## 2017 American Indian Celebration Report

Everyone enjoyed the AVIM American Indian Celebration on October 21 and 22. We had 346 visitors on Saturday and 402 visitors on Sunday, a total of 748 visitors for the weekend. Last vear we had 792 visitors.

FAVIM board member Cydnee Ashmore (Diné) shared her pow wow experience and connections in the Native community to bring the event to a higher level. She recruited professional Master of Ceremonies Michael Runningwind (Seneca/Chiricahua Apache) to oversee activities in the dance arena. In addition to keeping things moving, Michael called for a variety of dances, all of which he explained to the audience. Cydnee also recruited Brendon Youngbear Urdanivia (Navajo/Tewa) and his drum group Buffalo Creek to provide Northern Traditional Style songs for the dancers. Thanks to the recruiting efforts of Cydnee Ashmore and museum volunteer Raven Magpie-Rivera, 16 dancers joined us for the Celebration this year, including grass, men's traditional, women's traditional, women's fancy, and jingle dancers.

Our local southern California peoples were also represented. Chumash storytellers Ted and Dennis Garcia provided the blessing and shared traditional songs and stories. Fernandeno Tataviam President Rudy Ortega Junior, his two young sons, and tribal member Ray Rivera

Paul's son, Sean Paul Begay, provided a moving and inspiring tribute to his father. Paul was known to museum visitors as the artist who made the beautiful gourd dreamcatchers sold in the museum gift shop, and he staffed the family jewelry booth at the Celebration while his wife made fry bread. Paul grew up on the Navajo Reservation in Monument Valley, but he lived in the Antelope Valley for many years while working as a Registered Nurse for Los Angeles County.



A Visit to H. A. Edwards House in Eagle Rock

Everyone familiar with the history of the AV Indian Museum knows that it was built by H.

Arden Edwards in 1928. But before he homesteaded his Antelope Valley site he owned a home in Eagle Rock, CA. Eagle Rock is located north east of Los Angeles, near Pasadena.

Recently his former home, that he named Happy Camp, was put for sale. This gave those of us interested an opportunity to visit it.

#### The Listing read:

- Designed by Architect and Artist Arden Edwards in 1910
- 1207 Kipling Ave. Eagle Rock. A Historical Cultural Monument
- 2 Bedroom, 1 bath 1,186 sq. ft.
- Described as "cozy, secluded, a bit funky"

It sounded so interesting! Arriving at the address, the house can barely be seen from the street, as it's built high on a very steep lot. Entering through a gate, we climbed the stone steps lined with many native plants. About half way up there is a charming sitting area to rest and look at the view.








Art on a post in the living room
