Though English is certainly the most widely-spoken language in the world, English classes involve much more than understanding the spoken word. In fact, even here at West Ranch High School, students have a variety of different and unique English classes such as Humanities, Ap Literature, British Literature, and Mythology and Folktales, to focus on the study of a class or genre of literature as they work to improve their reading, writing, and speaking of English. As sophomore Gina Lee notes, "with so many different [English] classes, it is very hard to realize which class studies what:" Indeed, Lee is correct.
