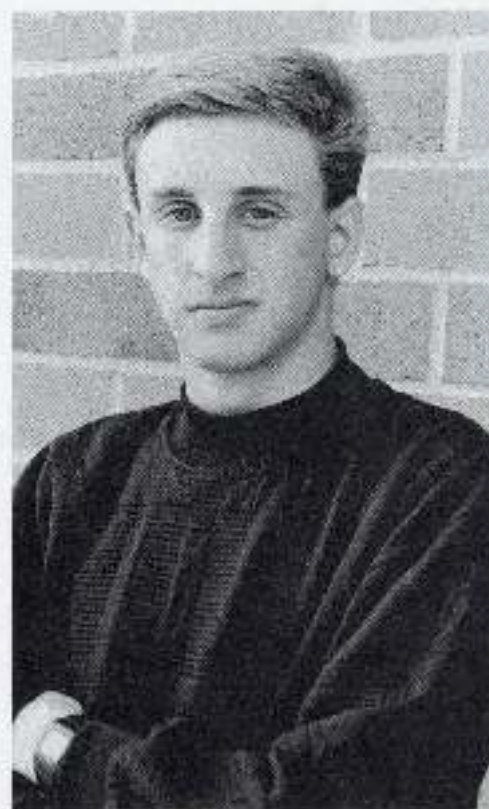
Kevin's favorite colors were black and red. He enjoys Depeche Mode, OMD, and The Cure. His favorite song was "Love Song."

make a fortune in real estate.

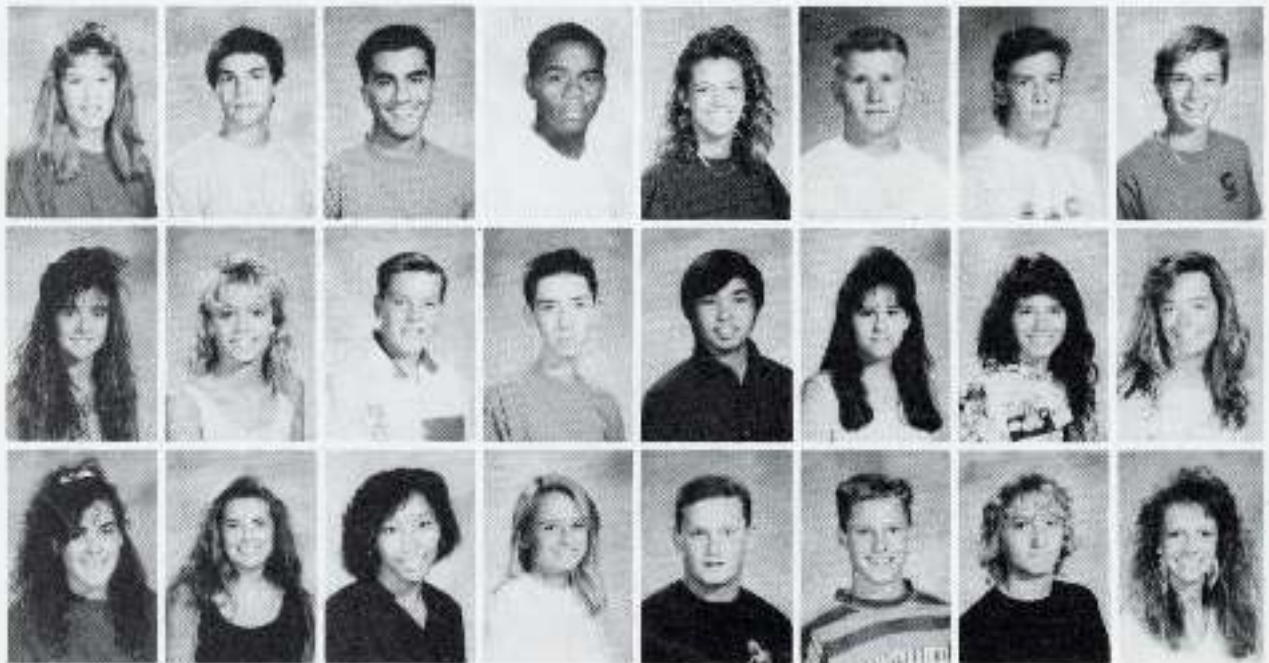

Where does our money go? A lot of our students spend their money at their favorite fast food restaurant.

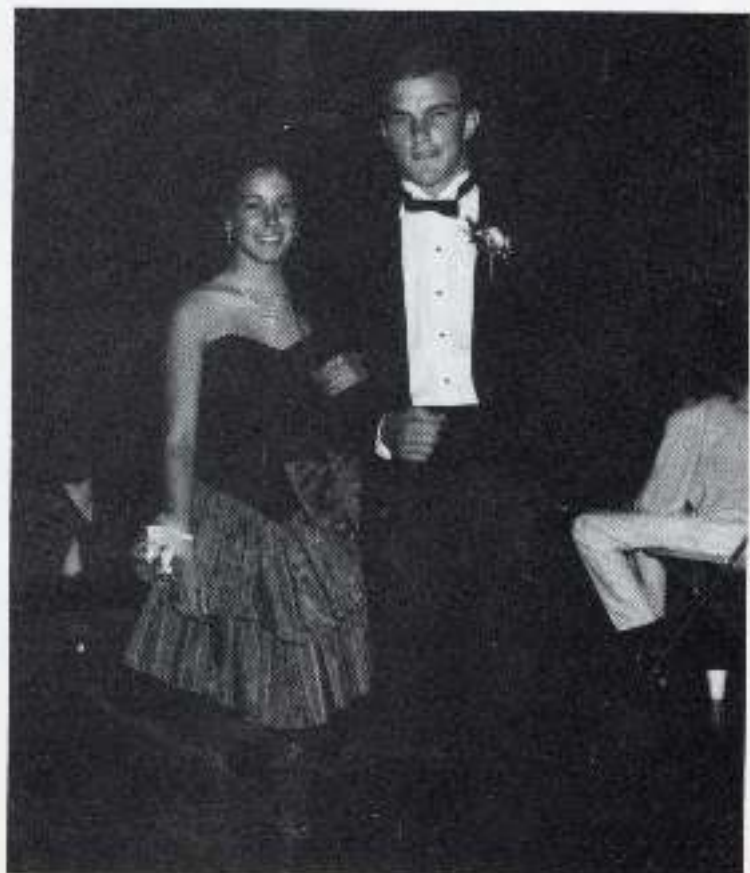

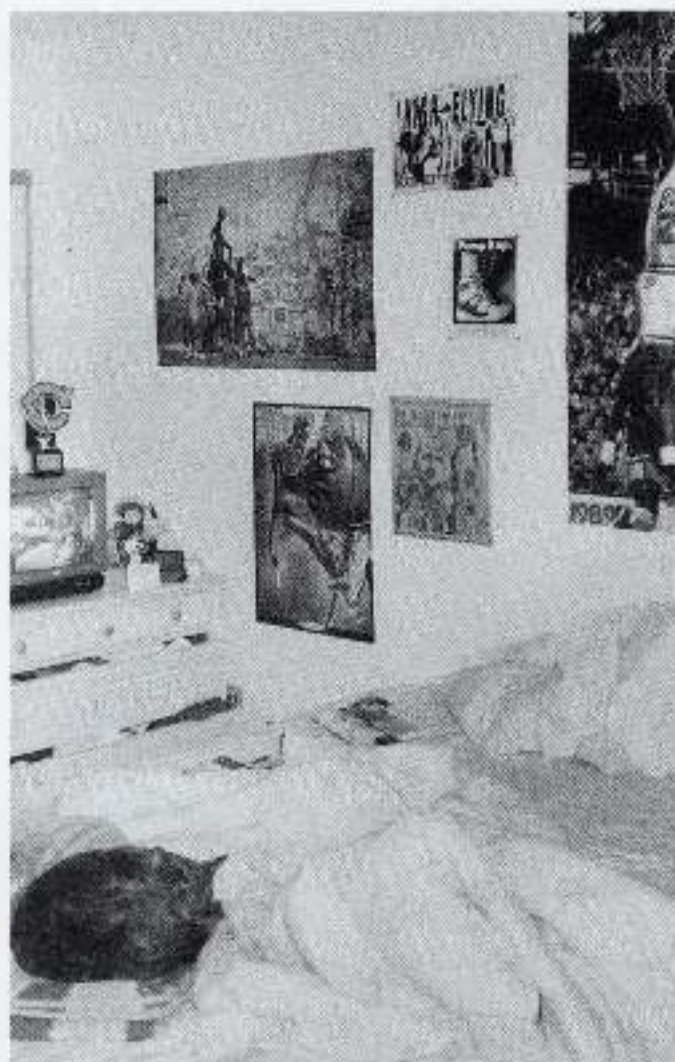

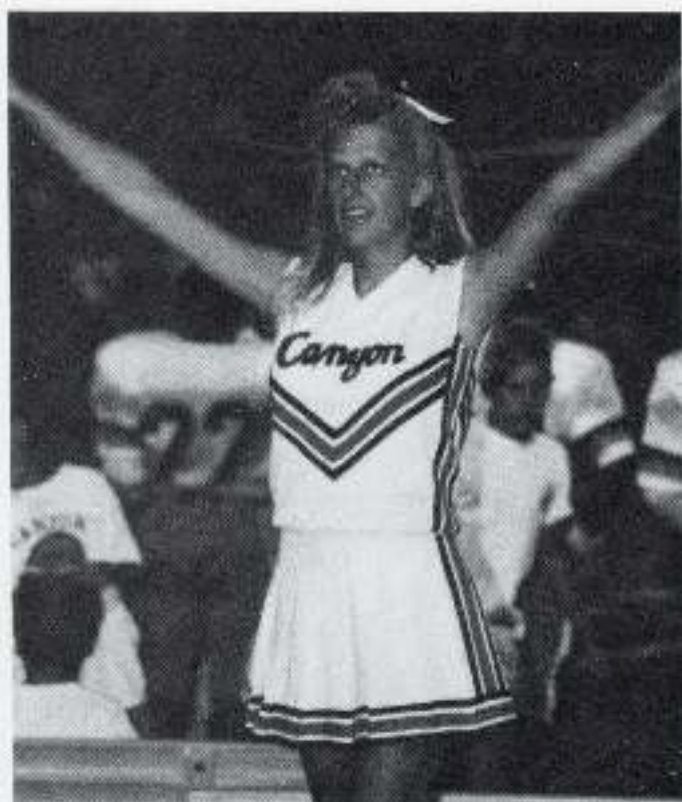

"Being on the team was a fun way to meet people and a great way to get involved

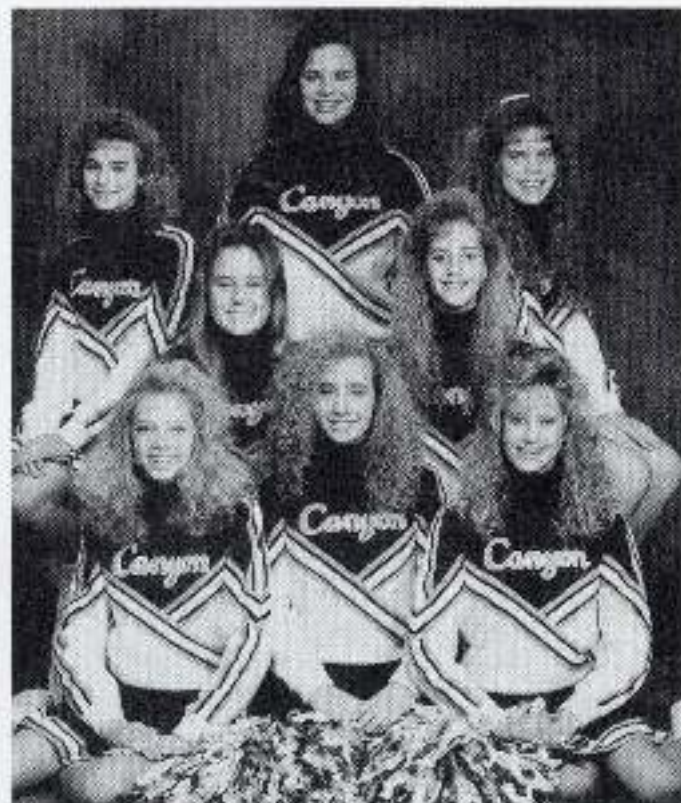

Each page of the yearbook deals with every aspect of student life. From associations and academics to sports and student life, the yearbook catches the high-

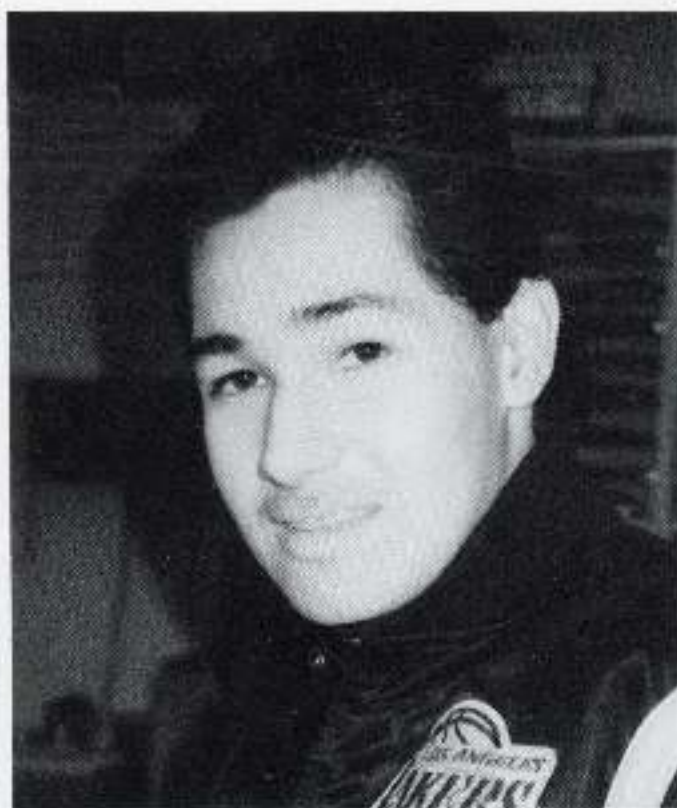
lights of them all.

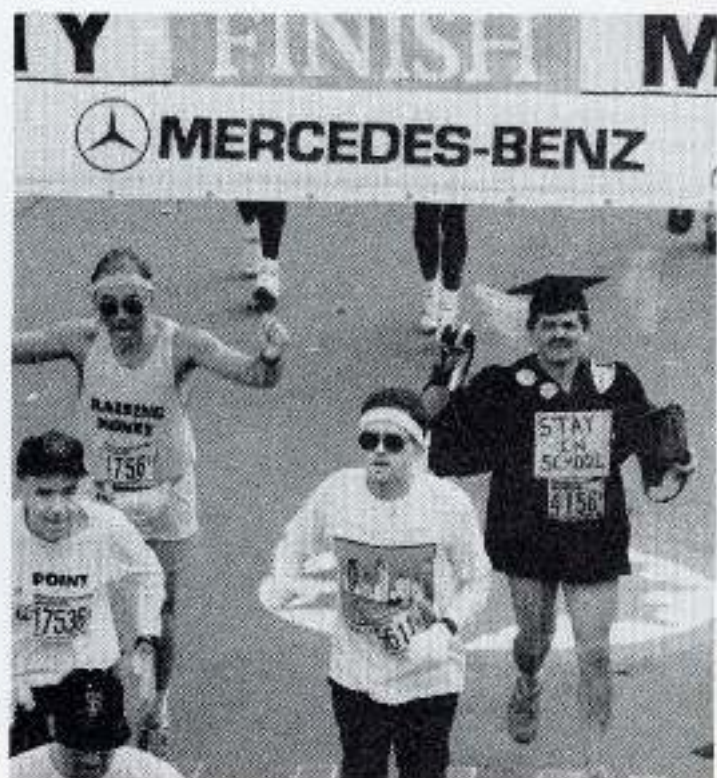
Mr. Fadale, exhausted but glad to cross the finish line. One of hundreds who participated in the New York Marathon.

The Home Economics Department was designed to teach students practical skills; concepts that would help the students take care of themselves. Students

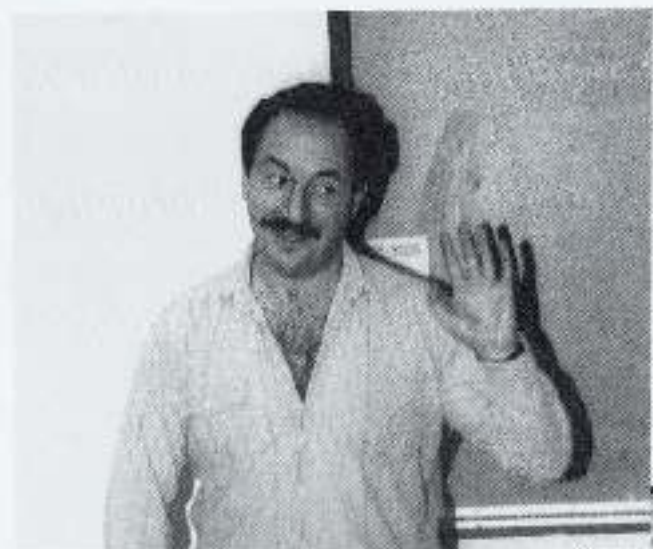
were taught not only to cook, but to be responsible.

Between these two programs, students with any problem were well taken care of and taught the skills to succeed in a daily program.

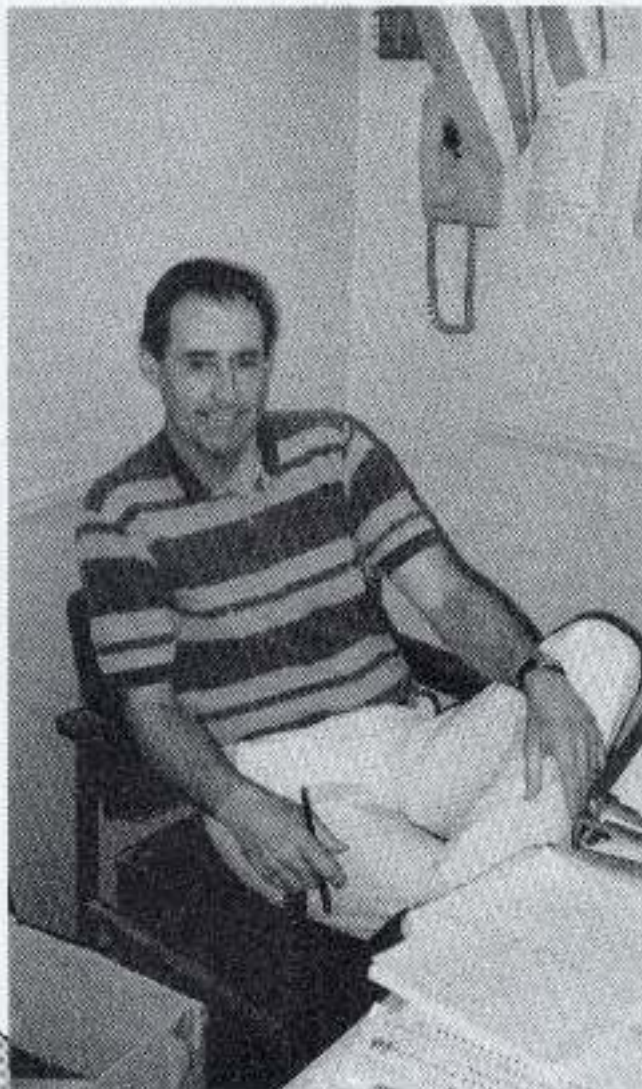

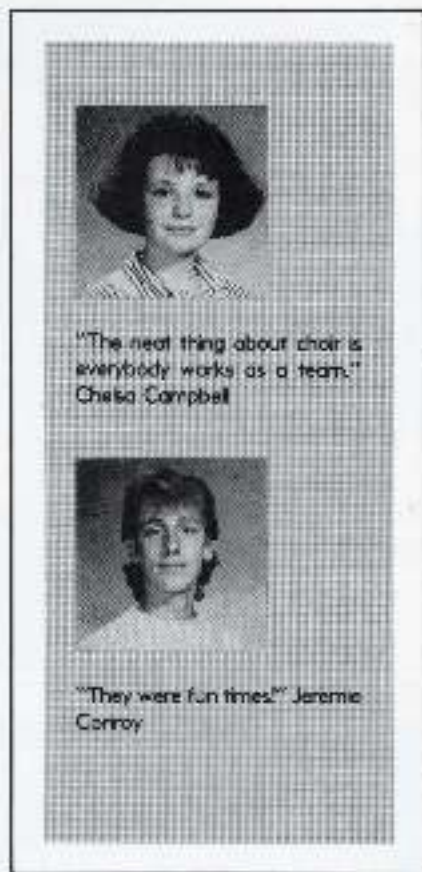

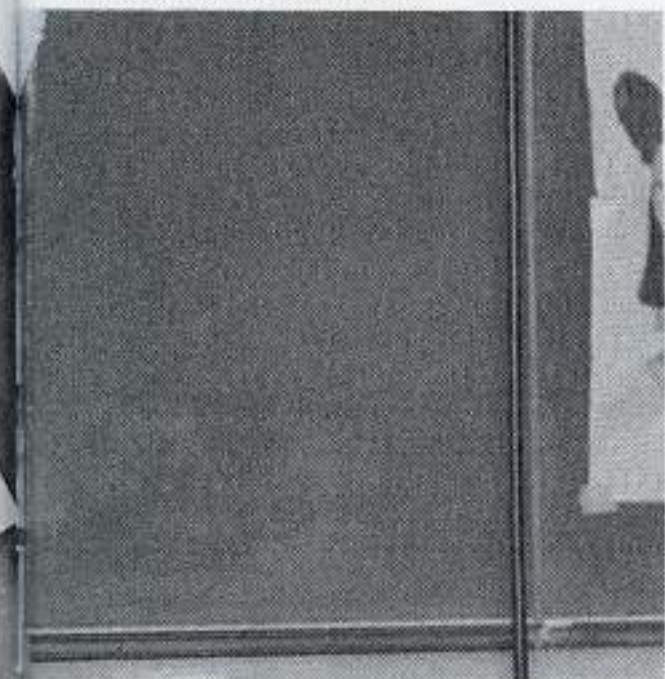

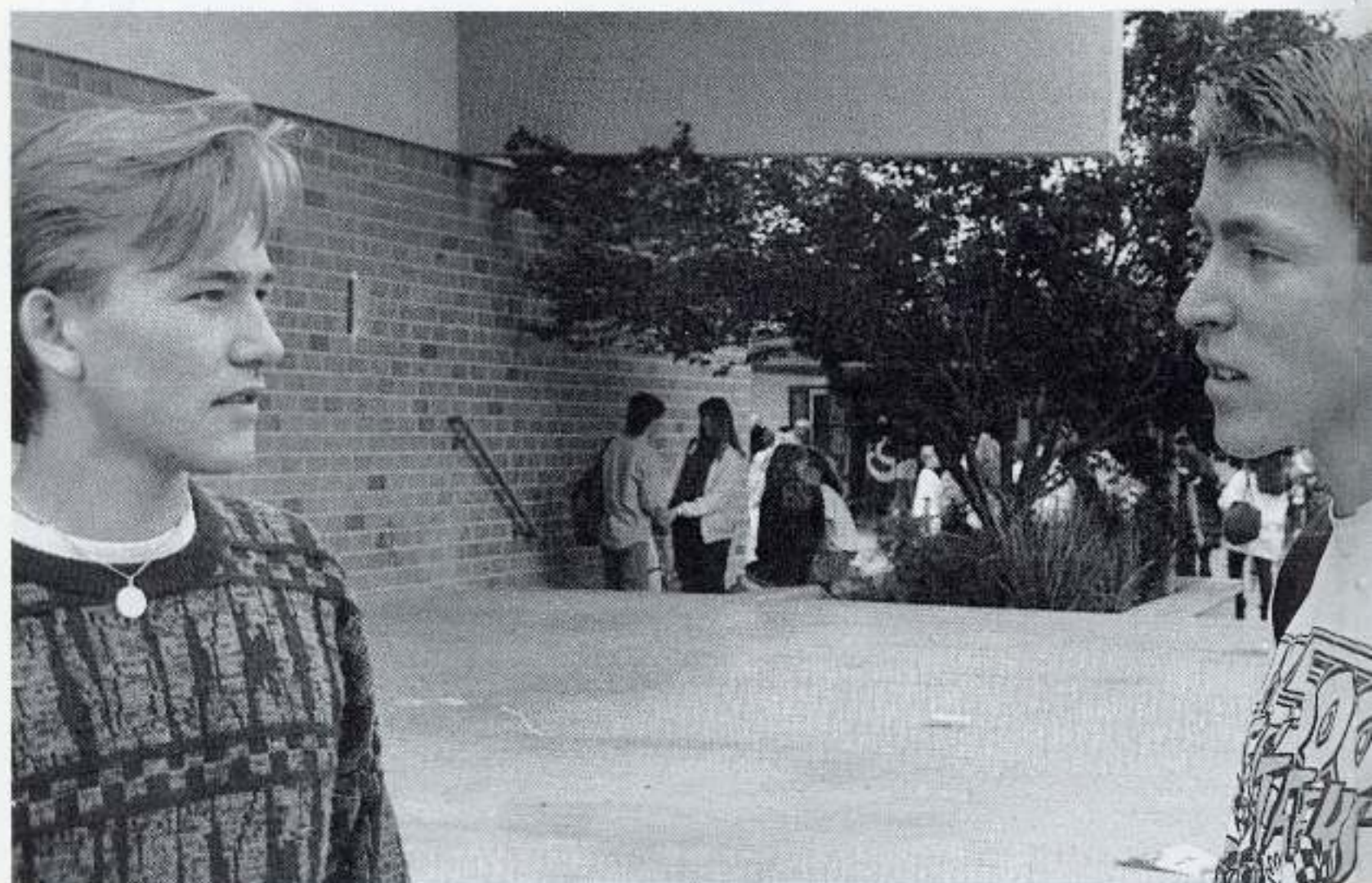

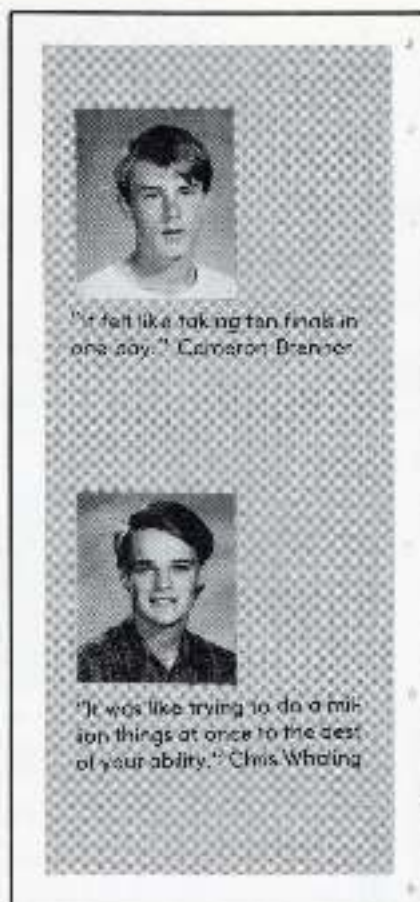

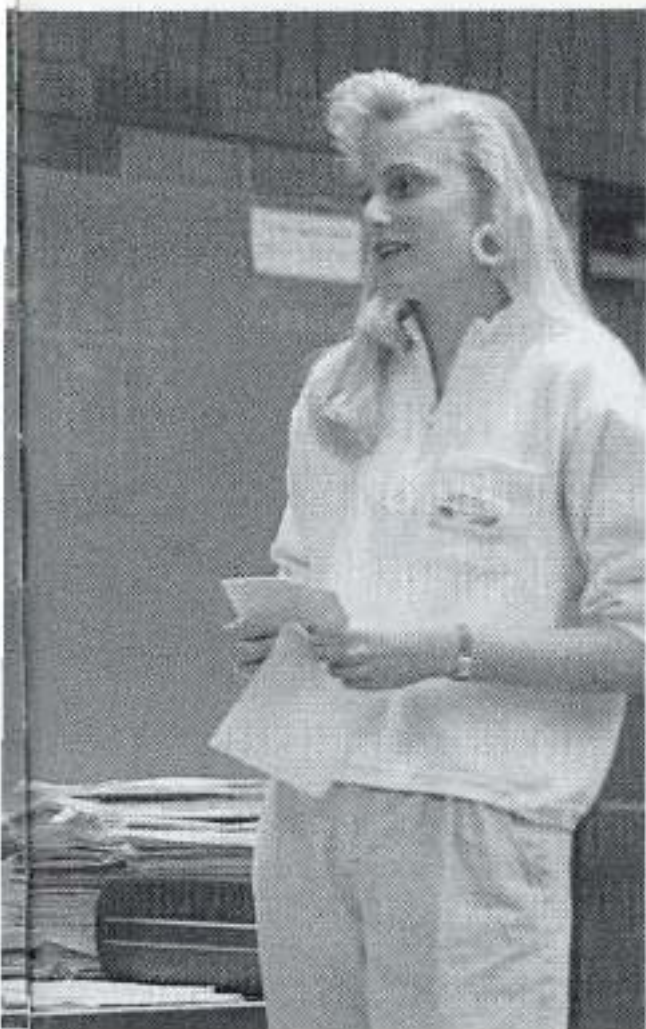

Uniting . . . whether it would be uniting thoughts on paper, or uniting efforts to help save lives, both organizations worked toward important goals.

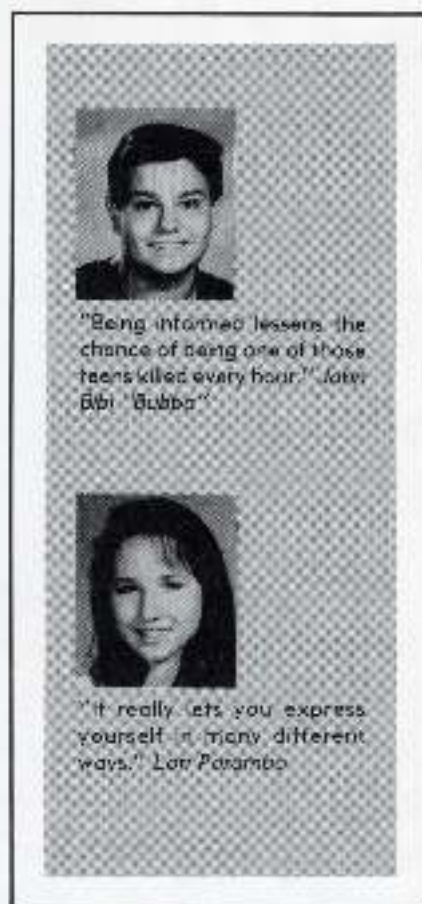
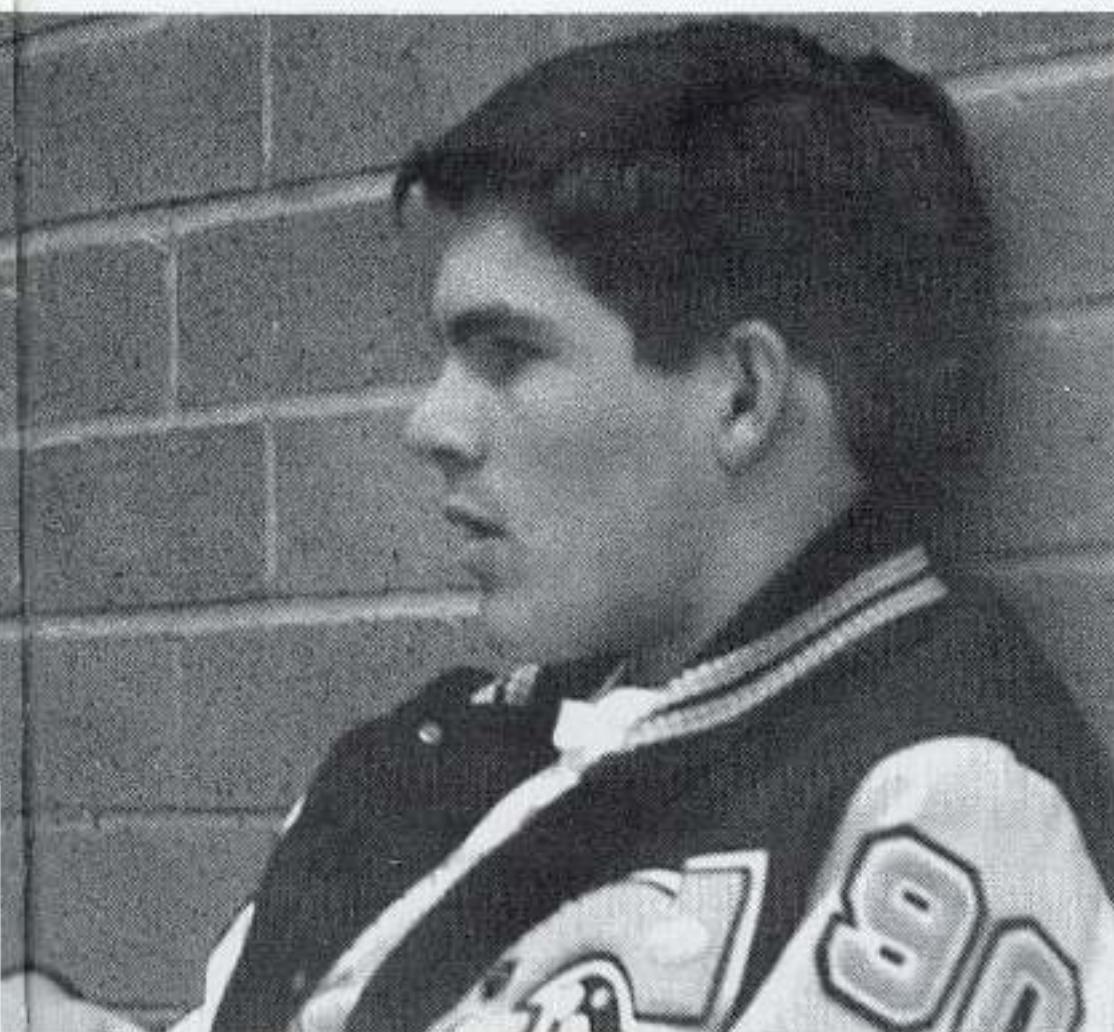
Through poems and short stories, with outstanding photography and art, the members of the writing club were given the opportunity to express themselves. After all the hard work and time, the works were bound and sold to students.
