Portland Man Dies in Ridge Road Disaster

John Straight, prominent business man of Portland, Oregon, was instantly killed Wednesday afternoon, when the car in which he was riding plunged over a steep embankment on the ridge, about four miles above Castaic.

Earle Brownlee, driver of the car, was not fatally injured.

Brownlee's car was one of two from a road mapping expedition thru Mexico.

Willard Hawley, who was driving the other car, noted that his companions were not following him and went back to investigate. It was found that Brownlee had extricated himself from the wreck and secured a ride to the hospital with a passing car. Straight's body was found under the car.

The general supposition held by Constable Pilcher, who is investigating the accident, is that Brownlee fell asleep at the wheel.

Straight's body was removed to Noble's Undertaking parlors.

The following article written by John H. Atwood, a prominent attorney appeared in the magazine "The Christian Business Man":

THERE ever was a time in the history of our country when there

was a need of such organizations as the Business Men's Christian Unity, that time is now. It seems to me that perhaps more than all other factors responsible for the present apparent moral degeneration are the false standards that have obtained among us for too many years. We have been using as the standard by which successes are measured, the one thing that perhaps more than all things explains the situation: That success is measured by money; that it matters not how one gets money, if he gets it. The expression, "money mad," explains the present day attitude in no small degree. I do not refer to the man who is simply striving to gather to himself a competency, something that in reason shall serve his wants and possess him of the means of helping his neighbors, but I have reference to the mad reach for something that is not needed.

A government such as ours must rest upon an honest people or we shall find that it is resting upon sand. Probity and honesty must obtain in the great mass of the people if the republic is to endure, for after all is said and done, the servants that we select are from among ourselves and as we are, they in some measure at least, will be. More of the Christ must be injected into the commercial codes of the nation. There must be more recognition of the two additions to the Ten Commandments that are embodied in the Sermon on the Mount and in the Golden Rule, the recognition that there is something more than the mere acquisition of money and the retention of it. Of all

the things taught by the Master the one thing that seems to be above all others is the proclamation of the brotherhood of man and the duty that we owe to one another by virtue of that brother-hood. We are the sons of one, we are the brothers of all; and a failure to recognize the duty that flows from us toward each of our fellows because of that brotherhood is a failure to recognize that which is supreme.

In the attainment of true success, we must learn to be kind. We must first be tolerant, because tolerance is the father of kindness. When we have become kind we have gone a long way along the road of adherence to the doctrines that we have been talking about and we realize that higher than the accumulation of wealth is the recognition of the brotherhood of man: and then we recognize the Golden Rule as a controlling factor in the business world.







Old Barrel Makes Ideal Bathtub for the Birds

The lot at the rear of our home we have fitted up as a bird sanctuary, and we are greatly enjoying the visitations and carols of the birds which are our invited guests.

In the center of the sanctuary is the birds' open-air bath and drinking fountain, made from a barrel left here by the plasterers when our home was built. The value of the barrel for the purpose was discovered quite by accident one day after a heavy shower. The barrel stood bottom up and it was covered with an inch of sparkling rain water.

We thought nothing of it at the time. But an hour or so later from our study window, which overlooks the bird sanctuary, we saw a, blue jay fly down and get a drink from the water on the barrel. Not long after that a pair of mourning doves appeared and gave themselves a delightful shower bath before they flew away.

That gave us an idea. We already

That gave us an idea. We already had a good-sized lunch counter attached to one of the oak trees. Now we went out and smoothed off the ground, laid a foundation of inch boards, and placed the barrel on them. Then we used a carpenter's level, to make sure that the bottom would hold an inch of water all the way around. Ford Sales in 1924 Over Three Quarter Million

The Los Angeles branch of the Ford Motor Company has just received word from Detroit to the effect that Ford sales for 1924 have already passed three quarters of a million. 

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
