
dance by saying that "the music was better than all other dances and it was a great way to hang out with friends." For all those who attended this was a great event to start of a great school year.

ANARCHY for MEN! Manarchy is a slop-punk, noise-thrash, avant-garde performance-art experimental all-around-fun band formed in May of 2008 by Matthew Lawson, Jesse Inman, and Parker Keller. The rules of Manarchism are as follows: no practice, no structure, and no constant number of members. The band is known for their outrageous live shows, which often consist of instrument-roulette between band and sometimes audience members, use of subpar equipment, and totally improvised songs. Manarchy shows are always free and open to the public and frequently draw an audience consisting of homeless people. Other frequent audience members are families looking to spend a pleasant day at the park, only to have their pleasant day violently interrupted by the overwhelming sounds of Manarchism. Though their live shows usually do not include actual pre-written songs, the band has written some material that is rarely performed live. Manarchy classics include "Manarchy, LLC," "Cooler than a Frigidaire," and "Waaa, I'm Chris." Manarchy shows are spontaneous, often occurring with little notice and even less planning. These strange qualities and the core values of Manarchism are what make the Manarchy shows something one truly must see in one's lifetime.

Crime After Crime is, according to band member Kyle "The Duke" Economou, "a Punk/Funk/Hip-Hop group, but not in a lame way like Red Hot Chili Peppers, but in an awesome way like the Beastie Boys or Beck," with West Ranch junior Jake Blaha on vocals and guitar. Former West Ranch student Kyle "The Duke" Economou is also in the band, on vocals and bass. Other members include Taylor Clancey on saxophone, Michael Graham on rhythm guitar, Troy LMR on drums, and Mac on computer. This is the story of Crime After Crime. In 1492, settlers landed in America, thinking it to be only inhabited by Natives and their tribes. They were brutally wrong. Already living in a highly advanced culture, exiled Atlanteans sought land to grow and continue their culture. This land was the Americas, as discovered by Christopher Columbus. Rather than starting a war or fighting for this land, the Spaniards assimilated into the culture, which was rich with life and music. In this culture there were 5 rulers at any given time, to separate the executive powers equally. This group was called the "Facina Praeter Facina", which is Latin for Crime After Crime. 

Sorry Charlie! originated as the band Maverick, which was started out of guitarist Connor Sutton's desire to be in a band. Sutton, a junior, asked fellow school orchestra members Jacob Samuelson and Tyler Summers to play in the band, and they agreed. About a week later, Joseph Stone and Adon Biggs joined the band. Looking for a fuller sound, the band sought out Michael Ortiz and Cesar Ochoa to play trumpet and sing under the band name Maverick. After playing and performing under the name Maverick for a while, the band changed their singer to Cristian Cardenas, and thus changed the name of the band to Sorry Charlie! After the name and singer change, Victor Frausto was added to the band to play baritone saxophone, and the alto saxophone position changed from Tyler Summers to Anthony Brown. Sorry Charlie! has played a number of shows in the Santa Clarita Valley, keeping the ska scene alive with BLT after the departure of MFH due to the calls of higher education.







As a part of their School to Career focus in their junior year, students from all over the district attended workshops at Grace Baptist Church, Titled Connecting to Success, the program enables students to learn the business skills necessary for a successful and ethical future in the profession of their choice. Disjoining themselves from their normal existences allowed the living dead to reflect on the day and prepare themselves for Friday's emotional assembly where they returned to recite letters to their loved ones. Additionally, the assembly includes guest speakers who have actually lost their children in vehicle accidents. Hopefully, this explicit performance of tragedy will spark the realization that life is too short, its impact reflected through conscious choices we each make in the future.




JURIORS

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














abbing with Ms. Gabel







































A Way With Practicality


Practical Arts








































Boys' Varsity Basketball
























s i m p l y live clubs and organizations








































After the competition, the club celebrates their victory outside by relaxing and talking with one another. All their practice and hard work paid off.

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

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
