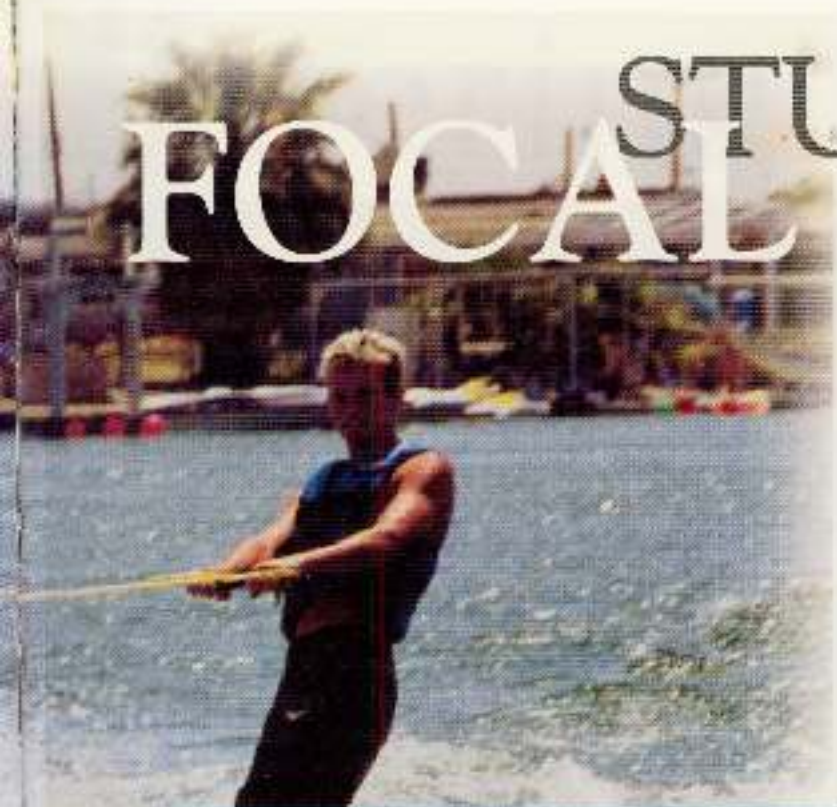

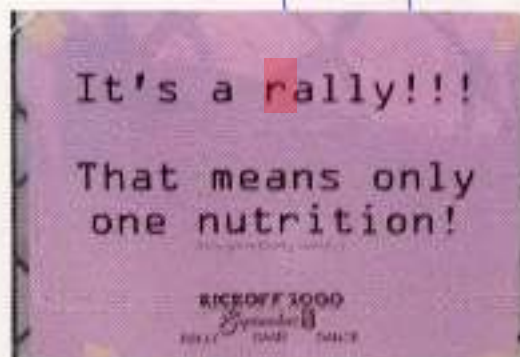

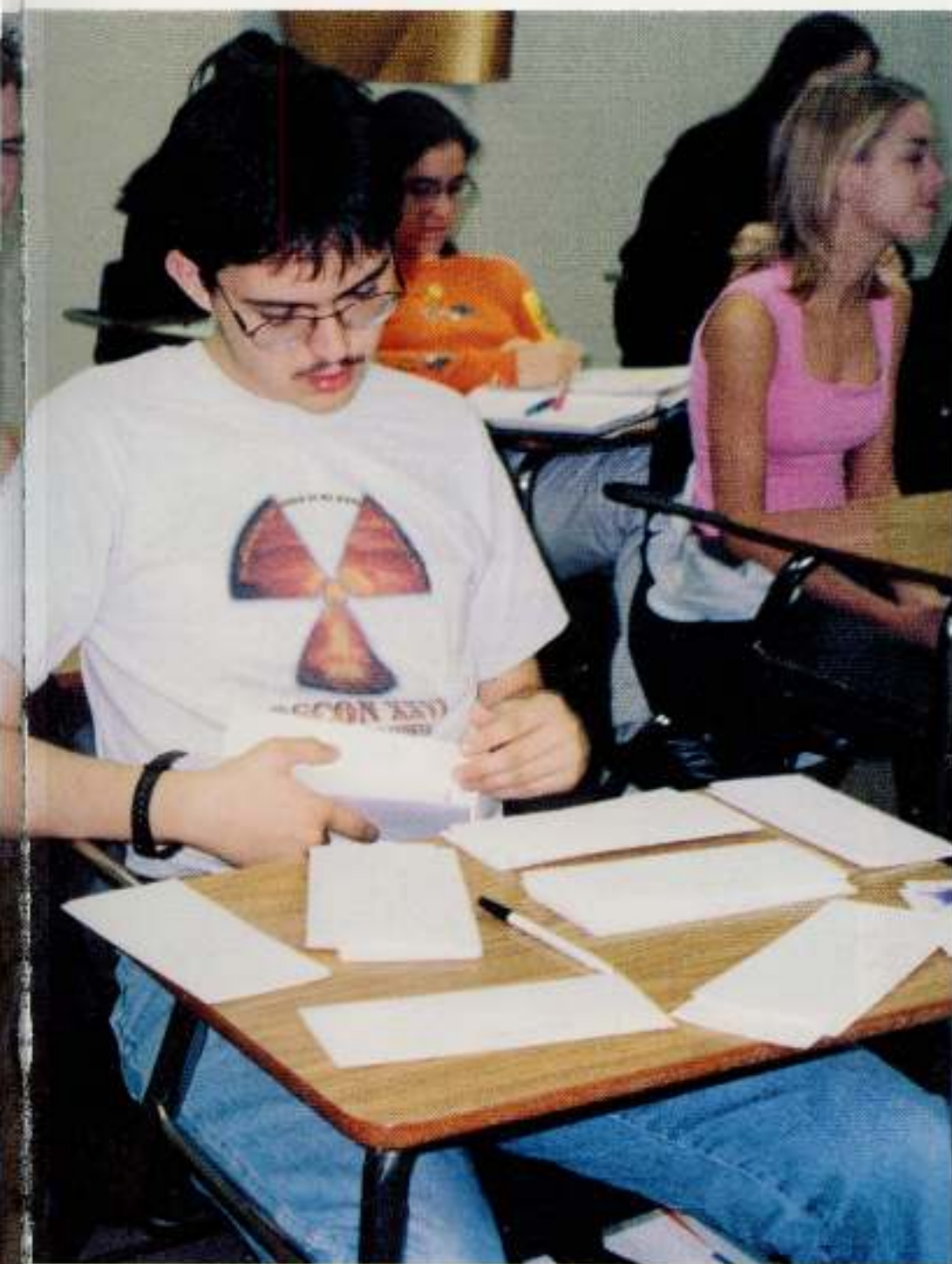

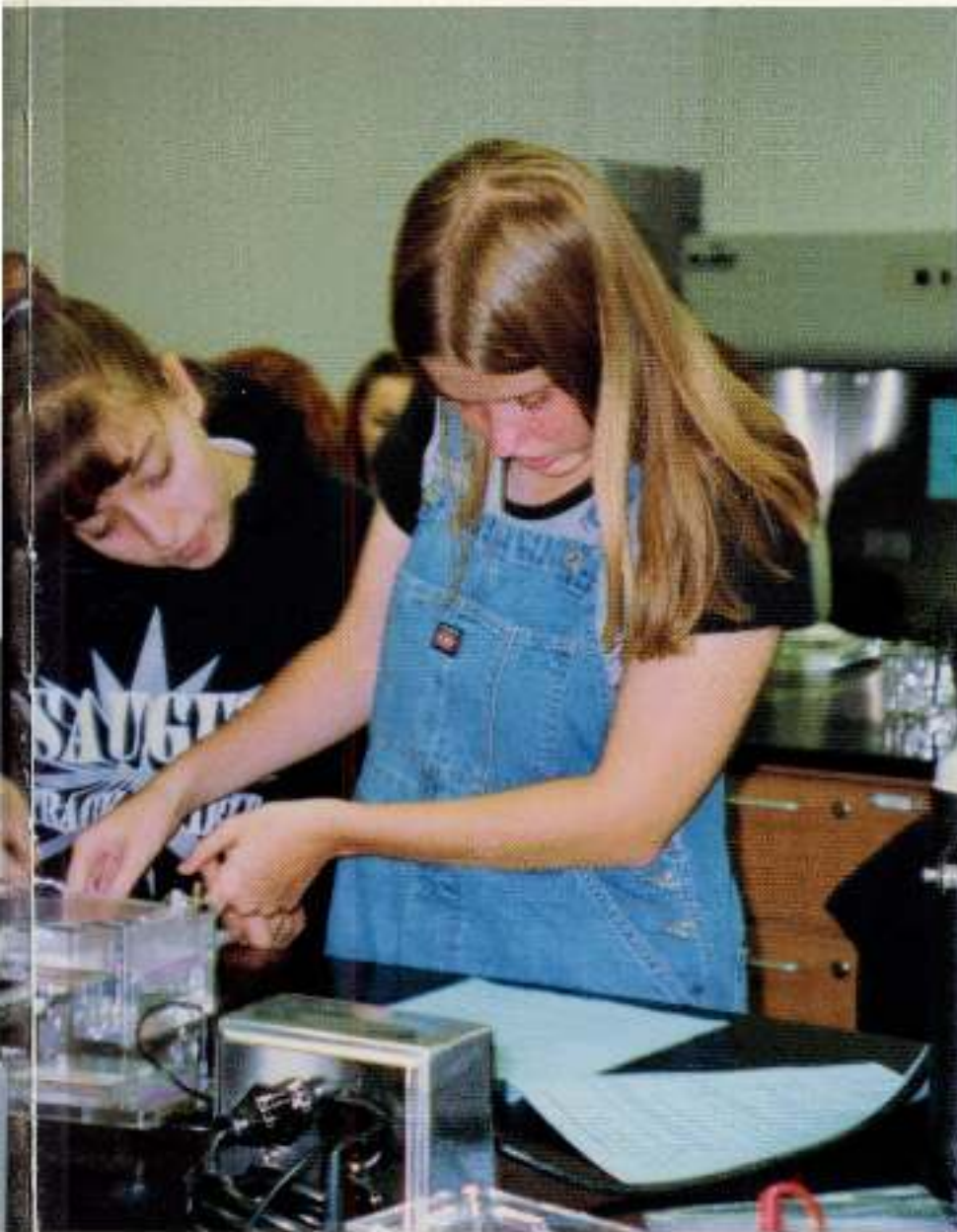

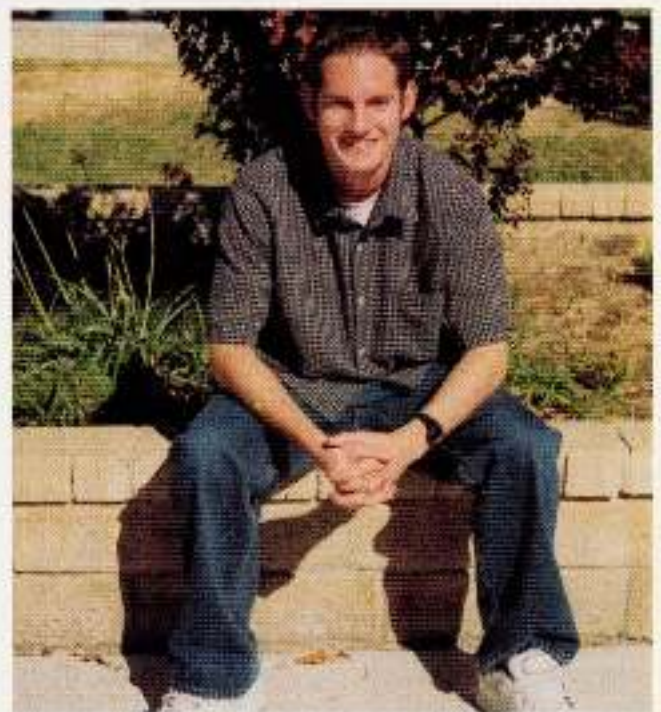
were almost 200 members registered, with an average weekly meeting

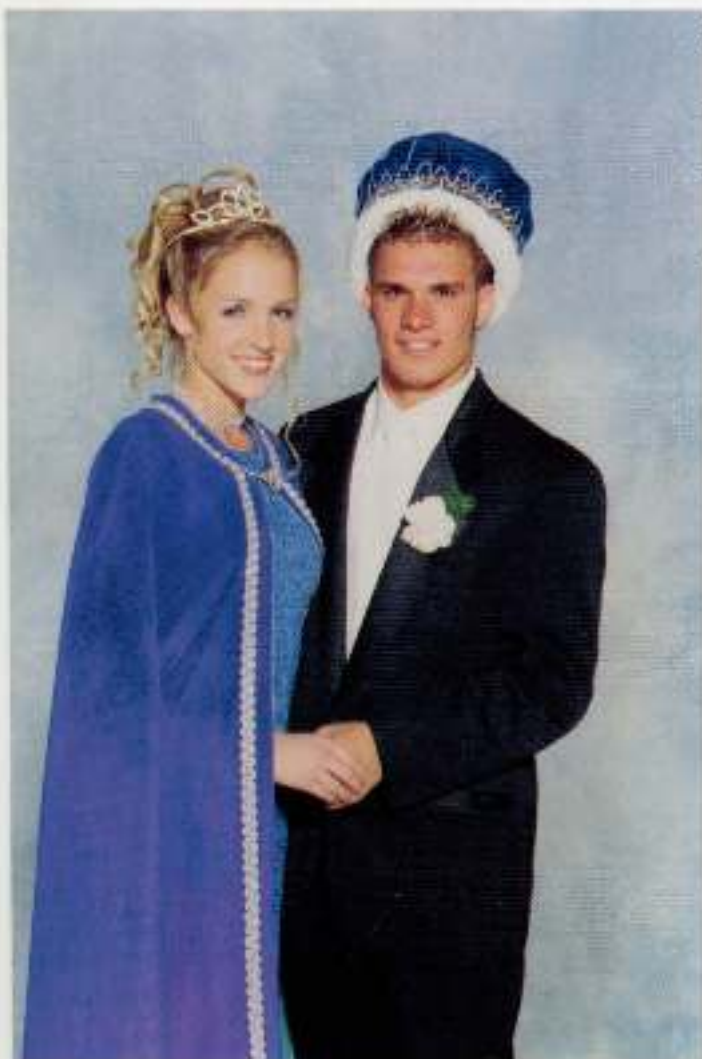

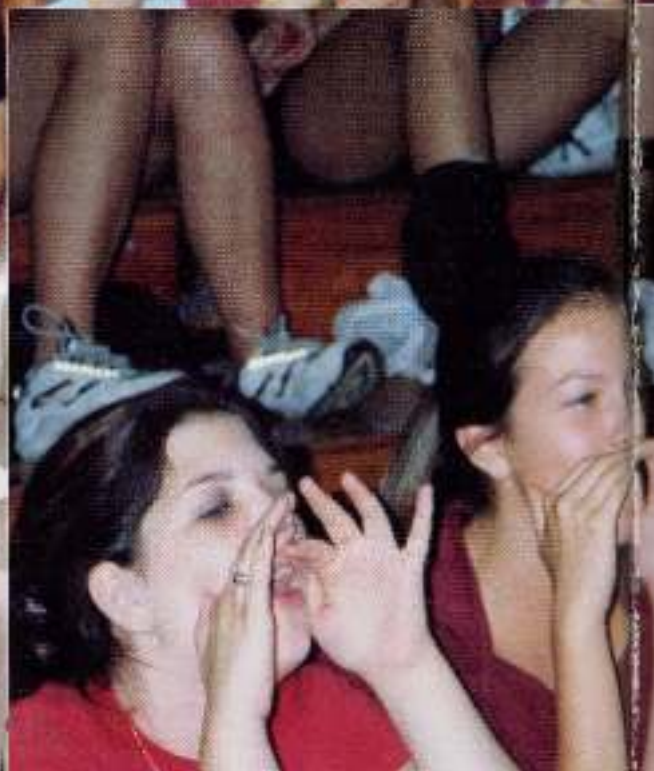

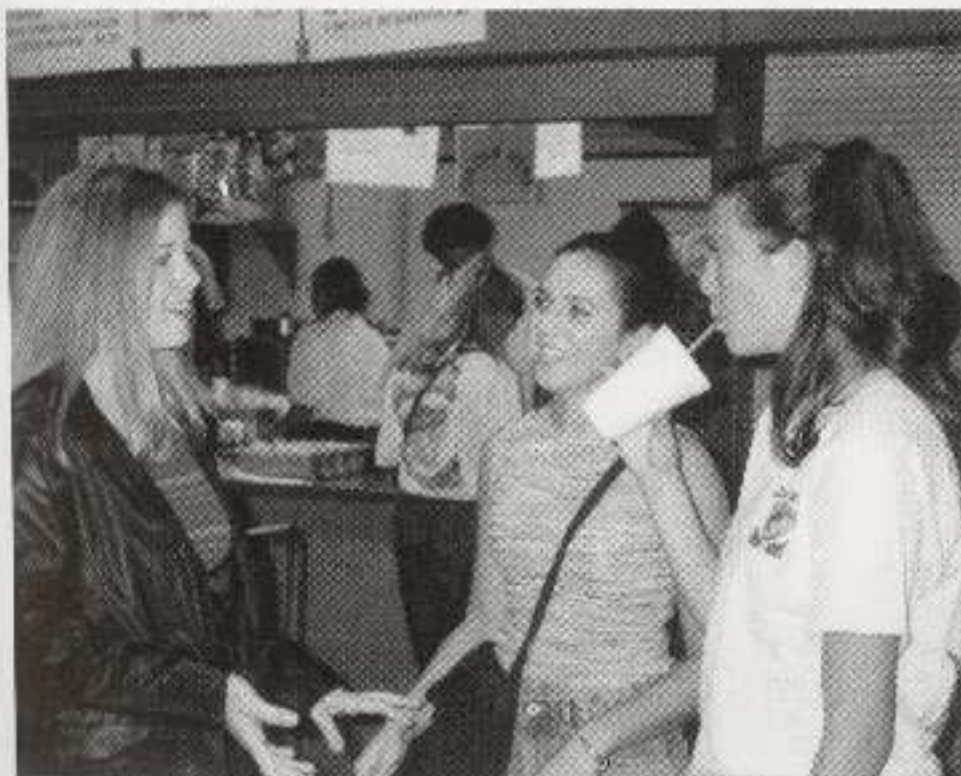

VISIBLE TALENTS

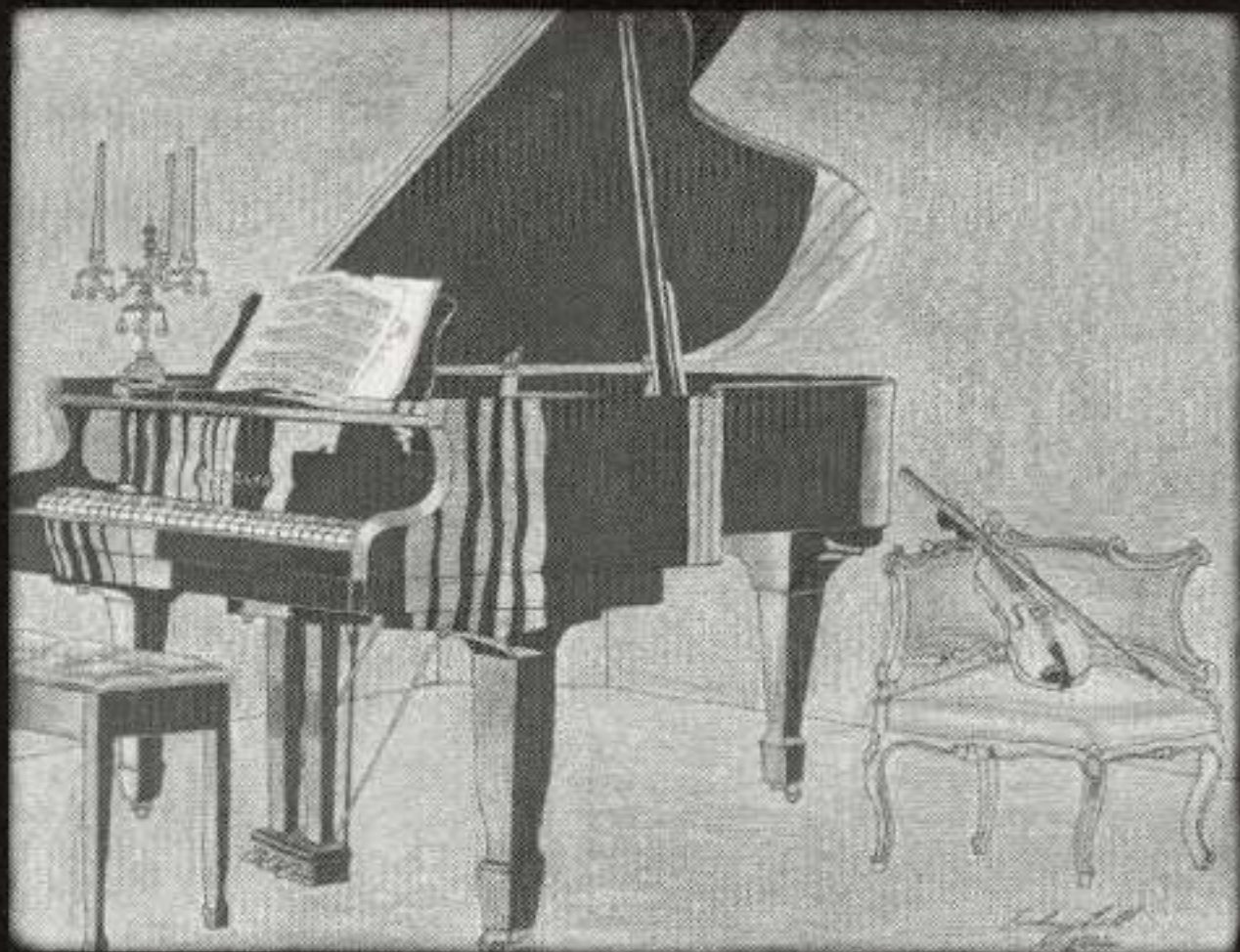

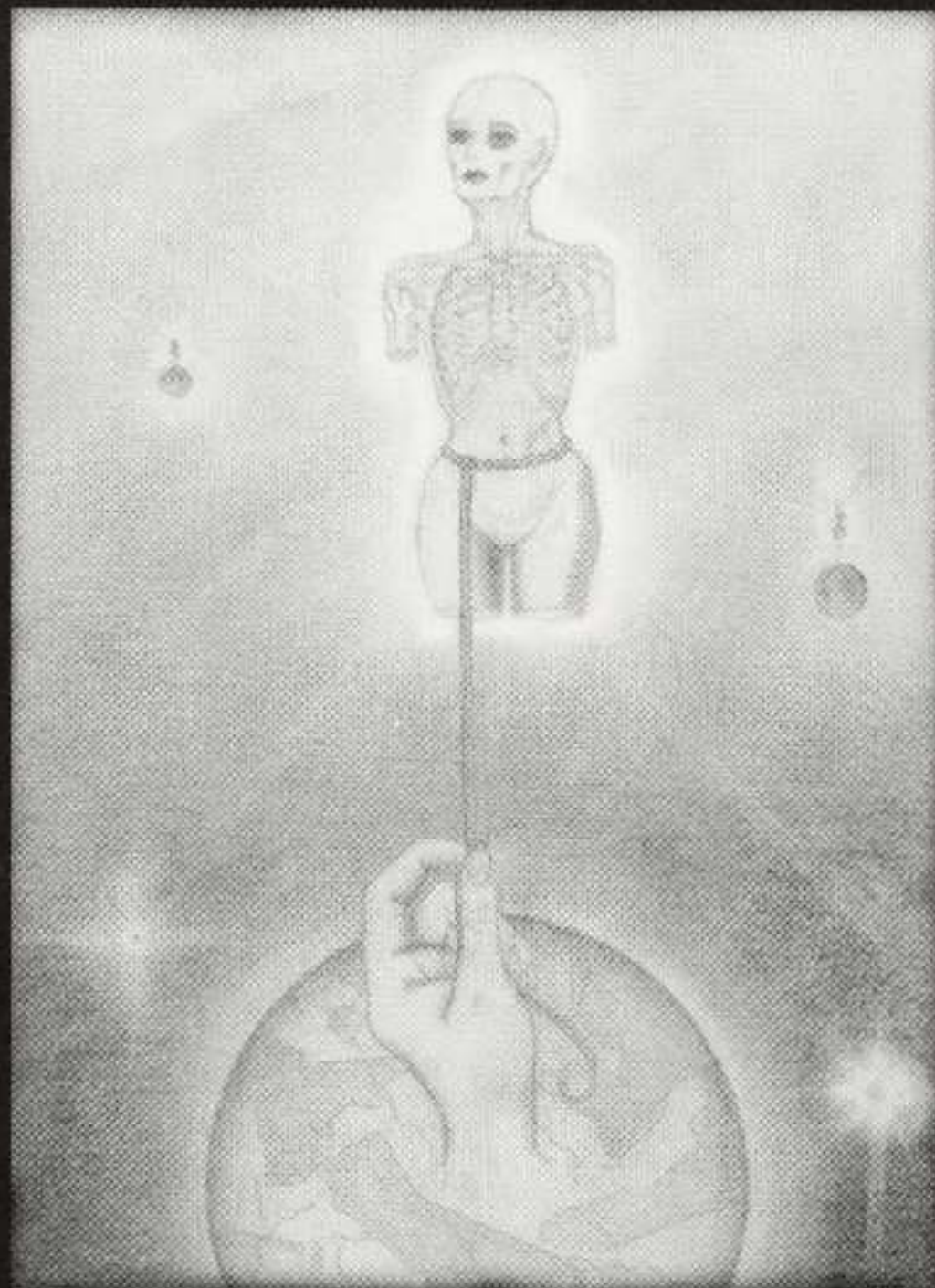

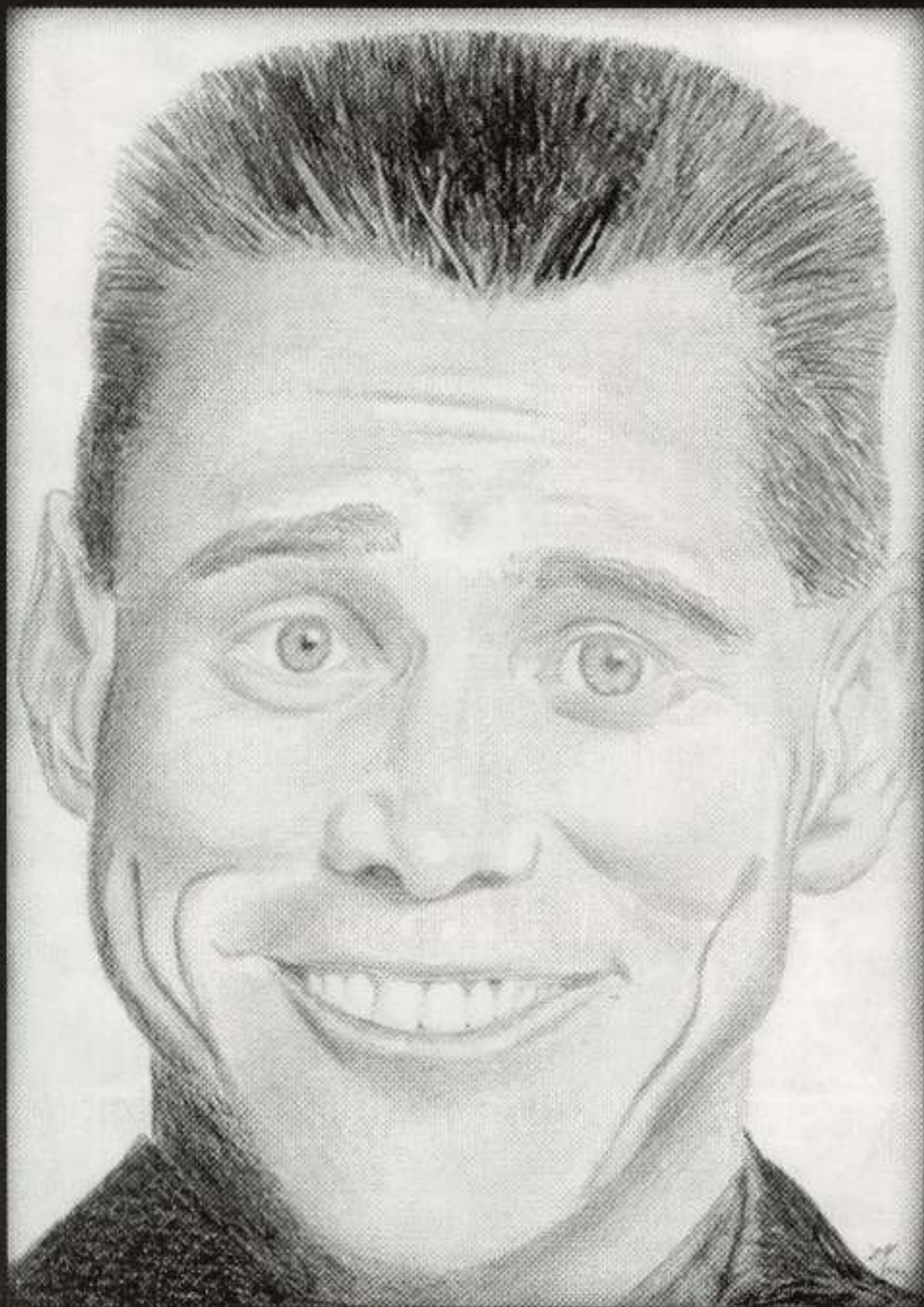
Non-Fiction Writing:

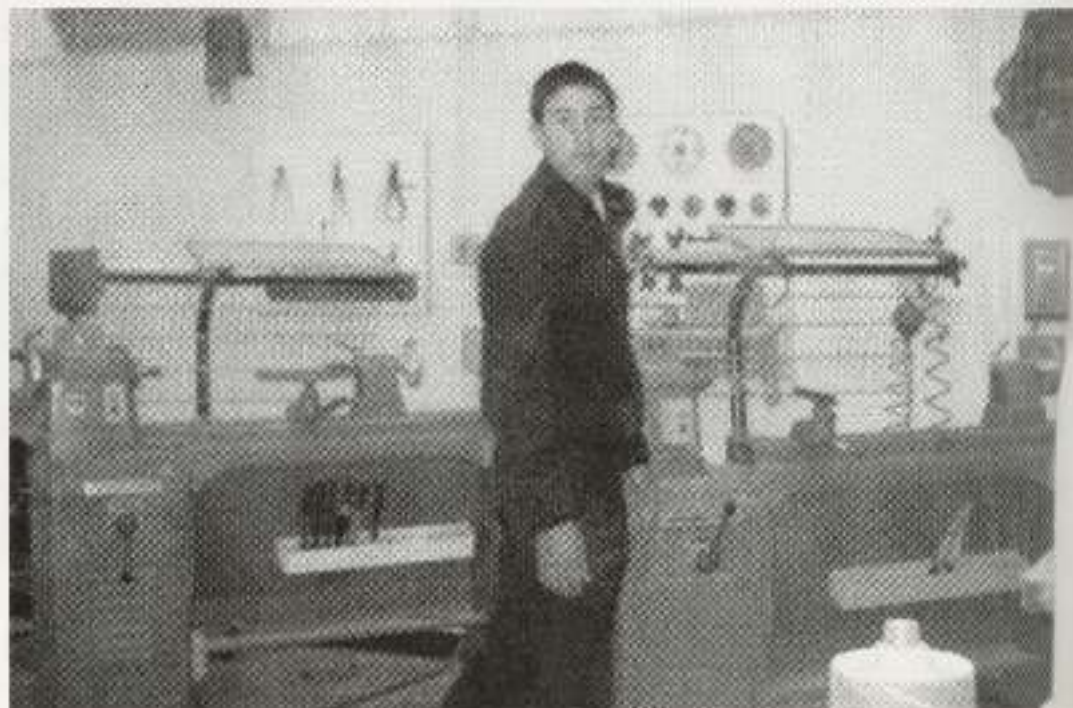


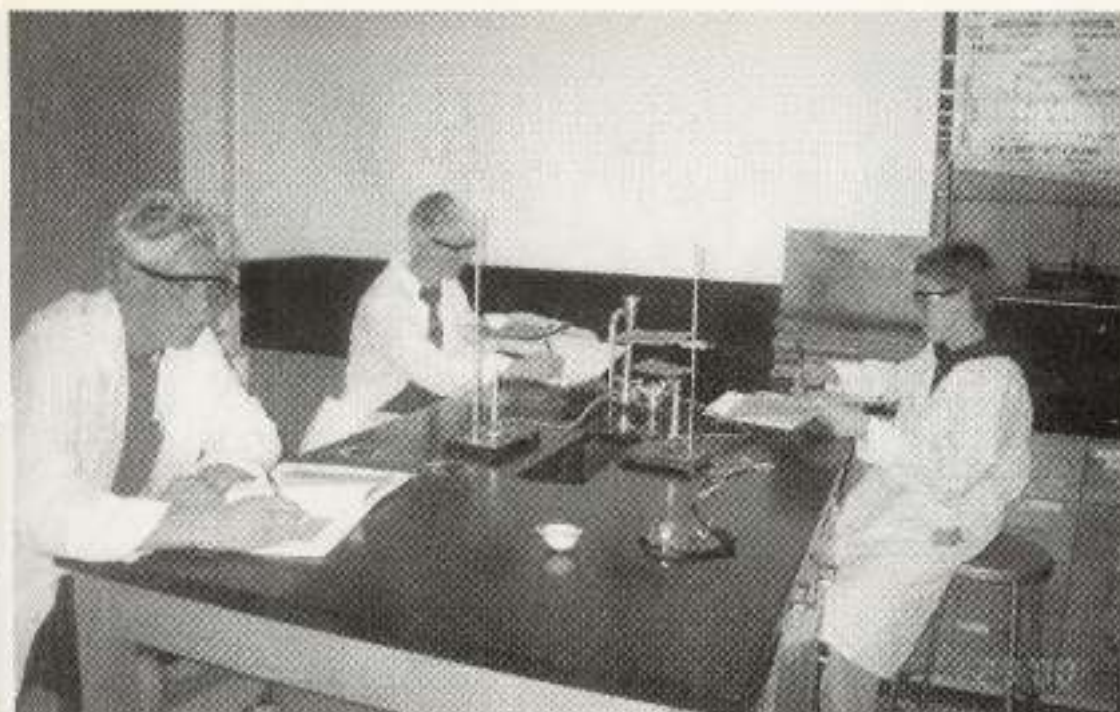

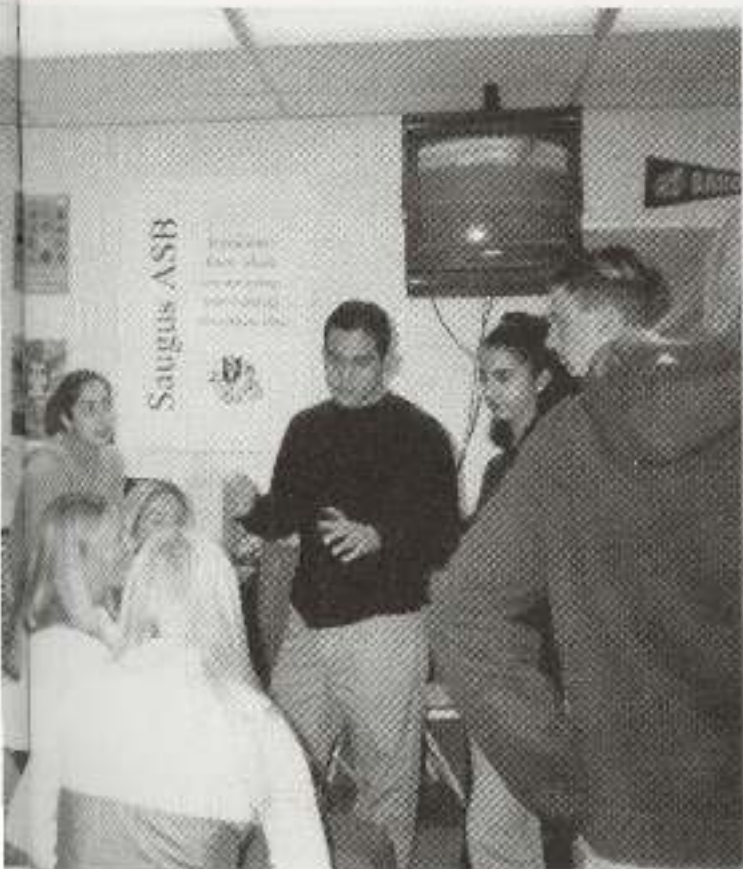

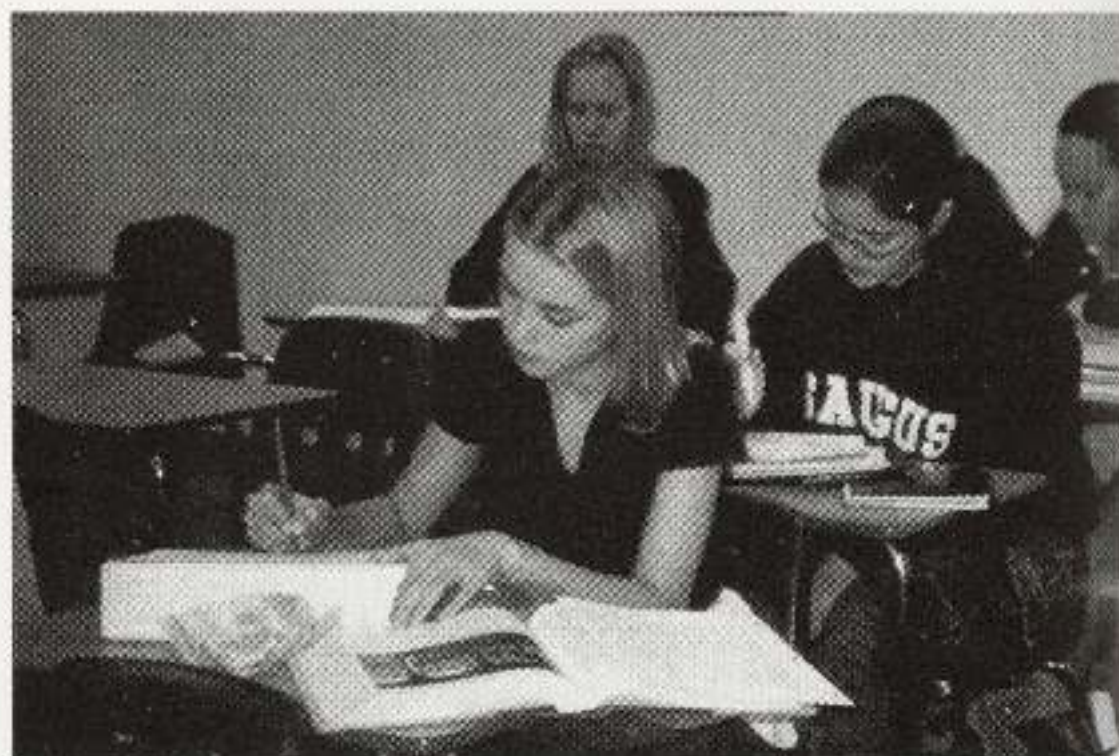

Using creativity and patience, the *Science Olympiad Team* attends competitions year after year showing off and testing their hand-made projects. 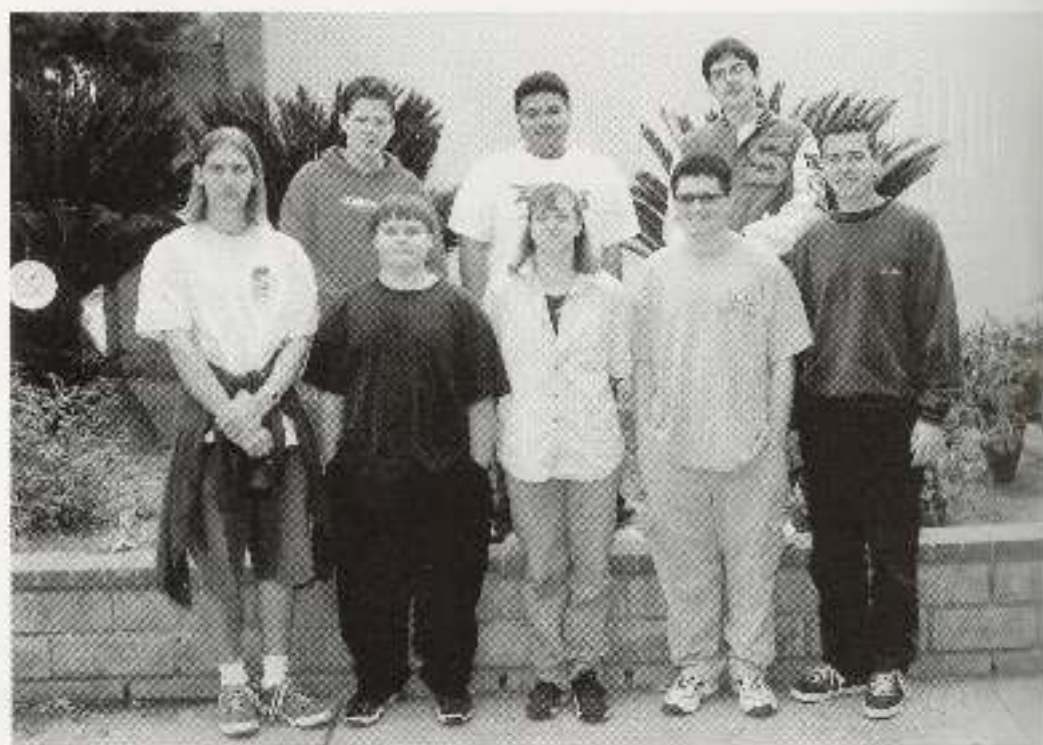

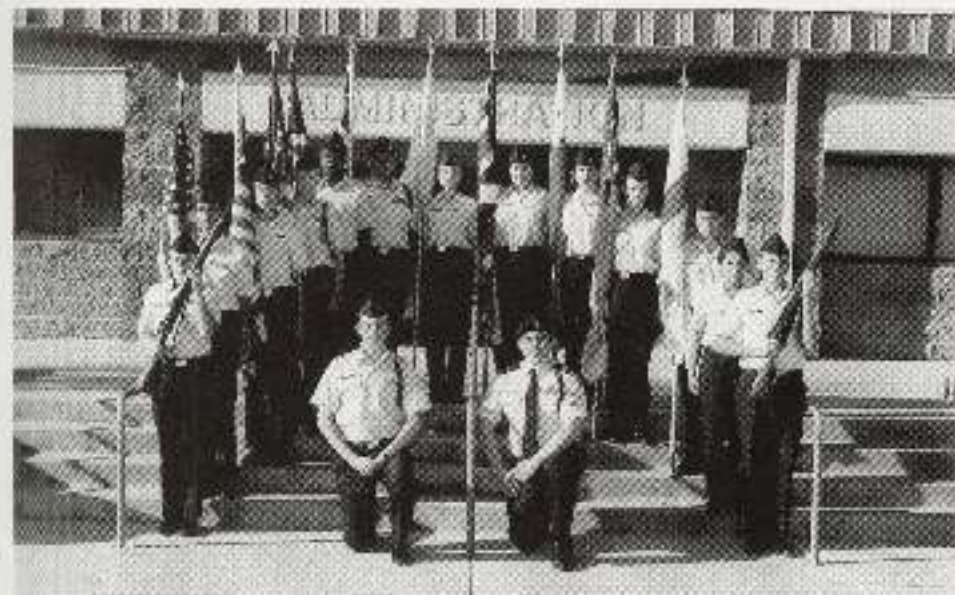

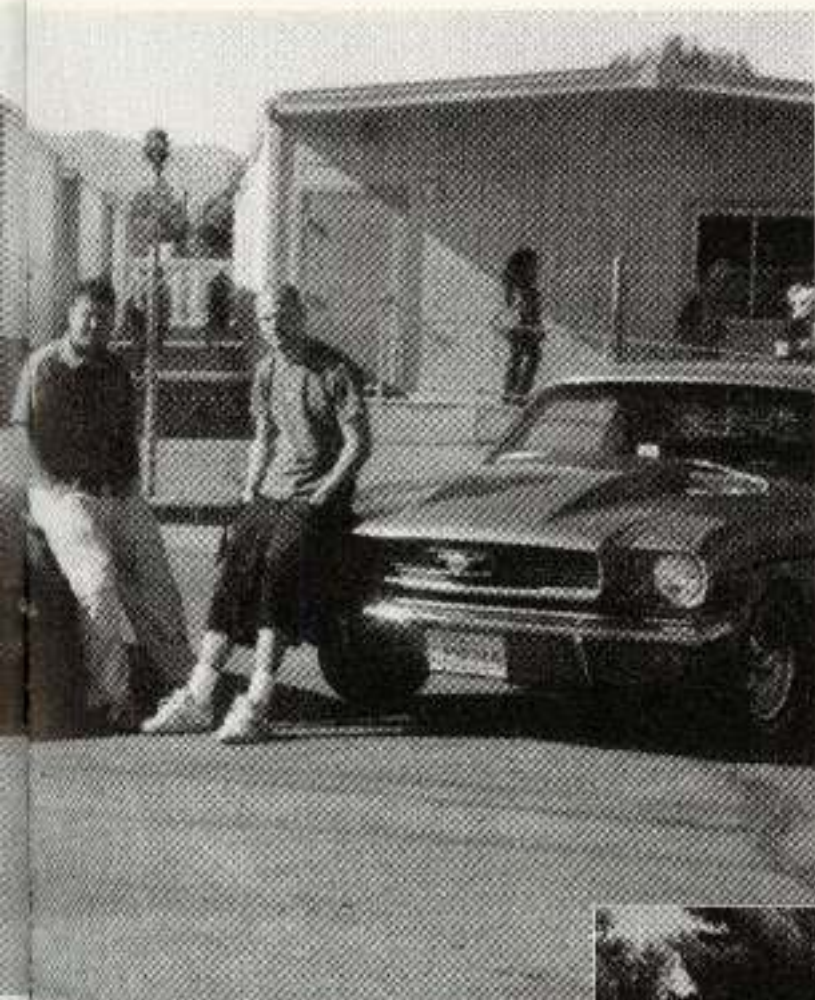

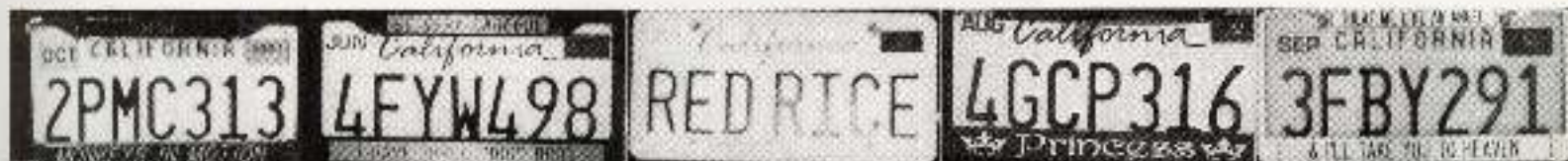

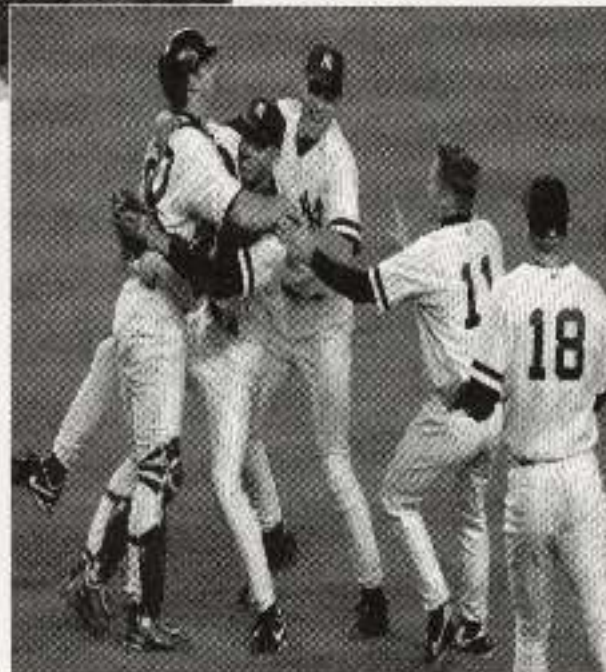

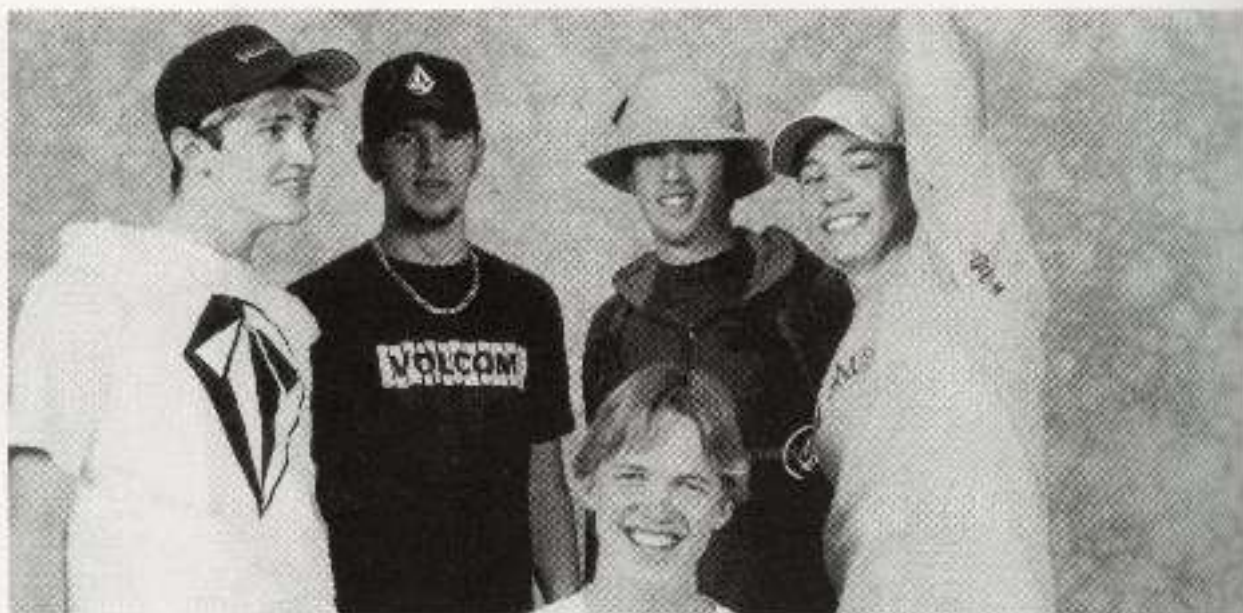

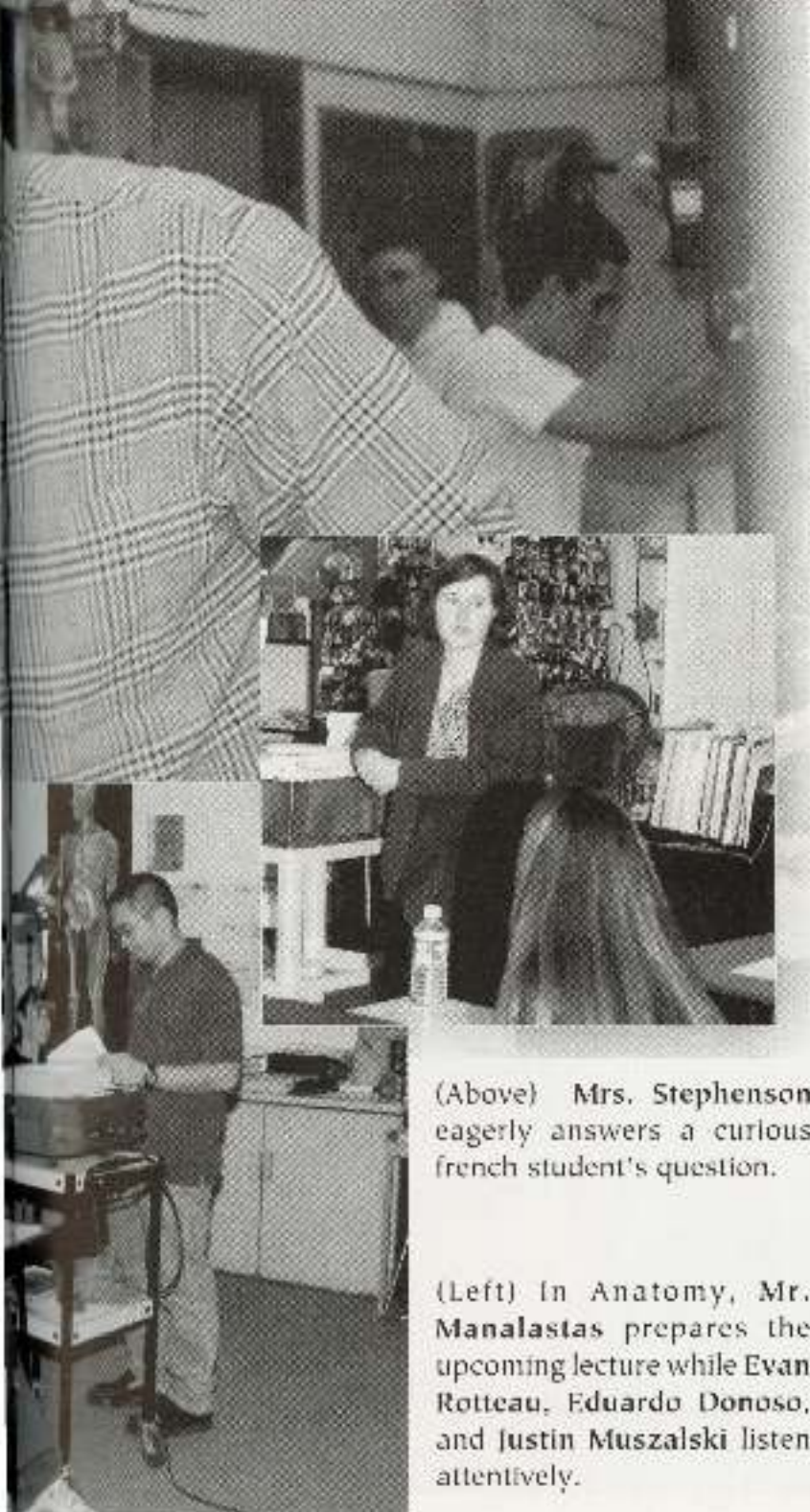

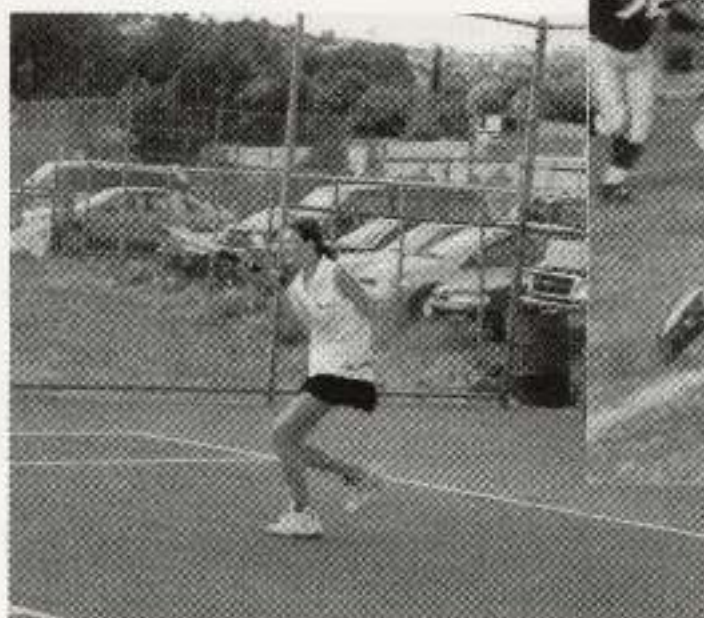

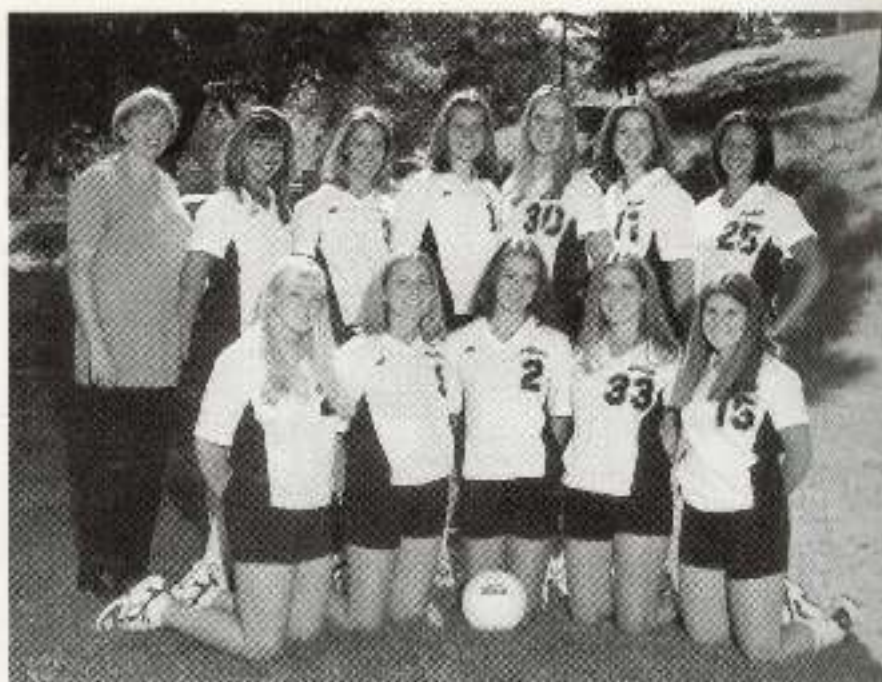

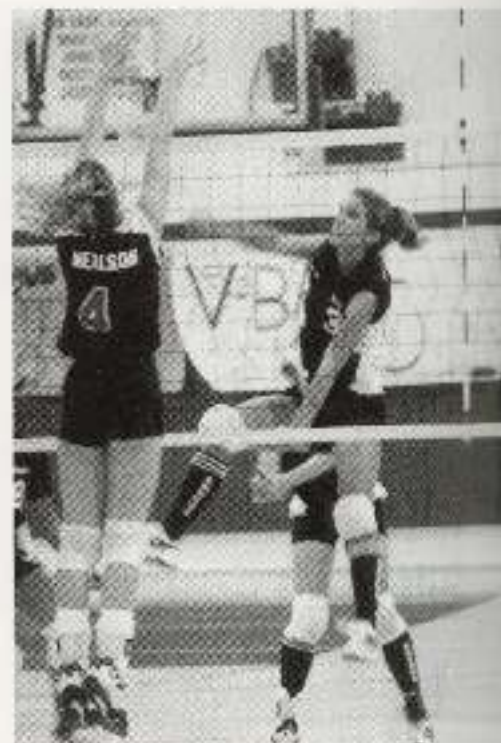

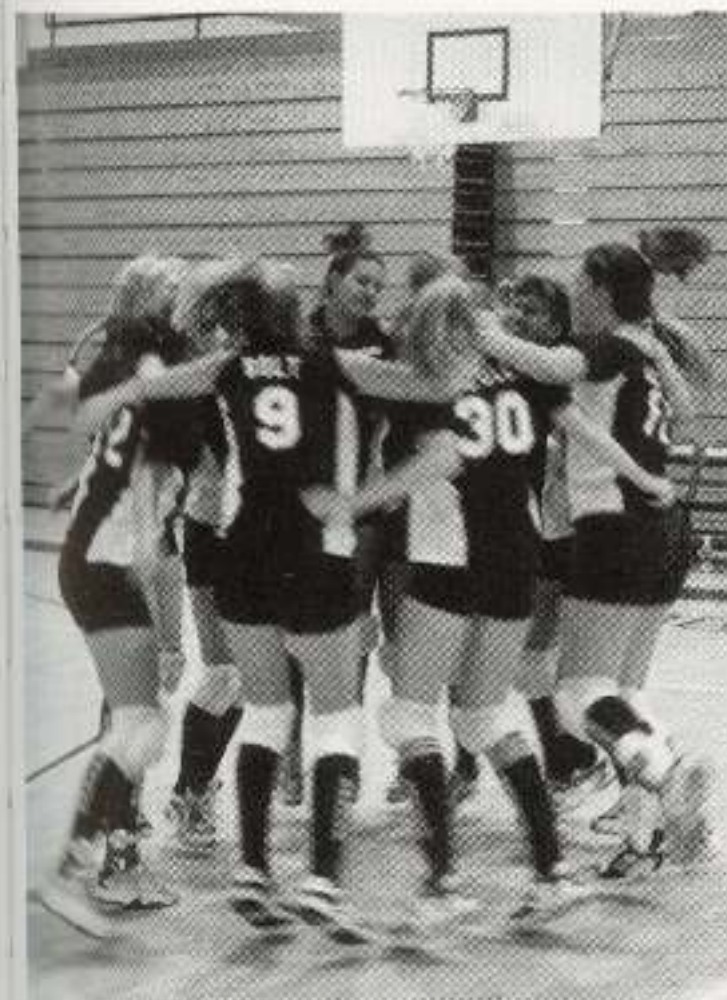
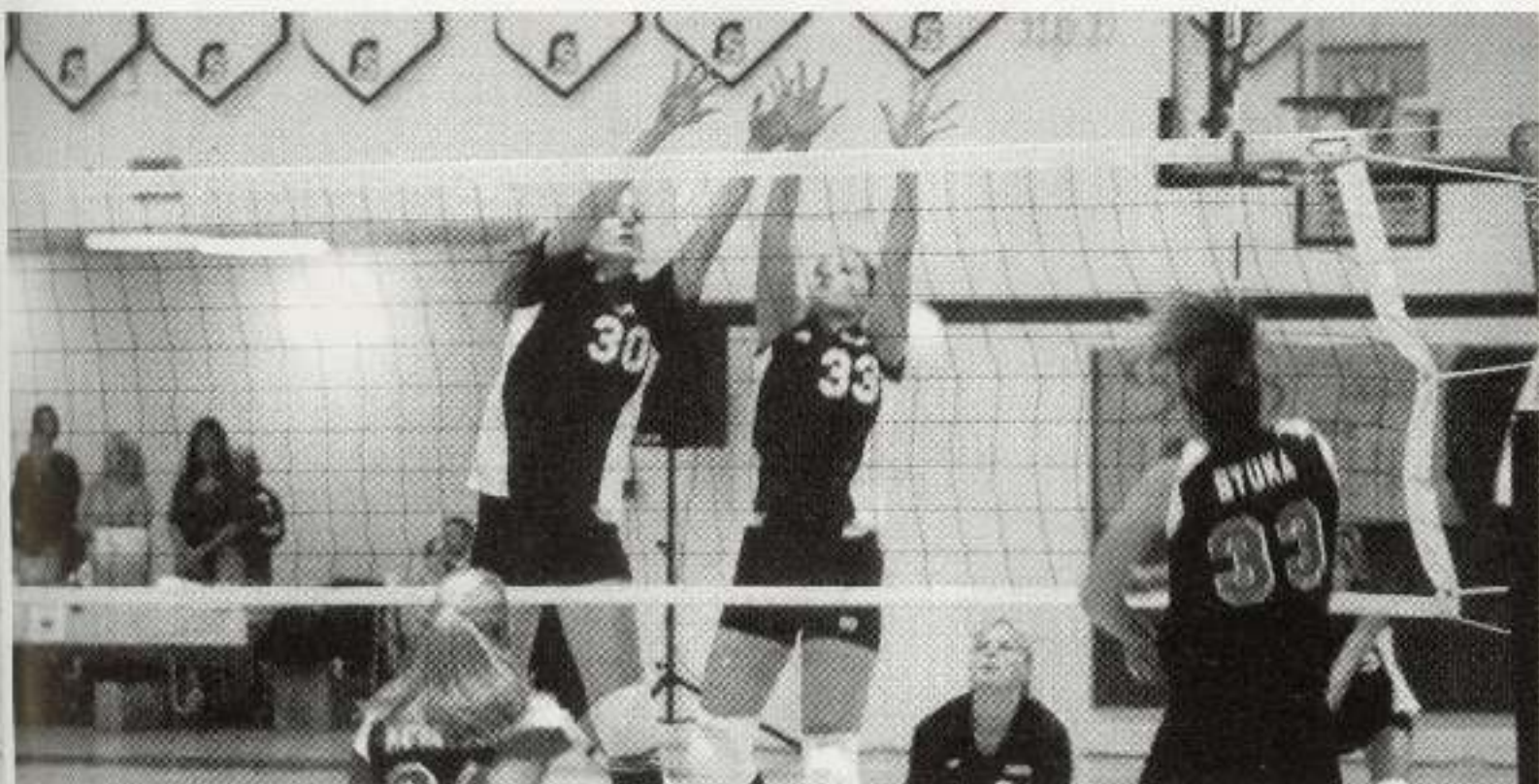

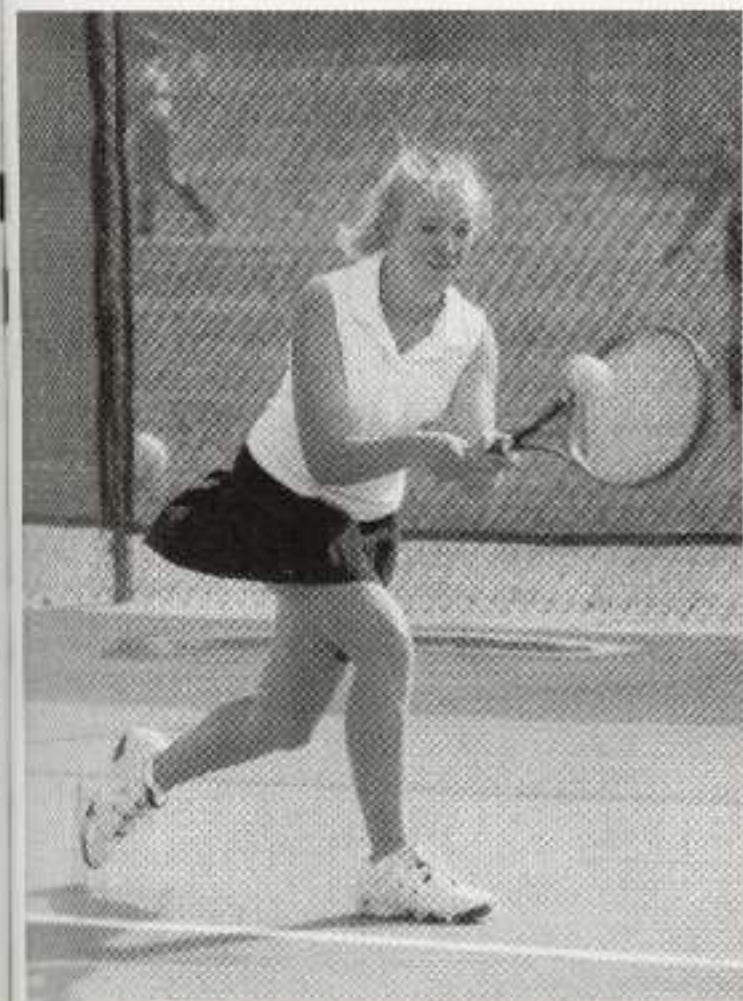

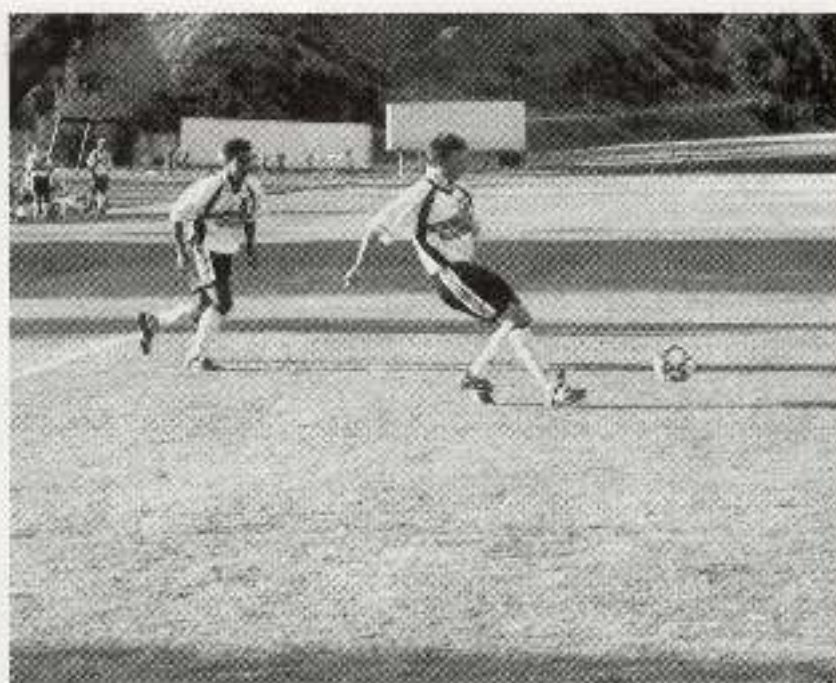

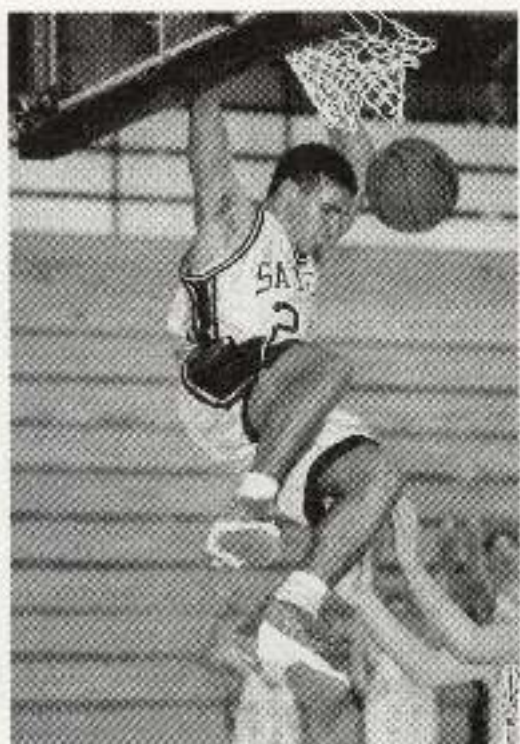

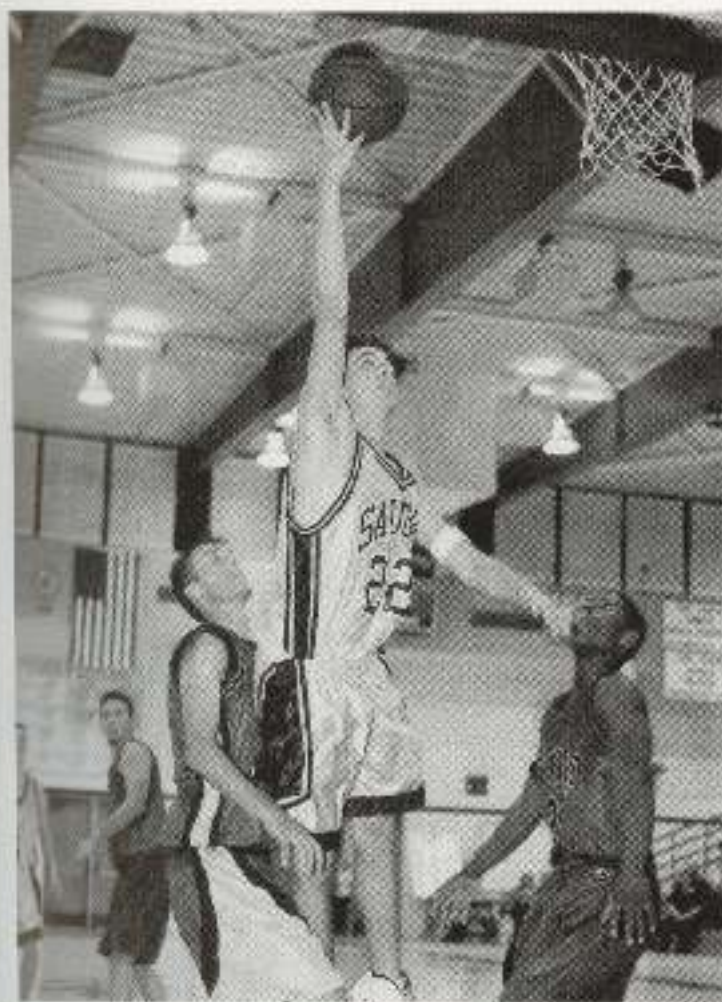

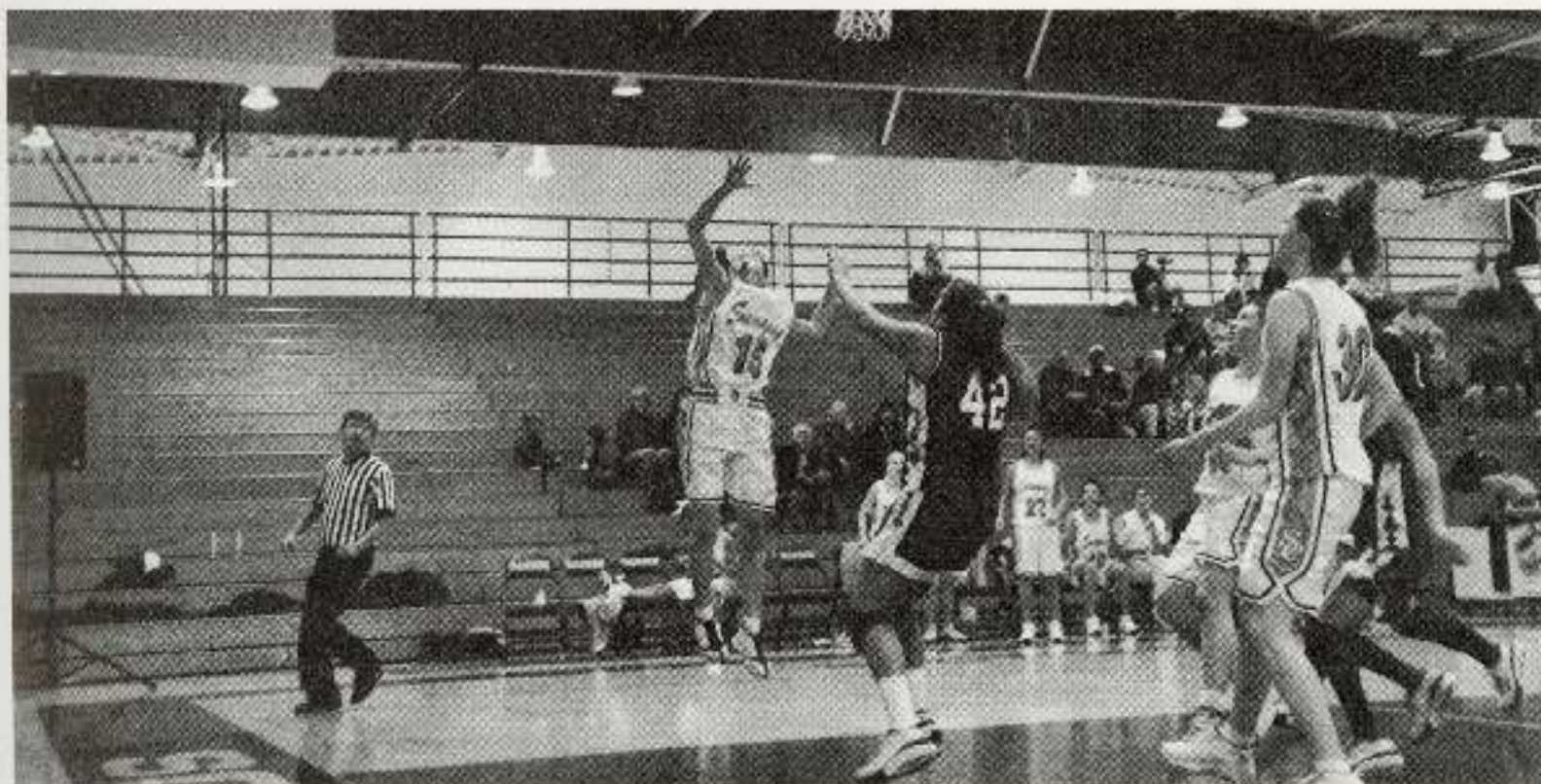

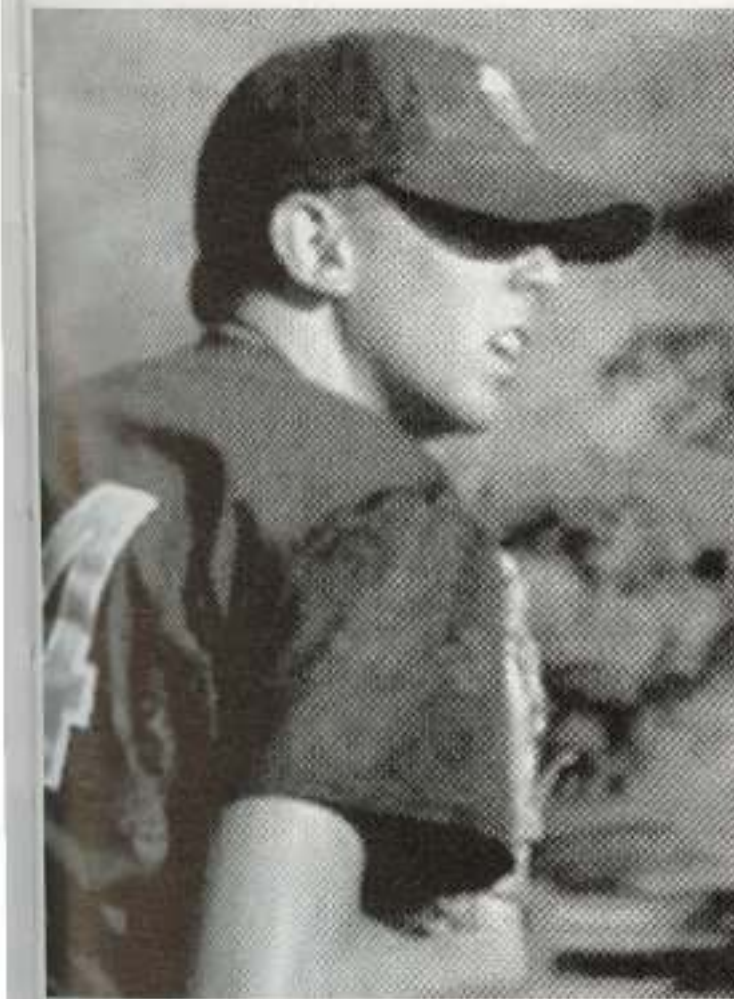

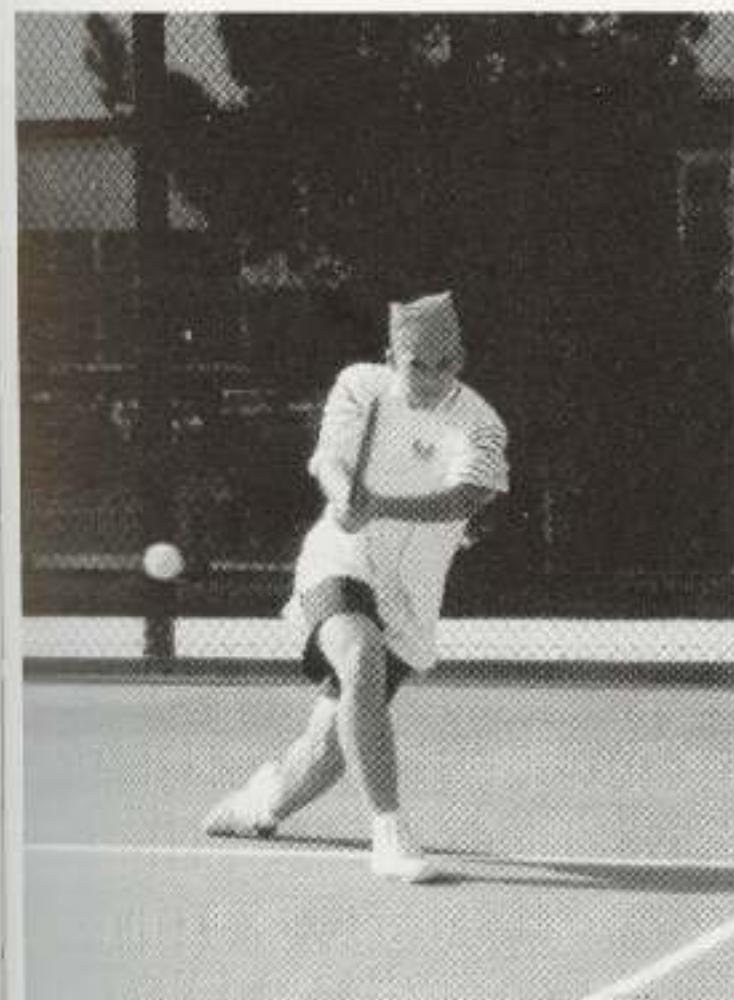

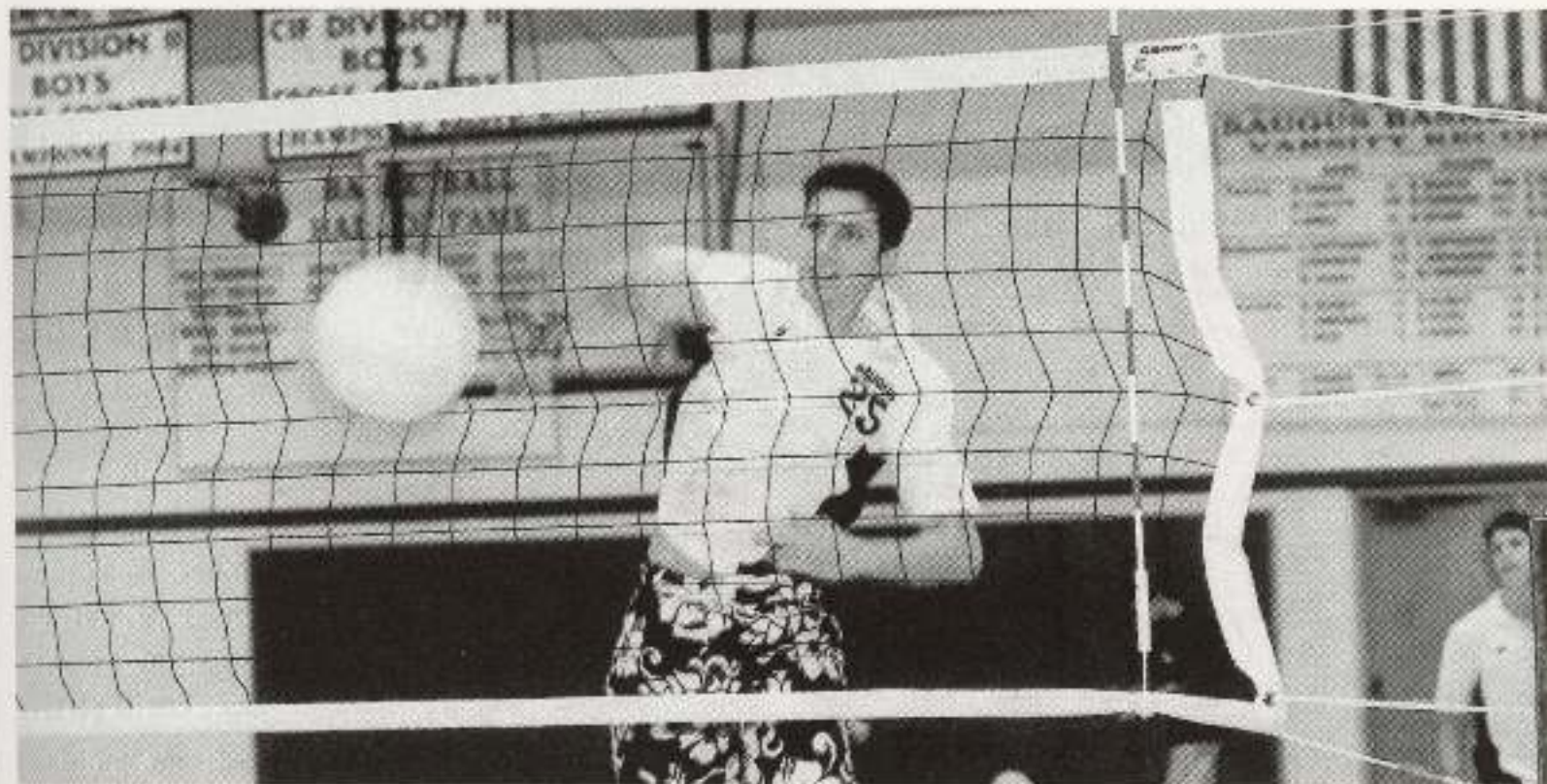

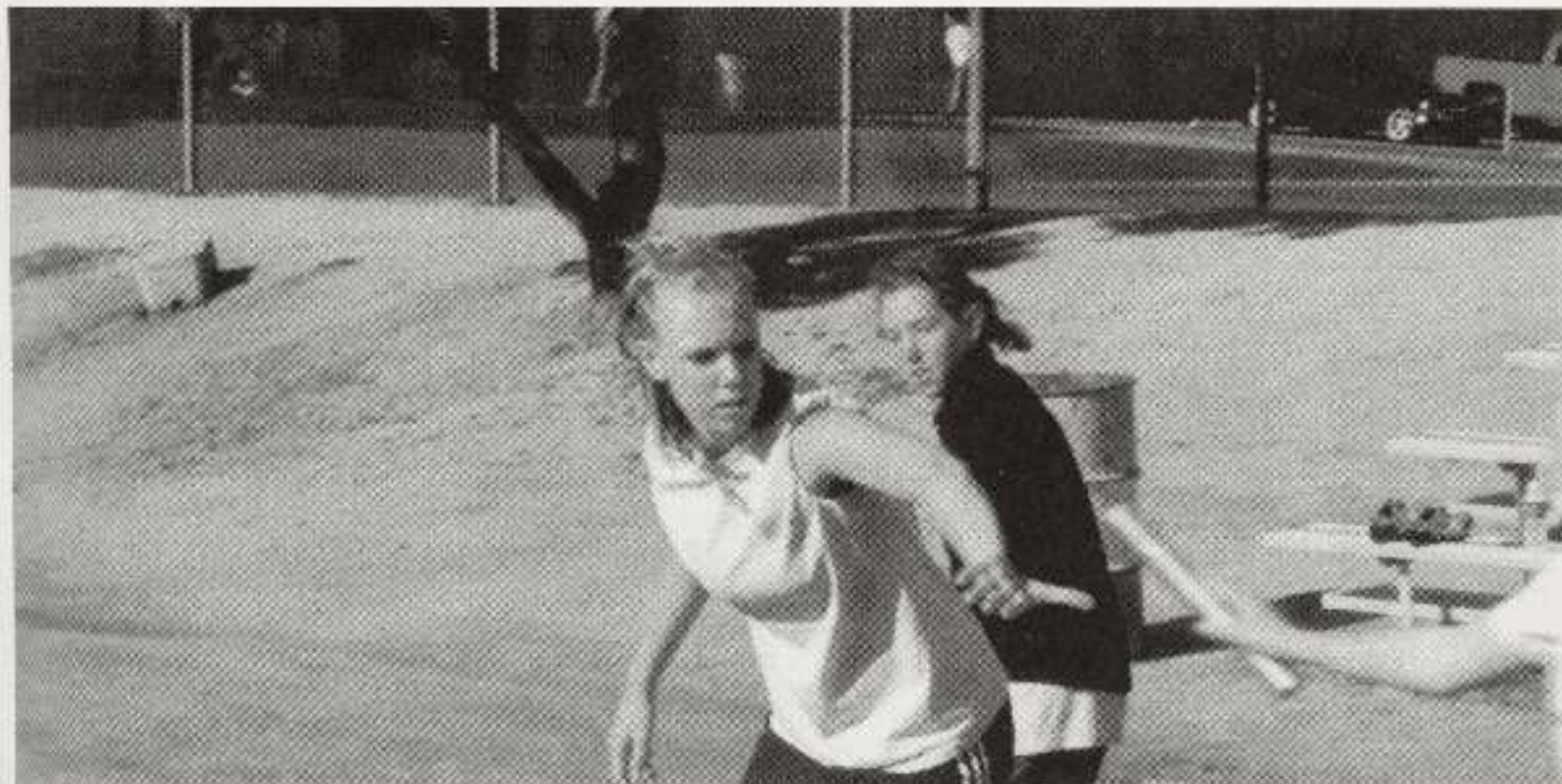

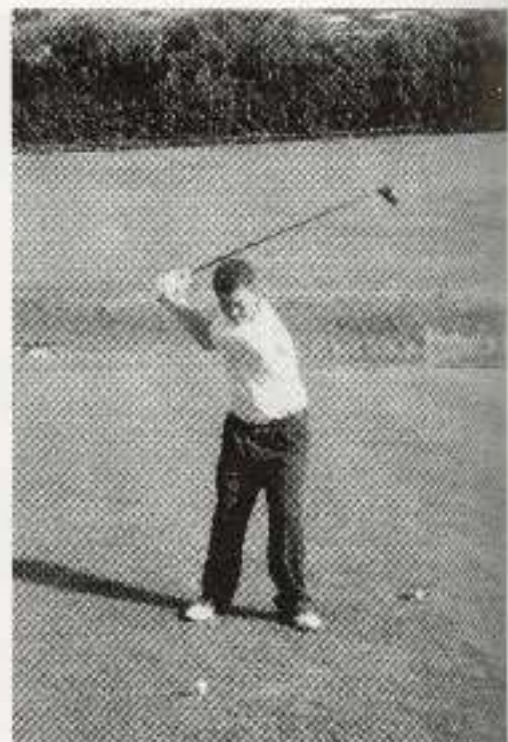

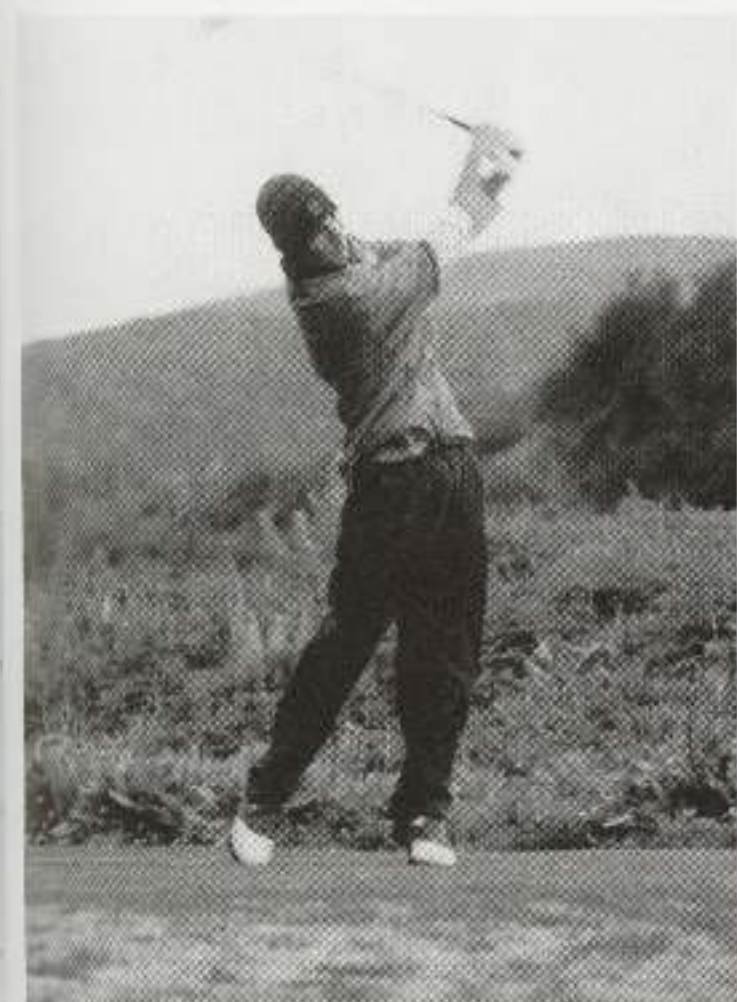

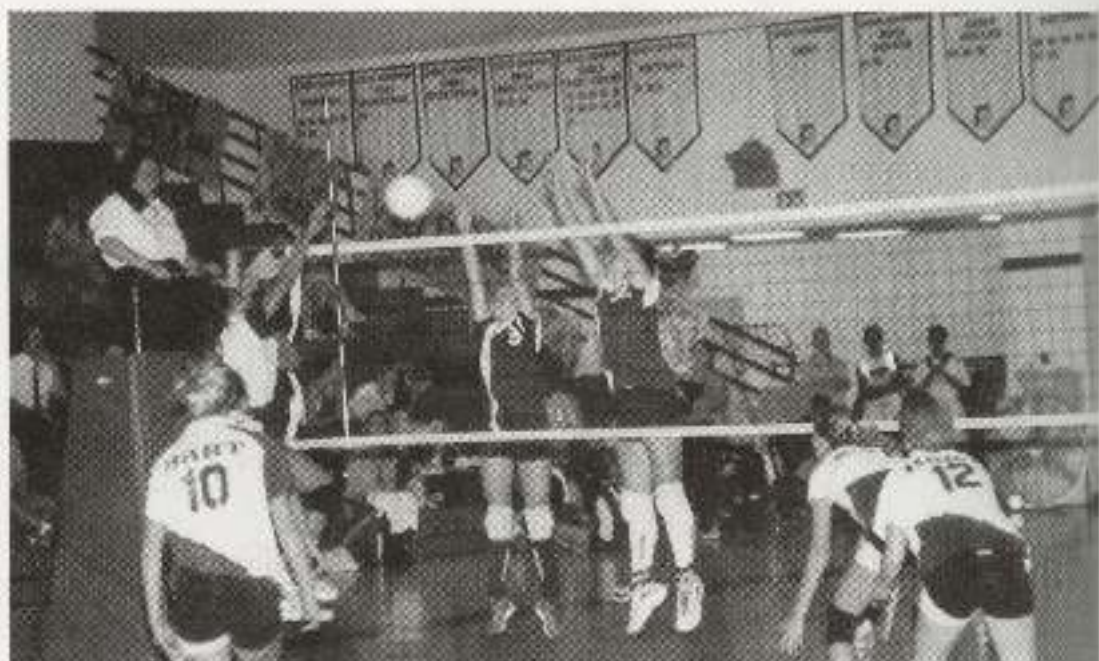

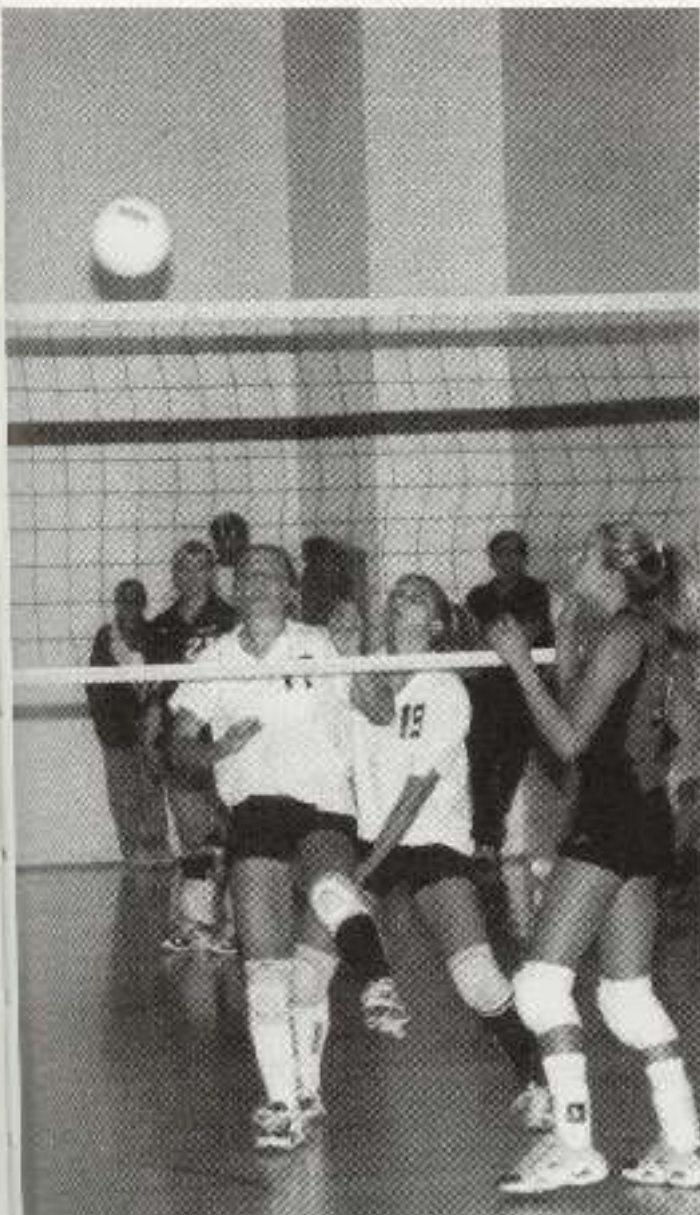

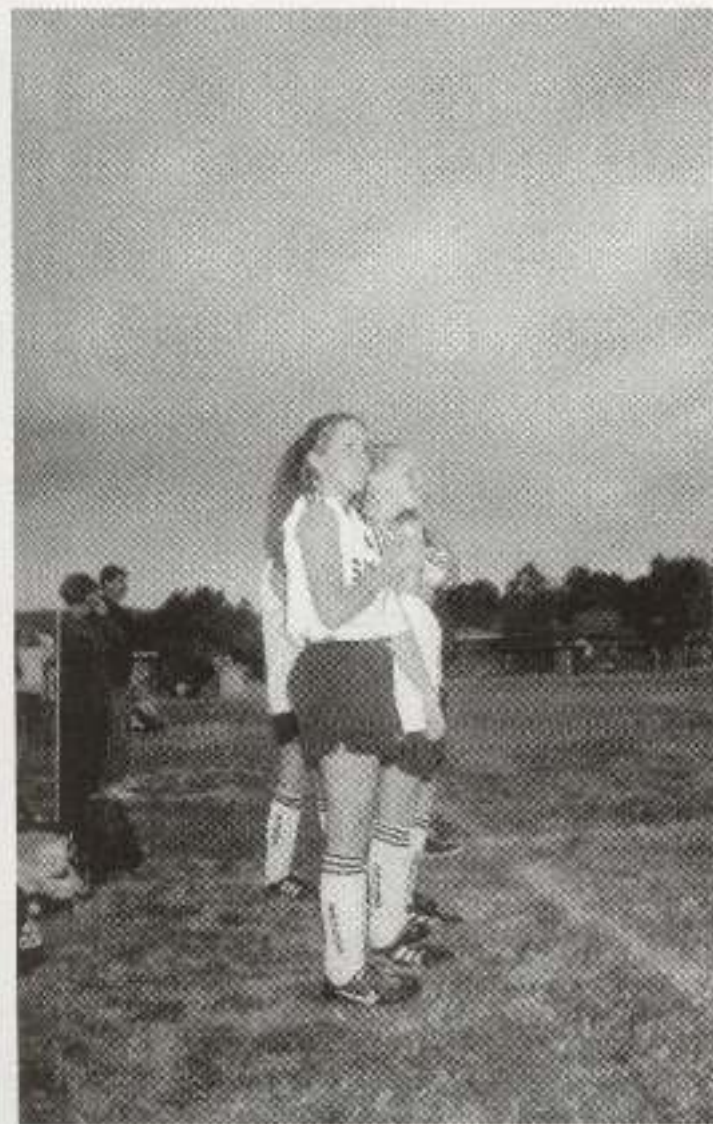

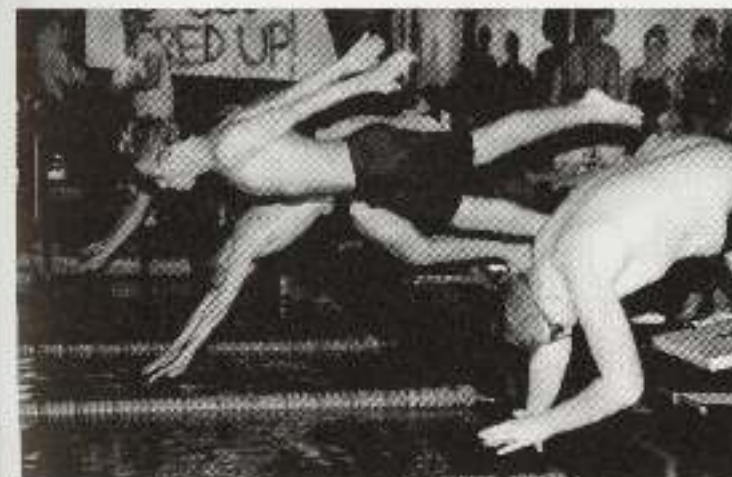

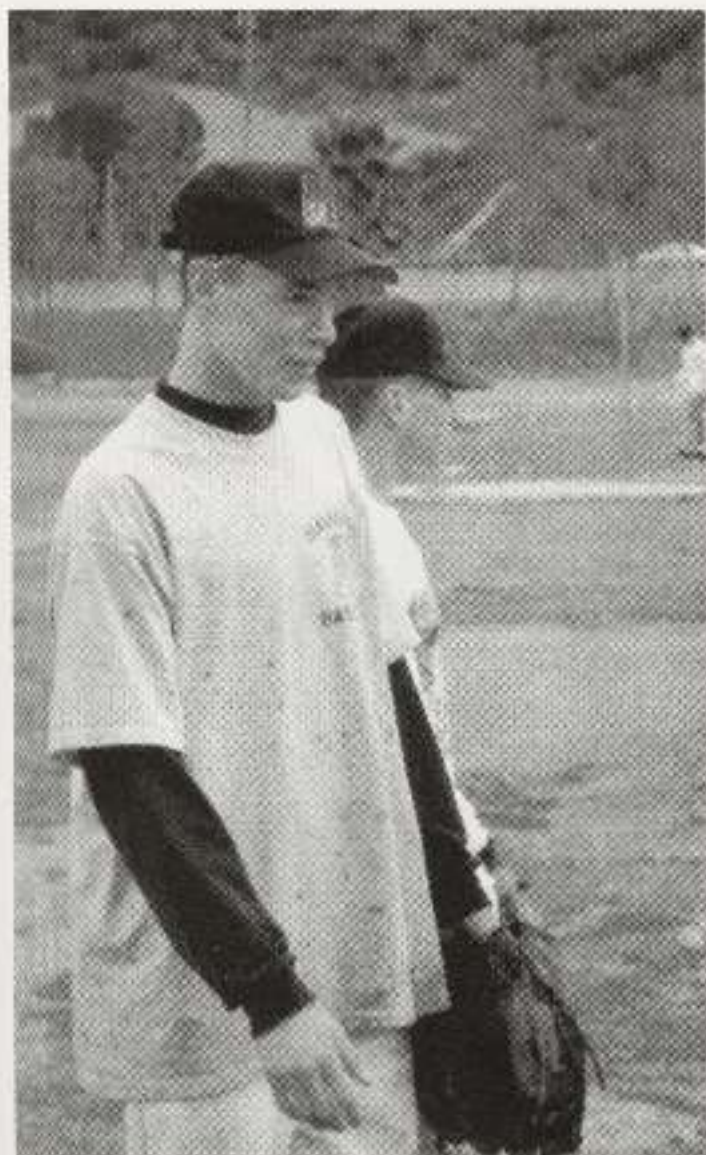

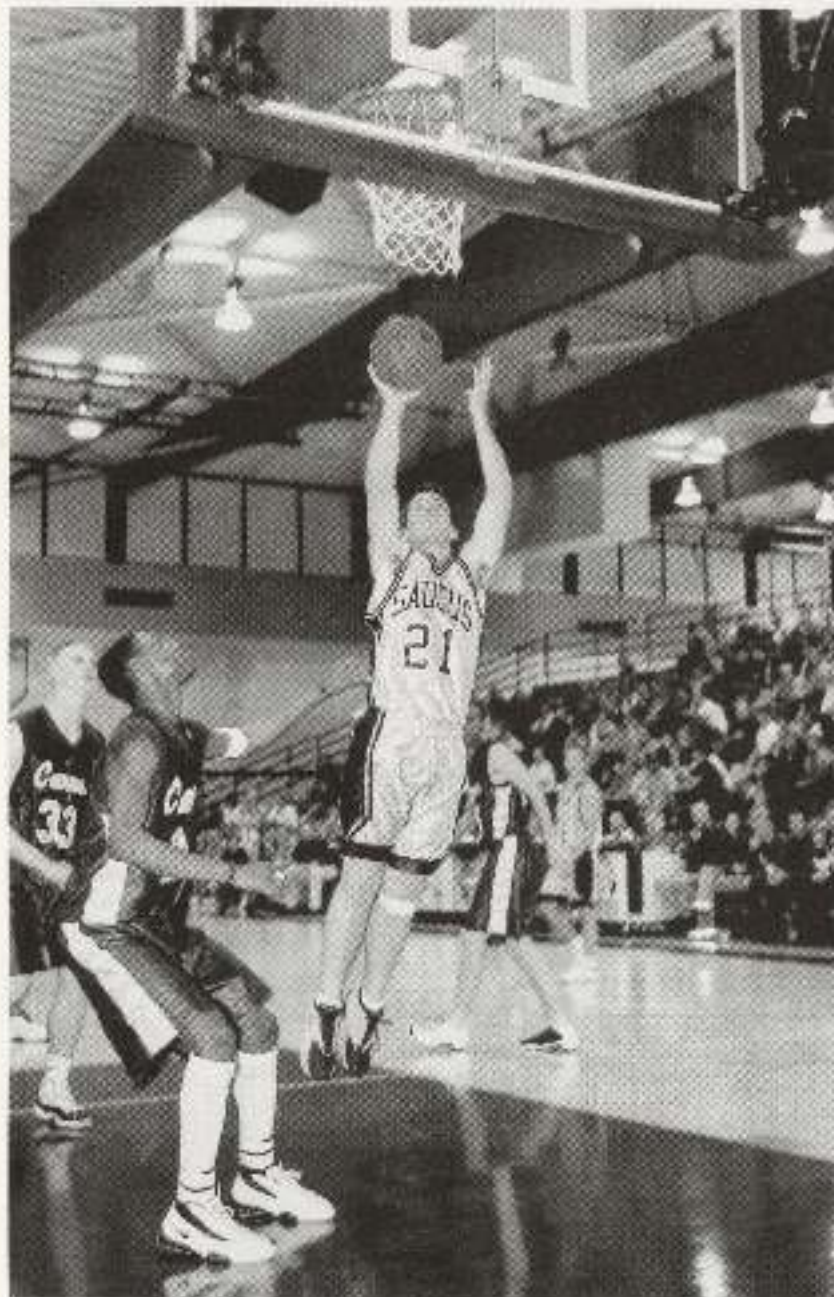

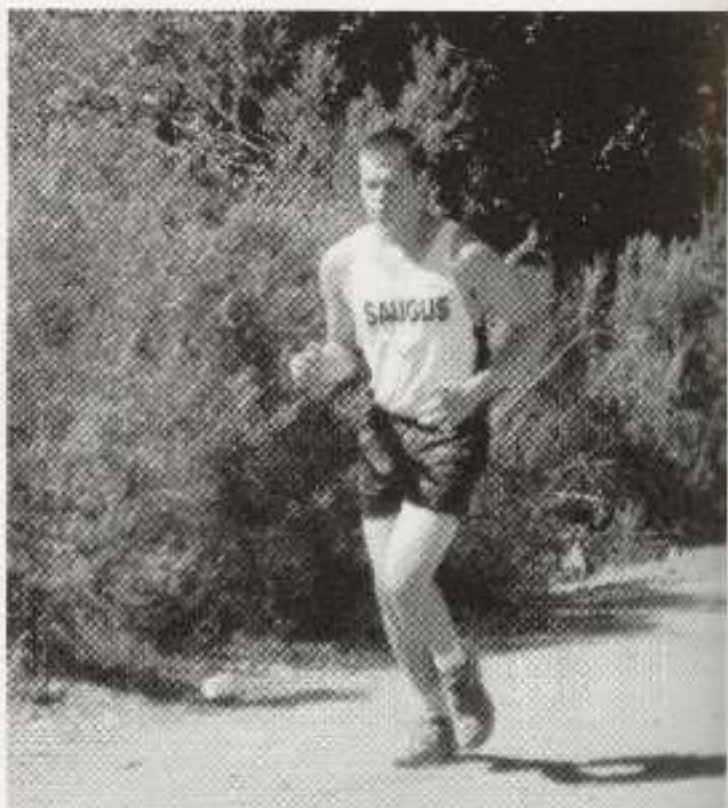

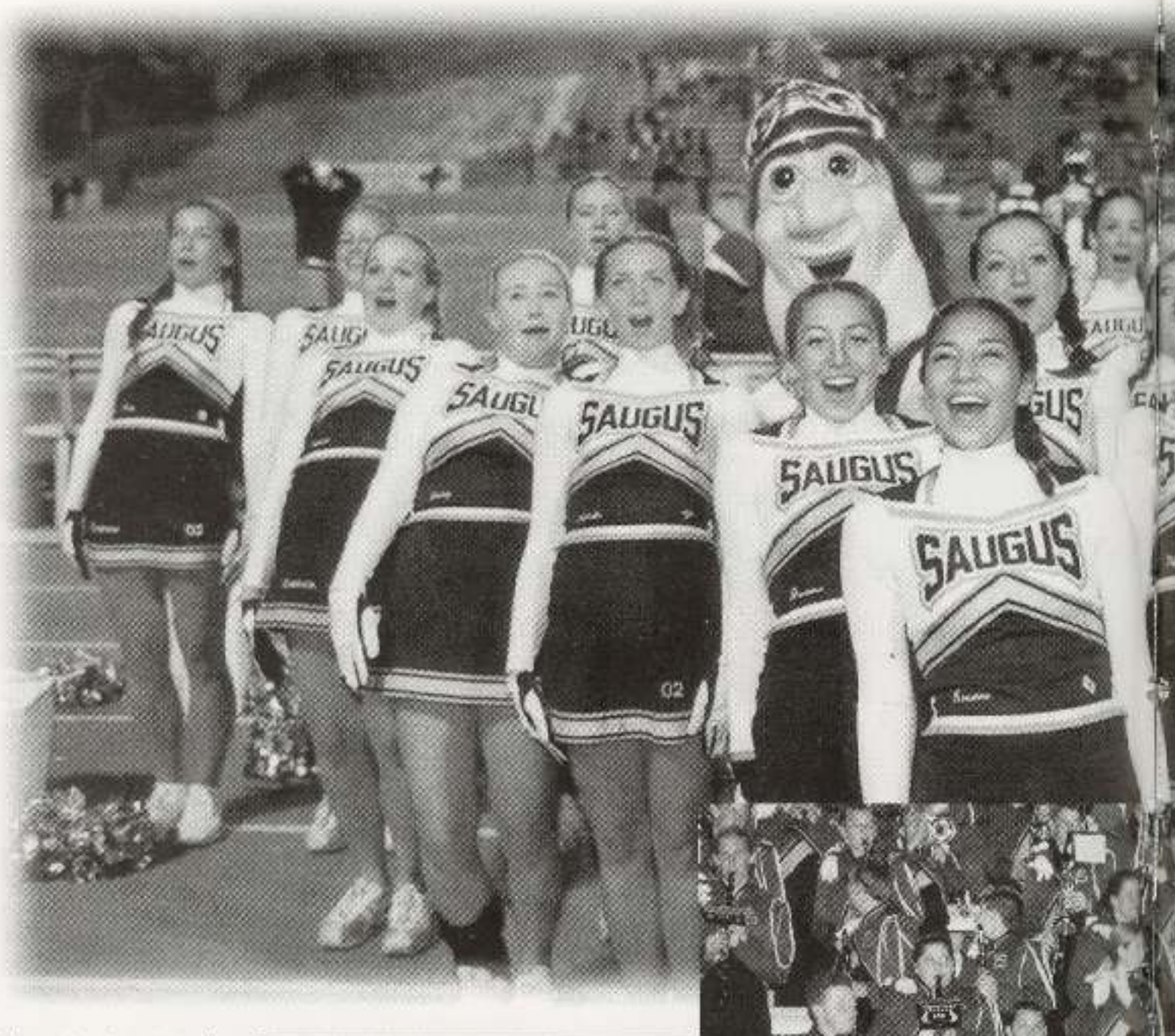

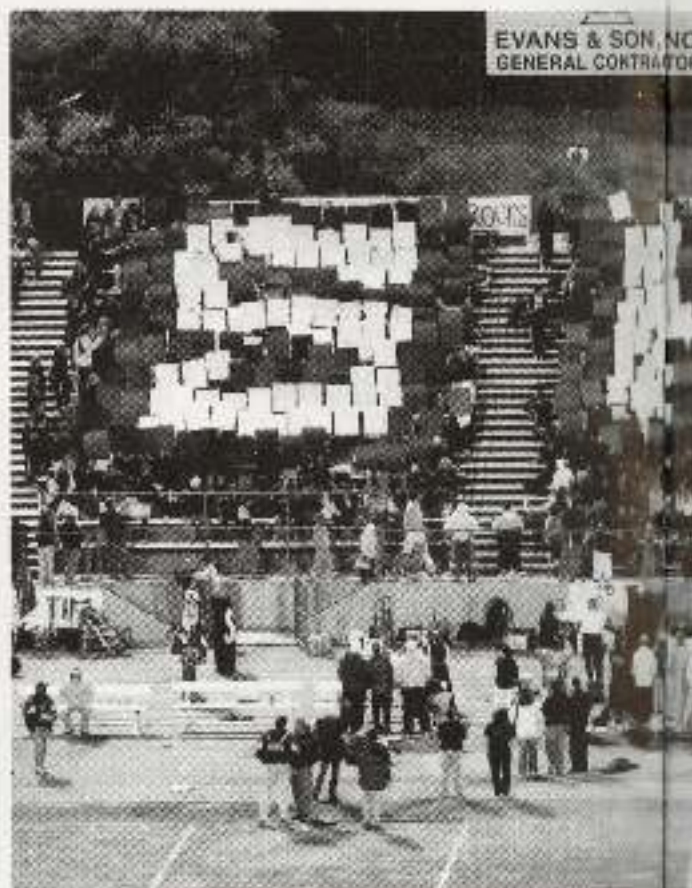

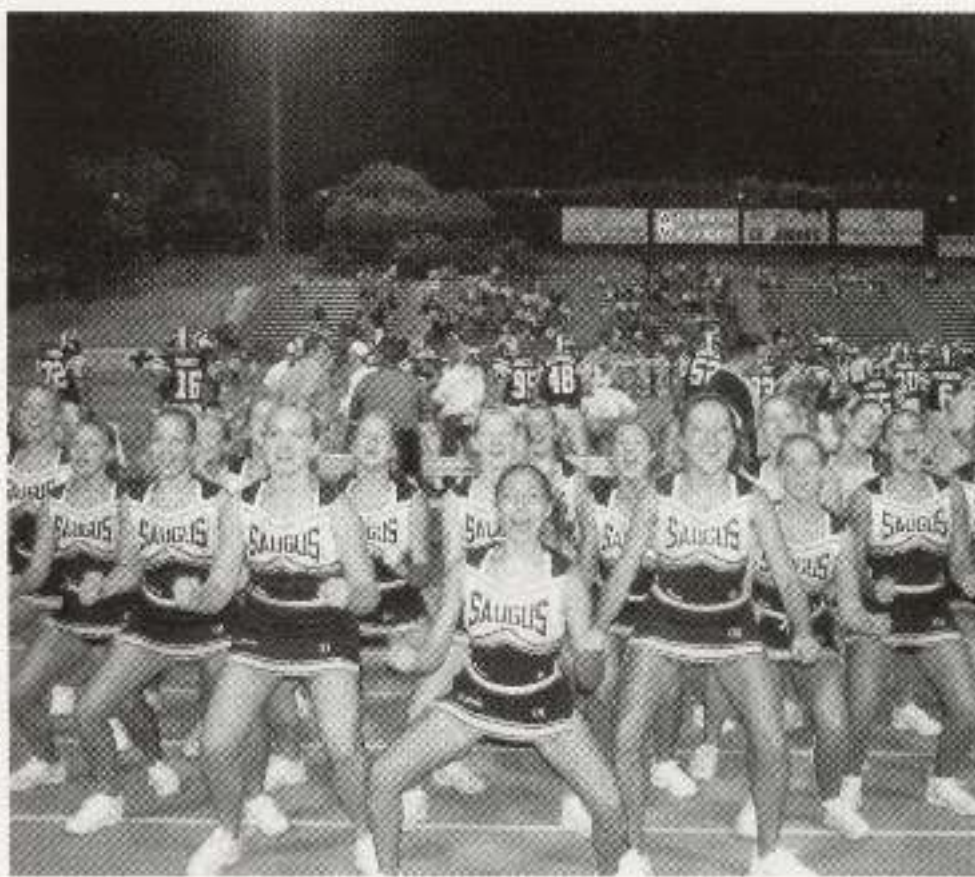

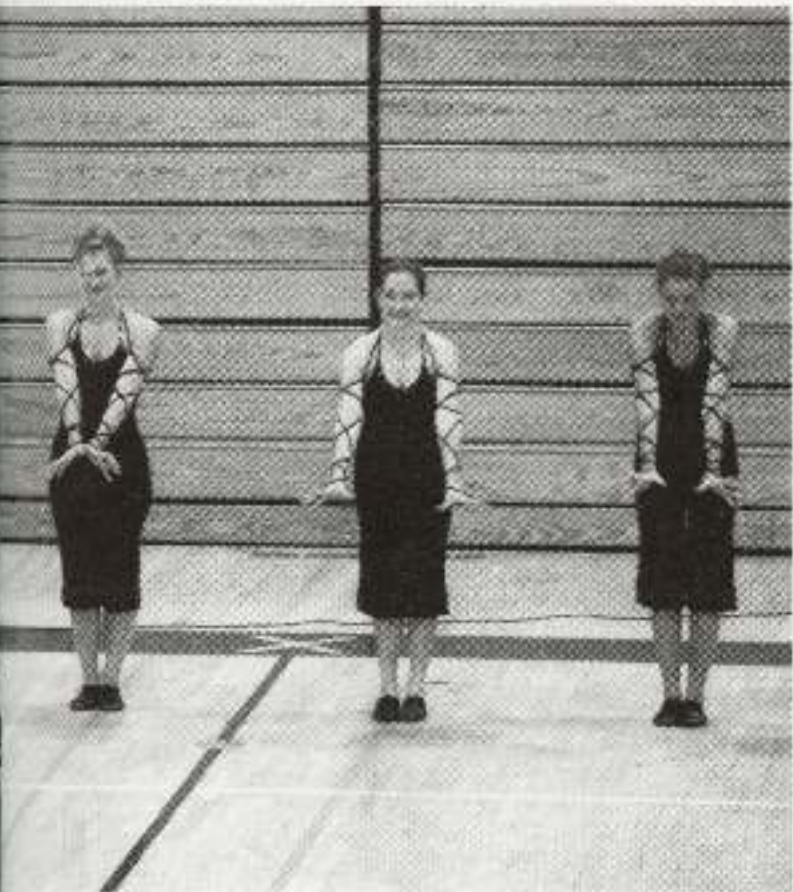

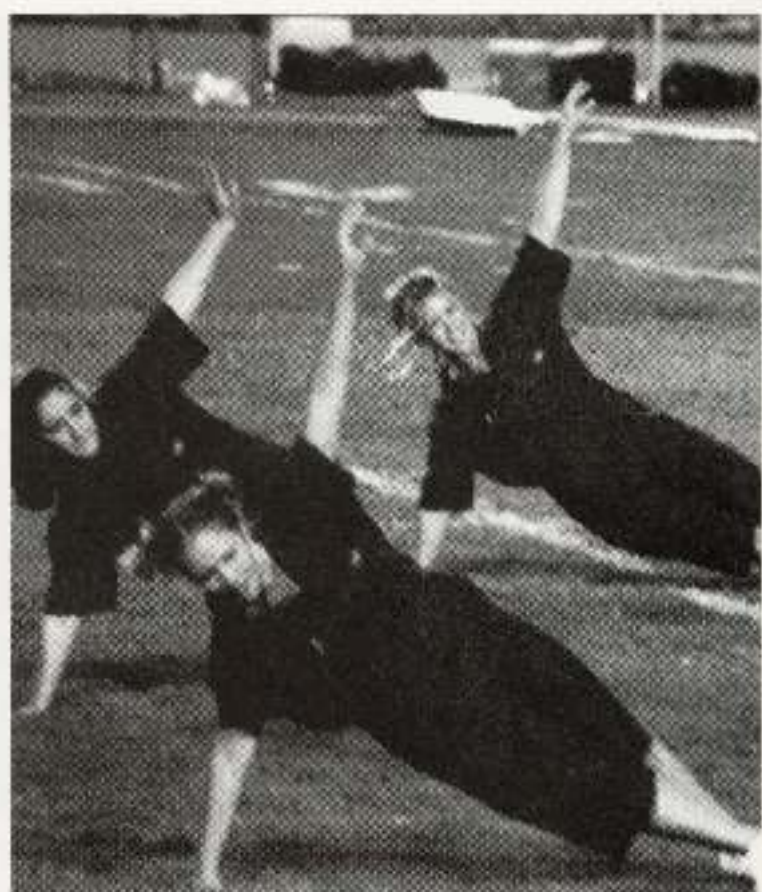

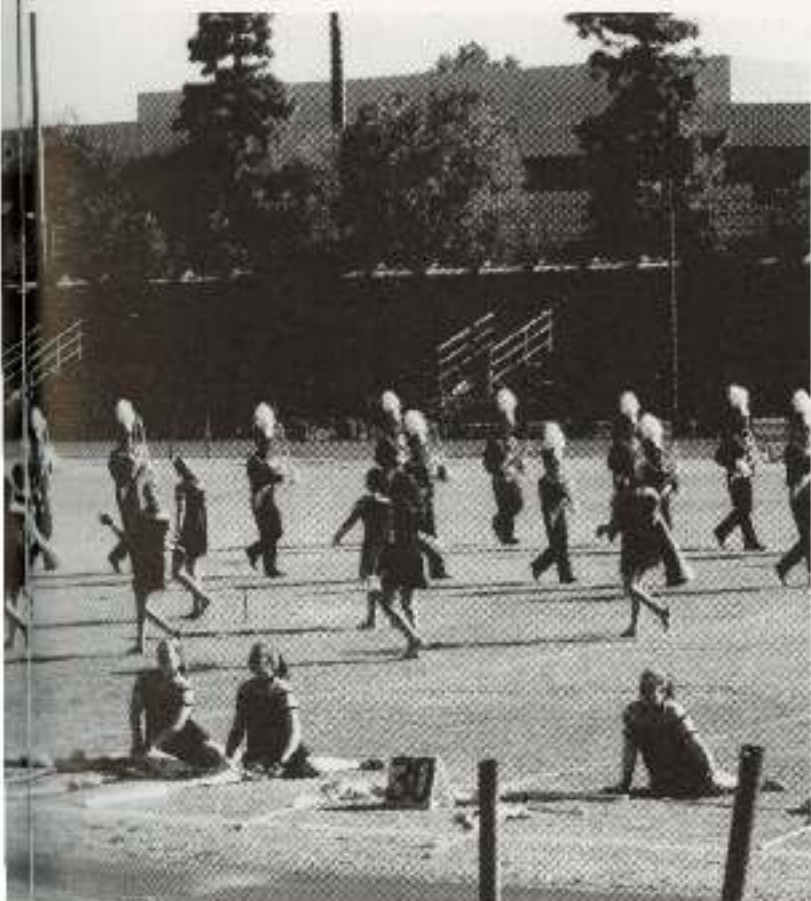

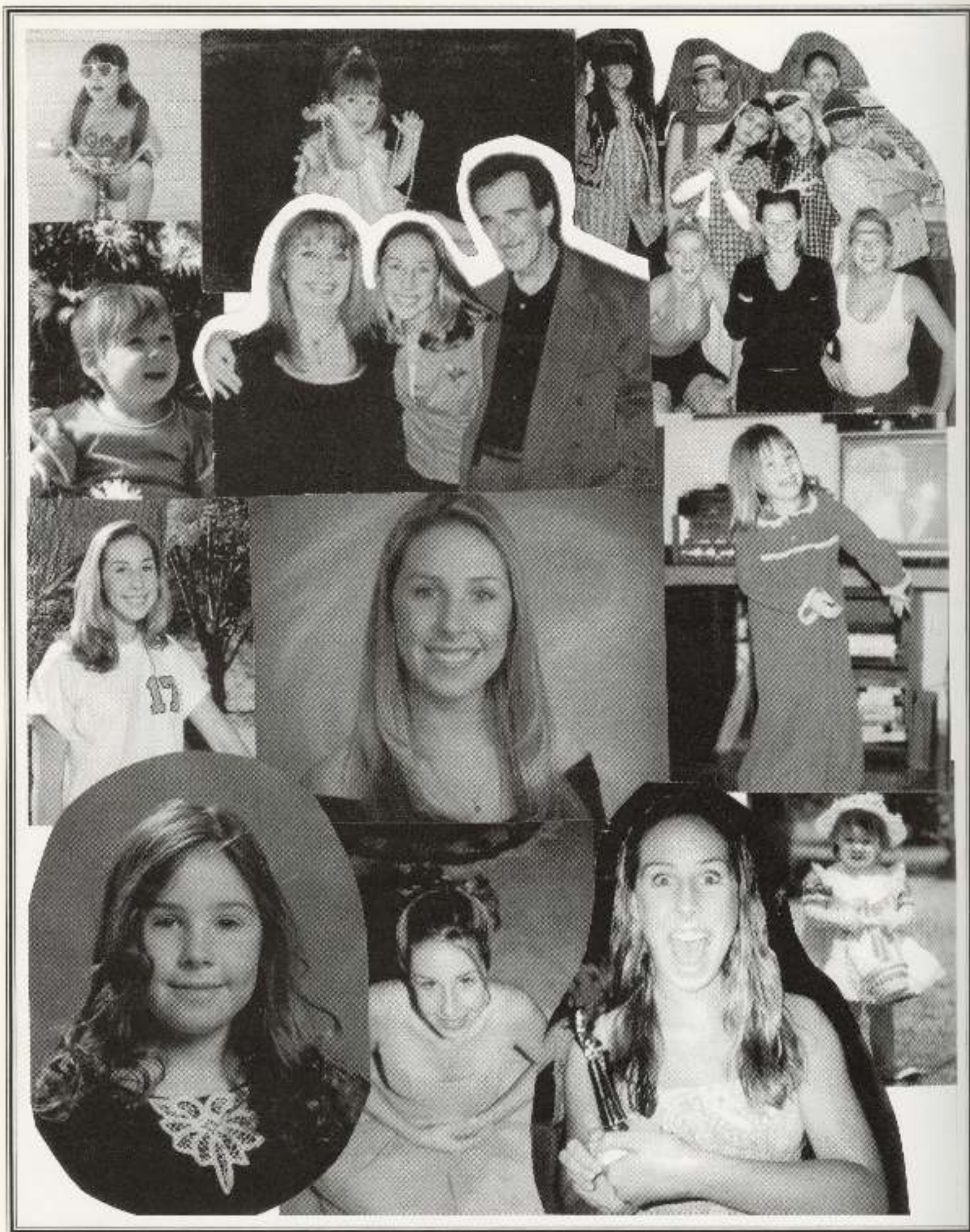
