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
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



The Varsity Football players have proved that the Winter Sports Season of 1968-69 was the biggest and best. Sacrificing pleasure for hard work, the team carried Hart through a football season of glory and victory.

Our cheers of inspiration and tears of dedication were rewarded with a seasonal record of nine wins and no losses, defeating Santa Clara for the first time in Frontier League Play.

Although many people can be cited for their devoted efforts in supporting a winning team, Coaches Dennis Wendt, Al Hansen, and Duane Whisler are the three men who were truly the most important instruments to a successful season. Their sincere devotion and dedicated work at practice went to "many games well played."

To be sure, our Varsity team is composed of the very best in players. However, there are some who deserve special recognition. Clint McKinney, who gained 1055 yards placing second in valley standings, is the first Hart player ever to make "All Valley First Team." He was also awarded "Most Valuable Player" both in League and on the Hart team. Tackles. Charlie Armstrong and Ron McWright were awarded "Outstanding Offensive Lineman" and "Outstanding Defensive Lineman", respectively. Linebacker Abby Nocciolo was voted "Outstanding Defensive Back" while quarterback Dean Raynor received the "Most Inspirational" award. Halfback Dave Potter was cited as "Most Improved Player" while the "Scholarship Award" went to John Zima, end. Among the players making "First Team All League" were Charlie Armstrong, George Rawson, Mike Underwood, Bill Staats, and Gary LaCore.

Members making "Second Team All League" were Ron McWright, Abby Nocciolo, and Pete Calzia. The "Honorable Mention All League" awards went to Dean Raynor, Jim Baxter, Richard Smith, Glen McLain, and Bill Lankford.







To sum it up, the high spirit and great enthusiasm generated by all Hart teams carried this Junior Varsity team through to a year of great pride and victory.









Their first year at Hart was filled with many new and exciting experiences and the Sophomores found that winning the float entry at Homecoming really made this their year. Class Of 1971



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






The crisp, biting chill of Winter winds race through Hart as students battle the raindrenched hallways in order to reach class on time.


But maybe the most significant promise for a record-breaking victory by Hart, comes with the return of three of the four members of the "B" relay team who placed fifth at C.I.F. last year.



Organizations Are Always In Season At Hart


Organizations have always played a vital part in student life at Hart. Whether one's interests lie in scholastic achievement, service, spirit, or sports, there is a club for every season at Hart.

Our pep squad are energetic girls who lead Hart's Indians in loyal support of their school and its activities.


The list of clubs goes on and on as every student discovers Hart spirit through organizations.







According to John the greatest lesson he learned as an Exchange Student is the fact that life in different parts of the world is not necessarily better or worse than ours but different. He also found from a personal stand point, that people are the same all over the world. Customs and ideas exist which might be considered antiquated or strange but they are not radically manifested in personal contact.

Yet, after fourteen suspense filled months, I finally arrived at the home of Mr. and Mrs. James Dickinson in Saugus, California.

What was in store for me, I did not know. I did know, however, that the success of my year in Newhall would not only depend on me but, also, the people of the community. I was not disappointed.

I was overwhelmed by invitations to many homes and places of interest, by offers of help and the innumerable kindnesses showered upon me.

The same is true of the kids at school. I always have, still do and always will maintain that the most pleasant period at school was the lunch break. It was then that I had an opportunity to meet, talk and make friends with you. I will always remember the pep rallies, executive board meetings, Halloween, and the football games.


In short, it has been a most memorable year for me, as I hope it has been for those of you whom I have come to know.







Pledged to chart a future for Hart High School to better prepare students to assume their places in the ever-expanding adult world; the District Administrators demonstrate their belief in the importance of education.




