### **Silents Under the Stars**

Another great evening under the stars is just around the corner! Mark your calendars, buy those tickets, and start anticipating one of *Friends of Hart Park's* major events, *Silents Under the Stars*. The date is Saturday, July 29th. Doors open at 6 PM when guests can sign in, select a favorite table, and take advantage of another value-packed silent auction. Vans will be available for those wishing to visit Bill Hart's mansion up the hill, a must tour for anyone desiring to see how one of Hollywood's most successful silent movie stars created his own authentic western paradise. Entertainment will be hosted by our own duo, Bill West and E.J. Stevens, whose humorous antics always delight and inform.

The Saguaro Sisters with Will Rvan will provide musical entertainment. Dinner, always delicious, is catered by Rattlers BBQ, followed by delicious deserts from Nothing Bundt Cakes. And the highlight of the evening, the purpose of the entire gathering, is another exciting silent movie. The evenings offering is Wagon Train, Bill Hart's silver screen story of the Santa Fe Trail, starring Bill and his onetime sweetheart, Jane Novak, As always, the movie will be accompanied by the amazing Ray Lowe at the keyboard, recreating the experience silent movie <u>arandparents</u> miaht have seen nearly one hundred years ago.

Silents Under The Stars is one of FOHPs major fund-raisers. The proceeds from the evening, mostly raised through silent auction bidding, are used to support the park in its quest to keep the memories of our western

heritage alive. Tremendous effort is expended to gather items that will be attractive to guests. Available for bidding will be dinners at area restaurants, tickets to amusement parks, beautiful western art, tickets to sporting events, unique items of western culture, and on and on. Last year, over 90 items were available. Hundreds of hours of effort go into the gathering and preparation of auction items; please be generous in your bidding.

**Wagon Tracks** is based on a story originally developed by Hart. Telling of the Santa Fe Trail from Missouri to New Mexico, it was filmed in three locations: the Mojave Desert, Victorville and Sacramento. In the film, Hart plays a trail boss whose brother is killed. Over the course of a journey along the Santa Fe

Trail, Hart narrows down the suspect and in a singularly brutal way exacts a confession. It is quite a movie and one of Hart's best performances, especially the scene where he discovers his brother is dead. This film and the one that followed, **John Petticoats**, represented several turning points in Hart's life. He was involved in discussions with four major stars planning the formation of United Artists (he dropped out of the negotiations). These were the last two films he made with long-time Collaborator Thomas Ince. It was also during the production of these two films that he met his future wife, Winifred Westover.

The Saguaro Sisters, Shona, Katrona and Karona, are known for their performance of Western Skiffle Jazz with the Official Singing Cowboy Band of Hollywood—Will Ryan and the Cactus County Cowboys. The sisters were the featured act for the Cicada Club's Mother's day show in 2015 and 2016, are regular performers at the Autry Museum, and at Bob Stane's Coffee Gallery Backstage. Additionally they have sung at the Orpheum Theater, the Los Angeles Arboretum and the Levitt Pavilion in Pasadena. William Z. "Will" Ryan is an American voice actor, singer, musician and comedian, probably best known for his voice work in the Christian radio drama Adventures in Odyssey and Adventures of Teddy Ruxpin.

If you've attended "Silents" the last few years you already know you can be assured of a great evening under Santa Clarita's evening sky. If you haven't been before, but are a fan of western history, and if helping to preserve this cherished part of our western heritage appeals to you, pick up that phone, or hop on the Internet and order tickets. Fifty dollars a ticket is less than you might pay for the dinner alone!

There is limited seating for this event and ticket sales are already moving at a brisk pace. To order, call 661-222-9542, or go to www.friendsofnartpark.org/silents. Tickets are \$50 each. On line payment is handled by Pay Pai.

# Happenin's 'Round the House

As we head into summer, we are looking forward to a busy season up at the Hart Museum, and we want to share with you some of the highlights...

#### Getty Intern

The Hart Museum staff is delighted to welcome Lilia Jiménez, who joins us for the summer as our Getty Intern. Lilia is a student at Occidental College, graduating in May 2018 with a BA in Sociology. During her time at Occidental, she has been active as a campus tour guide, assisted in the on-campus daycare center, tutored other students, just to mention a few extracurricular activities. She studied abroad in Italy, and speaks Italian. She is also a resident of Newhall, which means she comes to us with a head start, knowing a lot about Mr. Hart and having visited the Hart Museum. Lilia has also been the recipient of a Henry Mayo Foundation Scholarship, and has made the Dean's List every semester. During the ten weeks of the internship, her project will focus on research, writing, and documenting objects in the permanent collection. One goal of this internship is to provide Lilia the opportunity to learn essential historical research skills and develop a written voice in a museum and curatorial context. She will also be helping out with tours, which our interns often feel is one of the most valuable parts of the internship, as this strengthens their public speaking skills.

### Spanish Language Tours

First piloted in May, the Hart will continue to offer Spanish language tours one day each month. These tours are staggered among our regular tours. This project has been a collaborative effort between staff and volunteers, and even some assistance from our security guard, Alex Morales. We are also working on a handout for Spanish speakers on our regular tours that will provide them basic information on William S. Hart, his life and career, his home, and some of the most significant artifacts on display.

#### Museum Hours

Starting Saturday, July 1 the Museum will be testing out a weekend tour schedule starting every hour, rather than every half hour on Saturdays and Sundays. As we can only have one tour in the house at a time, for security reasons, this will provide those giving tours a degree of flexibility in pacing their tours when they have an especially interested and curious group. We believe this will provide a better experience for our visitors, as well as our volunteers. We will be looking at how this affects tour sizes, total number of guests for the day, and visitor comments. Weekday tours will remain on the every half hour schedule.

#### **Events at the Museum**

Every Saturday – we continue to offer a simple craft activity every Saturday (we call it
"Crafterday"), located at a table on the back patio where visitors exit the museum at the
end of their tour. Sometimes the craft will tie in to special days, such as Independence
Day, National Paper Bag Day (yes, that's a thing), or Earth Day.

- Wednesday, July 19 Themed Open House (theme TBD), where visitors enter the museum as they arrive at the house, and once they've been given the rules. Then they are free to explore at their own pace, spending as little or as much time as they want. We have staff and volunteers stationed throughout the house to answer questions or talk about particular spaces. There will be some activity stations tied to the theme, both inside and outside the museum.
- Saturday, July 29 Silents Under the Stars again this year, we will have the house open from 6:00pm to 6:45pm for those attending this special screening. There will be shuttles transporting guests up the hill, and guests will have a chance to walk through the museum before the show starts down at Hart Hall. We will have staff and volunteers throughout the house to engage visitors.
- Thursday, August 17 Creative Activity this event for families will take place down at the Ranch House, and will have several things to do relating to a theme, and with an educational component.
- Saturday and Sunday, September 30 and October 1 Pow Wow the Museum will be represented at a table down in the picnic area, and will have an activity suitable for kids (and young-at-heart adults).

With all these great goin's on, we hope to see you up at the Hart Museum this summer!

### **New Beginnings**

Whenever there are endings in life, there are also beginnings. With the passing of longtime Barnyard residents Norman and Gracie, two enclosures became available. The first enclosure was the double-sized where one. Norman resided. We had been considering different types of animals for that enclosure but with a goal of introducing something new to the park. Our main goal has always been education, so bringing new types of animals into the existing facility was a keen prospect. Additionally, we strive for win/win situations. By this I mean, if we can help someone else out in their situation (for example, rescuing animals in need of a new home), that is an added benefit. As fate would have it, we came upon a situation that worked out perfectly for all involved. As a result, we ended up taking in five female alpacas on April 19th. All five airls are different colors, with two mamas and three offspring. What a delight to get these beautiful girls! I let my Barnyard staff name them, with the only condition being that the names all start with the letter 'C.' They chose: "Cruella" for the gray mama; "Carma" for her daughter, the brown one with white on her face: "Clarice" for the black mama; "Coco" for the dark brown daughter; and "Chanel" for the light brown daughter. The Friends of Hart Park purchased new lead ropes and halters for each of them (THANK YOU, FOHP!!), and we have been getting them out regularly for walks around the park. Also,

they were sheared for the season on May 22nd. We are hoping to sell their fleece, once it has been processed into yarn, in the Hart Park Gift Shop.

The second enclosure available for new occupancy was where Gracie had been housed. Over two years ago, a local resident had approached me about taking his two Sulcata tortoises, if we had space. Since that time, I had considering that possibility. Tortoises are not the typical 'barnyard' animal. However, I believe that William S. Hart was a visionary. He defended animal rights in the movies before there were official protections. And, he had the foresight to leave his estate as a gift to the public, instead of just passing it along to family and having its historical value get lost along the way. thought 'outside the box.' As an Animal Advocate and Educator, I value all animals – not just the furry and cuddly kind. Reptiles are often misunderstood and feared, often times, without good reason. I believe that Mr. Hart would applaud the Barnyard embracing something new and exciting, that educates and promotes welfare of all animals. Therefore, on April 20th, we welcomed our two new Sulcata tortoises into the Barnyard. They were appropriately named "Bill" and "Mary Ellen" – after Bill Hart and his sister Mary Ellen Hart. Since tortoises can live to be up to 150 years old (and ours are only 17 and 15, respectively), the legacy of Bill and Mary Ellen will continue on for many future generations. Now, that is a legacy that we can all be proud of!




