The manner in which the Hart High bus drivers meet the tremendous task set before them each day is greatly appreciated.



Senior Memoirs

In the Fall of '57, President Donna Arey called to order the first meeting of the Class of '61. The other officers were Marilyn White, Cathy Oppenheimer, and Polly Brandt. At this meeting the first activity for the Class of '61 was discussed. It was a dance which was held on October 16, 1957. At the beginning of the Freshman year, although many of the class members were active in clubs and organizations, Linda Deivert was the only one to hold office. Eighteen Freshmen boys were brave enough to participate in sports. Cee cheerleaders were Donna Powell and Myrna Cash. The year was a new experience for a hundred and eighty-six Freshmen.

By the time of the Sophomore year, the Class of '61 thought life would be quite simple. We accomplished Drivers' Education with only a few minor mishaps. The class officers were now Bob Reed, Ginger Lombardi, Rita Freeman, and Myrna Cash. Susan Collins became vice president of the C.S.F. On the Annual Staff Dick Meyer became photography editor, and Kathi Towe, the class editor. Paula Good, Carol Rising, and Donna Riley all became editors on the **Smoke Signal.** Le Eckles became an officer in the Camera Club and Patty Nickles was elected secretary of the Pep Club. Jackie Edwards and Eneta Jones became Song Queens while Lynda Michaud and Kathy Fields became Majorettès. The two Cee cheerleaders plus Sharon Sitton became the Bee cheerleaders.

That year the Class of '61 won first place both with its Homecoming float and its I.C.C. assembly entry, but in the clothing drive received the "lemon." Nine more boys joined the ranks of the athletes. At the end of the year there were many disputes before the choice of the class ring was finally made. Early in the Junior year the choice of the class sweater and emblem was the main topic of excitement. Marilyn White designed the emblem.


Steve Stone, Eneta Jones, Terry Warring, and Ginger Lombardi were elected class officers in 1960. Myrna Cash and Donna Powell were elected Varsity Cheerleaders. By then there were two hundred and ten of us on campus. Johnsie Yurosek, Donna Riley, and Carol Rising were elected officers in Girls' League, while Eneta Jones was elected vice president of the Argonauts. Bob Friedrichsen and Jim Jordan were elected to Spartan offices. Steve Stone and Bob Mustard were added to the Annual Staff. Paula Good was co-editor of the school paper. Norman Sands was treasurer of the Varsity Club. The Junior Class provided the Spanish Club with its officers. That year Sharon Jaegar was vice president of the Art Club. Steve Stone was treasurer of the Key Club. In Pep Club, Carol Rising, Lorraine Montenegro, and Johnsie Yurosek were elected officers, as was Jim Jorden, and Susan Collins in C.S.F. Darla Cameron was an officer in the Choralaires.

In sports, Paul Mosley made first team, All C.I.F., and Bobby Collman received honorable mention in All League. **Terror in the Suburbs** was the Junior Play. The singing group known as "The Discords" emerged from the Class of '61. They were Jim Jorden, Don LeBaron, Bob Friedrichsen and Ted Carpenter. In the summer of '60 Carol Rising and Bob Reed attended Girls' State and Boys' State, respectively, and during that summer the Class of '61 became "top man on the totem pole." And so our Senior year began.










The language laboratory has proven to be an important part of the foreign language program.
